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## PARK PERSONALITIES

### Meet Tom and Norma Collier

Did you know the first capitol of Texas was Natchitoches, Louisiana? This was something Tom and Norma Collier learned on a North Texas Unit caravan to East Texas led by Earl Elam, when Tom was unit president. Earl was a professor of early Texas history specializing in the American Indian culture.

Tom and Norma have been WBCCI members since 1997. They have gone to all the Region 9 rallies from 1998–2015, 19 International Rallies, and traveled all but 3 states. Tom's favorite caravan was the Region 3 "Lighthouse Look About" in 2003 where they visited lighthouses on the east coast from Florida to the International Rally in Burlington, Vermont. Norma's most memorable caravan was the first ever "Gone to Texas" caravan in 2004.



Tom and Norma participated in and led many activities throughout the WBCCI organization. Tom's first venture into leadership was in the North Texas Unit as the Unit Membership Committee chair. Not only did he grow the unit by 22 members in one year, but he developed the Mentorship Program. His Mentorship Program was later adopted by the International organization. Tom was subsequently elected as director and then 3rd Vice



President of his unit. In 2000 Tom was the 2nd VP which came with the responsibility of leading the North Texas Unit caravan to the International Rally in Bismarck, ND. Besides being president of his North Texas Unit, he was also Region 9 President. In 2009, he became the WBCCI President. Going into this office was a bit challenging due to a lawsuit carried over from 2008. The subject of the lawsuit was a rival group using the Wally Byam Club logo. One of his most enjoyable experiences as 2nd VP of the International club was exploring the prospective venues for the International Rally in Gillette, Wyoming in 2010. Norma was responsible for and enjoyed planning the Rally Book.



Tom and Norma moved to NTAC September 2000. While they are not an original founder, like Barbara Adamson, they are within the top 5 longest-term residents at NTAC. Tom was president of NTAC for 2 years. Once again he had to sort through another lawsuit, but his most memorable experience was a rescue helicopter landing on the property. A non-Airstream rally member was injured while unhitching and had to be airlifted to Waco. As part of the NTAC Presidential responsibilities, they also planned 2 membership dinners. Over their years at NTAC, Norma led 2 Ladies' Teas and published the directory. She continues to be active in the Ladies club, potlucks, and cards. Tom published a pet directory, helped with the Dog Park maintenance, and will be your future Ice Cream Social Chairman ("Those who show up make the rules," says Tom). They both have led the Rally Welcome Committee and participate on the Resale Committee (now known as Shareholder Listing). In fact, Norma was an inaugural member, and Tom has been on this committee for several years.

Tom and Norma continue to be supportive members of the community. Every time I reach out to a neighbor in need, I find that Norma has already been there to provide a meal or Tom has taken them to a doctor's appointment. When asked what they think makes NTAC such a special community? Tom: "What makes the park is volunteerism;" Norma: "It is important we support our leadership and volunteers."

### Motorhome Touring in Europe

Photos and stories of Wally's tours around the world while traveling in his Airstream may be a dream for many of us but in August of 2022, that dream became reality for a few – except for traveling in an Airstream.



On August 8, 2022, a 35 day "trip of a lifetime" began with a few adventurous friends as we traveled in a rented motorhome throughout Germany, France, Spain and Switzerland.

The tour was arranged by Thomas Grossman, proprietor of European Motorhome Tours and the trip truly was fantastic! The trip was organized by Peter and Judy Schwarz and included, in alphabetical order, George and Pam Beckwith; Jim and Lisa Cousins; Bruce and Cynthia Nutt; John Sanders and Mary Beth Comer; John and Amy Van Artsdalen; Leigh and Charlie Humphrey (who are not Airstreamers or members of the Airstream club); and Keith and Debbie Wilson. Many of us on the tour are residents of the North Texas Airstream Community (NTAC).

## Germany

We all met in Frankfurt, Germany and a few of us arrived a few days before the tour began to avoid jet lag. We stayed at a hotel in Frankfurt that was convenient to restaurants and shopping. We were able to enjoy the old part of Frankfurt with its half-timber houses and were taught to drink Apfelwein, a traditional German drink made from apples.

On August 11, a luxury bus picked us up from our hotel in Frankfurt and took us to Friedburg, Germany to pick up our motorhomes (included in the price of the trip). Prior to the trip we were able to select a motorhome, which varied from 20 to 23 feet long with differing options. We were checked out quickly and efficiently. Our motorhomes had been stocked by Thomas' team with bedding, towels, pots and pans, plates, glassware and almost everything we would need on the trip. We brought our clothes, toiletries and most importantly, made sure we brought European travel plug adapters with us.

Our first stop, in Schweich, Germany was eye opening! In Europe, campgrounds are, as expected, different. None of the campsites we had would be considered "Full hook-up." All had electricity, but no water or sewer available at the campsite or "pitch," as they're called in Europe.

