## Notes from Fr. Steve

Saint Andrew Bessette was known as the miracle worker of Montreal. His life and spirituality are worthy of your reflection, and his life also serves as an example for all of us to follow, and develop a deeper relationship with the Lord Jesus.

Saint Andre Bessette, born Alfred Bessette, is celebrated as a humble and devout man who dedicated his life to serving others. Despite facing numerous challenges and setbacks, he emerged as a beacon of hope and healing for countless individuals. His unwavering faith and compassion earned him recognition as a saint in the Catholic Church, and his legacy continues to inspire people around the world.

**Early Life:** Alfred Bessette was born on August 9, 1845, in Saint-Gregoire-d'Iberville, Quebec, Canada. He was the eighth of twelve children born to a poor farming family. Tragically, his father died when Alfred was just nine years old, leaving the family in dire financial straits. Alfred received minimal formal education and struggled with poor health throughout his youth, facing various illnesses that hindered his ability to work.

**Spiritual Awakening:** Despite his hardships, Alfred possessed an unshakable faith in God from a young age. He found solace and strength in prayer, often seeking refuge in his deep devotion to Saint Joseph. At the age of 12, Alfred made a pilgrimage to the shrine of Saint Joseph in Montreal, where he vowed to dedicate his life to God if he was granted health and the ability to work.

**Religious Life:** Inspired by his pilgrimage, Alfred sought entry into the Congregation of Holy Cross, a religious order dedicated to education and serving the poor. However, due to his frail health and lack of normal education, he faced numerous rejections before finally being accepted as a lay brother in 1870. Taking the religious name Brother Andre he began his novitiate at the College Notre-Dame in Montreal.

**Miraculous Healings:** Brother Andre's deep faith and devotion to Saint Joseph soon gained him a reputation as a healer. People from all walks of life sought his assistance, believing in his ability to intercede on their behalf. Despite his own doubts and humility, Brother Andre prayed reverently for the sick and suffering, often anointing them with oil from a lamp burning in front of a statue of Saint Joseph.

**Legacy of Hope:** Brother Andre's ministry of healing continued to grow, and he became instrumental in the construction of Saint Joseph's Oratory on Mount Royal in Montreal. Despite facing skepticism and opposition, he persevered in his mission, trusting in God's providence. Saint Joseph's Oratory would later become a pilgrimage site visited by millions of people seeking physical, emotional, and spiritual healing.

**Canonization:** Brother Andre's selfless devotion and countless miraculous healings led to his canonization as a saint by Pope Benedict XVI on October 17, 2010. He was officially recognized as Saint Andre Bessette, the first Canadian-born male saint. His life serves as a testament to the power of faith, prayer, and compassion in overcoming adversity and bringing hope to the world.

Saint Andre Bessette's journey from humble beginnings to sainthood is a remarkable testament to the transformative power of faith and compassion. His legacy lives on in the countless lives he touched through his ministry of healing and his unwavering devotion to God. Today, Saint Andre Bessette continues to inspire people of all backgrounds to embrace faith, hope, and love in their own lives.

**5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Maybe I'm weird, but I like spending time in doctor's offices, confession lines in churches, auto repair shops, prison cells, and support groups of various kinds. It's refreshing to be with people who humbly admit something is wrong and forthrightly set out on a path toward a solution. When we ignore what is off kilter, we become alone and fragile. In places where people are honest and hopeful about brokenness, sturdy if subtle fellowship usually ensues.

Consider the image we see of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. **"...they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by a demon. The whole town was gathered at the door."** The entire human community is afflicted in various ways, and so it gradually forms a strange new community around Jesus. The healer from Nazareth is like a sun of health around which orbits a throng of humanity absorbing his healing rays. These blessed souls can't fix themselves and become healthy, and they know it. But they have found in him the living source of all imaginable healing.

It's the Church, isn't it? A sin-sick community gathered and healed is what happens at the beginning of every Mass. We shuffle in through the door from everywhere and announce that we are not okay, and we can't fix it. In doing so, we are drawn into the orbit of the healing power of Christ — and into a renewed community with the whole human family. It's nothing to fear or rush. Maybe we can even learn to enjoy more how good it is to be in such a happy place.

**Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Today's Scripture readings concentrate on the topics of suffering and healing, faith, preaching the Good News of the Gospel, and prayer. In the passage from the Book of Job, he suffers immensely, yet in what is revealed later in the Book, stays focused on his belief in God. St. Paul proclaims that he has been charged with preaching the Gospel, saying, woe to me if I do not preach it. The evangelist, St. Mark in his Gospel, describes how Jesus, at His disciples' prompting, heals Simon-Peter's mother-in-law. This miracle stresses the importance of prayer knowing that, through faith, God will always give us strength in times of distress and if it is His will, heal us from our infirmities. Daily communication with God is necessary to grow in discipleship. Take a few minutes each day in quiet time to talk with our Lord.

## Everyday Stewardship

### The Audacity of Holiness

Do you know a holy person? I'm not talking about piety — that's important, too, in its own way. But right now, I'm speaking of holiness.

St. Therese of Lisieux called holiness “a disposition of the heart that makes us humble and little in the arms of God, aware of our weakness, and confident — in the most audacious way — in His Fatherly goodness.”

The holy person sees a storm on the horizon of life, and rather than give themselves over to fear and despair (natural and understandable reactions), regards the gathering winds as an opportunity to rely more fully on God. The holy person takes a bad situation and sanctifies it with charity and understanding that defies our fallen human nature.

Peter's mother-in-law was still in the throes of a fever when Jesus grasped her hand. It wasn't until she took his hand and allowed him to help her up that “the fever left her and she waited on them.” Before the fever could leave her, she had to commit to holiness — to put her trust in him in a most audacious way. She had to find it within herself to lift her weakened hand to grasp his — and as soon as she did, she was rewarded. Her bodily health restored, she gave thanks, and attended to his needs.

God's hand is always outstretched to us. Will we take it, even if the fever of sin and pride and worldly concerns rages in our souls? Will we muster the strength? Will we be audacious enough to have confidence in His Fatherly goodness?

## Readings for Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

### Reading I

*Job 7:1-4, 6-7*

Job spoke, saying: Is not man's life on earth a drudgery? Are not his days those of hirelings? He is a slave who longs for the shade, a hireling who waits for his wages. So I have been assigned months of misery, and troubled nights have been allotted to me. If in bed I say, "When shall I arise?" then the night drags on; I am filled with restlessness until the dawn. My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; they come to an end without hope. Remember that my life is like the wind; I shall not see happiness again.

### Reading II

*1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23*

Brothers and sisters: If I preach the gospel, this is no reason for me to boast, for an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it! If I do so willingly, I have a recompense, but if unwillingly, then I have been entrusted with a stewardship. What then is my recompense? That, when I preach, I offer the gospel free of charge so as not to make full use of my right in the gospel. Although I am free in regard to all, I have made myself a slave to all so as to win over as many as possible. To the weak I became weak, to win over the weak. I have become all things to all, to save at least some. All this I do for the sake of the gospel, so that I too may have a share in it.

### Gospel

*Mark 1:29-39*

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon's mother-in-law lay sick with fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them. When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him. Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you." He told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come." So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

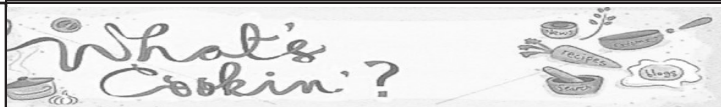

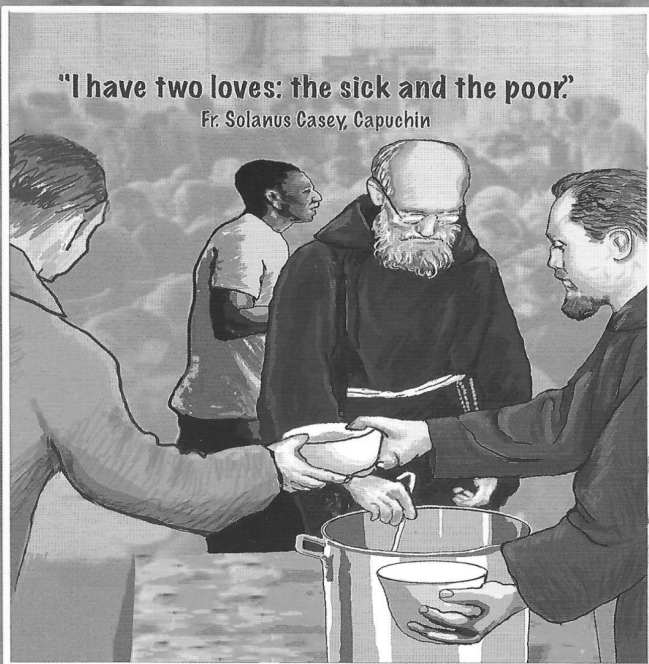

**Oatmeal Chocolate Chip Cake**

- 1 3/4 c. boiling water
- 1 c. uncooked oatmeal
- 1 c. packed brown sugar
- 1 c. granulated sugar
- 1/2 c. butter or margarine, softened
- 3 eggs
- 1 3/4 c. all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cocoa
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 c. chopped nuts
- 1/2 c. chocolate chips

In a mixing bowl, pour water over oatmeal. Allow to stand 10 minutes. Add sugars and butter, stirring until the butter melts. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Mix flour, baking soda, cocoa and salt together. Add to batter; mix well. Pour into a greased 13x9 inch baking pan. Sprinkle top of cake with walnuts and chocolate chips. Bake at 350 F for about 40 minutes. Yield: 12 servings.

**Parish Registration:**

Welcome to all new families/individuals. Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition for the reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage. Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

**Baptism:**