The freshwater tank is filled away from the campsite, adjacent to the dump area. Often there is a short hose, but the hose generally doesn't extend to the freshwater fill. More often than not, a plastic watering can is used to fill the tank, requiring

multiple trips from the fresh water source back and forth to the rig. Grey water is dumped from a pipe beneath the motorhome into a special drain on the ground. Once, the actual grey water dump was on the grass at a Chateaux in France! The black tank uses a cassette system. The cassette (located under the toilet) is removed from a compartment accessed from the outside of the motorhome, then rolled to a special dump. Some were located in the bath house; others were a large pipe opening in the ground. Our guys were not thrilled with the cassette system.

### Observations from the Walk Path

The perimeter fence along the west and north of the property tips outward in places, and some of the posts are raising up out of the ground. Spraying poison on weeds that were coming under and through the fence has contributed to this condition by killing roots that helped stabilize the ground that supports it. Furthermore, ten plus years of mowing has smoothed the ground adjacent to the fence, encouraging pedestrians and golf carts to use the area closest to it, adding additional stress. This is why Phil Spruell, in discussions leading up to the shareholder vote on the walk path, pointed out that the path should be kept some distance away from the fence.

At present, the designated area for the path, away from the fence, is a bit bumpy. But if traffic sticks to this area, and not so close to the fence, it will both flatten out the walk path and help restore the health of the sod supporting the fence.

### Fairfield Lake State Park Update

Many campers were surprised and saddened when Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD) lost their lease on Fairfield Lake State Park and closed the gates to the public on February 27. This happened after the longtime lessor, Vistra Corp., shuttered their coal plant across the lake and contracted to sell the property to developer Todd Interests, who plans to build homes on the site. TPWD, which was only interested in the portion of the property that comprised the state park, did not submit a bid.

There have since been new developments distributed by Texas House District 13 Representative, [Angelia Orr](#), and shared with us by Norma Collier. Representative Orr introduced legislation, joint-authored by four House chairmen, to preserve and protect the park. She reports in an update shared with her constituents that it has unanimously passed the *Culture, Recreation, and Tourism* committee hearings and the House. It will now be voted on by the Senate. Representative Orr asks that you share this news and advocate for the bill's passage. For now, the park reopened for day use in mid-March, but remains closed to overnight camping.

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## **NTAC BY LAW**

When people talk about the "NTAC Bylaws," it is most often inferred that they are speaking about something in the booklet [Bylaws, Rules, Regulations & Policies](#), the latest edition of which was published in 2019 and is available on our website. Technically, though, as the title of the booklet implies, "bylaws" defines but one of three components of the official structure, administration, and governance of our park. Here is a very brief summary of what these components are and how they differ.

### **BYLAWS**

Bylaws describe the formal and legal structure of the organization and how it is governed. The titles of each of the articles that constitute our bylaws, which can be found on the inside cover of the booklet, provide an insightful picture of what exactly this entails: Charter; Membership; Officers; Board of Directors; Executive Committee; Quorum; Meetings; Committees; Parliamentary Authority; Amendments. Changes to the bylaws require a two-thirds vote of the Members (see Bylaws, Article Thirteen, Section 1).

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

This section prescribes the conduct, conditions, and restrictions by which members agree to live in order to fulfill the unique purpose of the organization. As the preamble to the *Rules & Regulations* says, the corporation

*"was conceived with the intent to provide a place where members who enjoy "Airstreaming" can be together in fellowship and participate in social activities. It was founded with the goal to establish and maintain the finest possible Airstream Park."*

Amending the *Rules & Regulations* is less restrictive than the *Bylaws*, requiring only action of the Board of Directors (see *Rules & Regulations*, Article 9, 9.01).

### **POLICIES**

The distinction between *Policies* and *Rules and Regulations* is, admittedly, a bit difficult to put your finger on. In this section, I leave myself open to correction by those who have a better understanding of the difference. In addition, I must stress that, as a current member of the Bylaws Committee, my statements in this article in no



way reflect the official “policy” of that committee. Nevertheless, I think it’s a subject worthy of discussion. My Webster’s Dictionary app applies such phrases as “prudence or wisdom” and “a definite course or method of action” in its definitions of *policy*. This suggests to me that policies apply less to general prescriptions than particular actions, and that they are more likely to arise from situational experience than foresight. Whatever the case, *Policies* are the domain of our Executive Committee and are subject to Board approval. ### PawPals Core Volunteers Needed

PawPals is a Pet Adoption Center. Before PawPals opened in 2010, about 700 dogs were euthanized per year in Hill County because the Animal Control Officer had no viable shelter to keep captured animals.

PawPals has 2 primary goals:

1. To provide shelter and facilitate adoptions to forever homes.
2. To address pet overpopulation through education. This includes hosting the TCAP (Texas Coalition for Animal Protection) monthly affordable spay, neuter, and preventive health care program.

PawPals has a critical need for core volunteers. 30+ dogs need to be walked twice a day every day. Shifts are usually 3–4 hours in the morning and afternoon. If you count steps, you will definitely achieve your daily goal! You must be prepared for shelter odors, but you’ll feel SO GOOD looking after these abandoned fur babies.
