Notes from Fr. Steve

In the Gospel of Luke 24:35-48 today, we find the account of Jesus appearing to his disciples after his resurrection. This passage not only signifies the reality of Christ's resurrection but also carries significant messages about faith, understanding, and mission.

The scene opens with two disciples recounting their encounter with Jesus on the road to Emmaus. As they share their experience, Jesus suddenly appears among them, greeting them with peace. However, rather than reacting with joy and celebration, they were startled and frightened, thinking they were seeing a ghost. Jesus, ever compassionate, invites them to touch him, to see that he is indeed flesh and bone. This moment is pivotal, as it reaffirms the physical reality of Jesus' resurrection. It is not a mere spiritual apparition but a bodily resurrection, demonstrating the power and triumph of God over death.

Jesus then goes on to open the disciples' minds to understand the Scriptures. He reminds them of the prophecies concerning the Messiah and how everything that happened to him was foretold. This act of teaching underscores the importance of Scripture in deepening our faith and understanding of God's plan. It emphasizes the continuity between the Old Testament and the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Through the Scriptures, we gain insight into God's redemptive work throughout history, leading us to a deeper relationship with Him.

Furthermore, Jesus commissions his disciples to be witnessed of these things. They are called to proclaim repentance and forgiveness of sins to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. This commission is not exclusive to the disciples present at that moment but extends to all believers throughout history, including us today. We are called to bear witness to the reality of Christ's resurrection, to share the message of repentance and forgiveness, and to participate in God's mission of reconciliation.

As we reflect on this passage, let us be reminded of the transformative power of encountering the risen Christ. Let us seek to deepen our understanding of Scripture, allowing it to shape our faith and guide our actions. And let us embrace our role as witnesses, boldly proclaiming the good news of salvation to all whom we encounter.

Please remember the parish in your prayers, especially the sick and the suffering, your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace.

Eucharist is the true body and blood of Christ for the nourishment of the soul.

Explaining the Catholic belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist can be done in a simple and age-appropriate manner.

1. **Start with basics:** Catholics believe that Jesus is truly present in a special way during the celebration of the Mass.

2. **Use Simple Language:** Break down the concept using simple language that others can understand. You can say something like, "Just like how Jesus was with his disciples long ago, we believe he is still with us today in a special way when we gather to pray."

3. **Bread and Wine:** During Mass, the priest takes bread and wine and asks God to bless them. We, as Catholics, believe something miraculous happens during this part of the Mass.

4. **Transformation:** Through the power of God, the bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Jesus. Even though it still looks like bread and wine, we believe that Jesus is truly there with us under the appearance of bread and wine.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

3rd Sunday of Easter

When I was a kid, a friend at my home parish told me, "If you get to Mass by the Gospel reading, it counts!" As a lifelong late-arriver, it's something I have told myself many times, especially in my earlier years as a Catholic. If the "it counts" is justifiable on a pathetically minimal scale of liturgical legalism, then the Gospel reading today shows how insanely wrong-headed it is, and how helpful it is to re -think the Mass in its light.

The famous "Road to Emmaus" story recounts, on that first Sunday of the Resurrection, the basic two-fold structure of the Mass: *Word*, followed by *Eucharist*. Jesus spends a significant period of time with two dismayed disciples, as he connects a wide swath of the Hebrew scriptures with his own suffering, death, and resurrection. They would later report that this Liturgy of the Word touched their hearts with an inexplicable fire. This Word-induced flame alone is what leads the two disciples to discover Jesus' presence in the "breaking of the bread."

With this in mind, how can we possibly think that the Liturgy of the Word is unnecessary or incidental? The two disciples needed the Scriptures explained to them in order to experience Jesus alive in the eucharistic breaking of bread. Sure, we say, but they had the Risen Jesus. But that's precisely the point: Jesus is risen and accompanies us in both parts of the Mass. Imagine how much our experience of Jesus in the Eucharist would deepen if we (preachers and listeners) took even more seriously that Jesus himself sets our hearts ablaze with his Word *so that* we know him in the Eucharist. That Word-induced fire counts, too!

Readings for Third Sunday of Easter

Reading I Acts of the Apostles 3:13-15, 17-19

Peter said to the people: "The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and denied in Pilate's presence when he had decided to release him. You denied the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you. The author of life you put to death, but God raised him from the dead; of this we are witnesses. Now I know, brothers, that you acted out of ignorance, just as your leaders did; but God has thus brought to fulfillment what he had announced beforehand through the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer. Repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away."

Reading II

1 John 2:1-5a

My children, I am writing this to you so that you may not commit sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous one. He is explation for our sins, and not for our sins only but for those of the whole world. That we may be sure that we know him is to keep his commandments. Those who say, "I know him," but do not keep his commandments are liars, and the truth is not in them. But whoever keeps his word, the love of God is truly perfected in him.

Gospel Luke 24:35-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP How to Fail Your Way to Heaven

You know what are some of my favorite moments in Scripture? The little "Easter eggs" of Jesus' humanity, things like Jesus falling asleep, Jesus drawing in the sand, Jesus playing with kids. And how about Jesus rising from the dead, appearing to his disciples and saying, "So, have you got anything to eat?"

It's right for us to always keep in mind that Jesus is God. But we also have to remember that he was man. He got hungry. He cried when he felt sad and laughed when he felt happy. He got tired. He got bored.

Because he was God, none of those feelings ever led him into sin, like they do us. He never spent a car ride trying to pass the hours by seeing how annoyed he could make his older sister. He never smacked Peter over the head for saying something really stupid. But he did unleash some Biblically righteous anger on those traders in the temple, didn't he? And he wasn't shy about calling Peter "a Satan" when his friend tempted him to take the easy way out.

It's the tightrope walk we all try to balance every day, honoring our human emotions while still answering God's call to be better. Being perfect isn't the domain of the Christian — that's the domain of Christ only. Trying and failing, then trying again (and failing again) and again and again? That's the domain of the Christian.



Third Sunday of Easter


The themes linked in today's Scripture readings encourage us to avoid sin by following the Lord's directives, to repent, and to seek forgiveness. St. Peter, in the Acts of the Apostles, reminds the people, and us, of God's glorification of Christ's passion and death, and that through repentance and conversion, our sins be wiped away. St. John, in his First Letter, tells us that Jesus is an offering for our sins. In St. Luke's Gospel, Jesus appears to His disciples after His Resurrection while two of them recount their encounter with Jesus on the road to Emmaus. They finally recognize Him in the breaking of the bread. The Church has long taught that partaking of the Eucharist strengthens us on our journey as Christ's disciples. Likewise, participating in the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the forgiveness of sins opens us to Christ's grace, bringing us closer to Him, giving us peace in our lives. This week, go to confession and receive Holy Communion to draw into union with Christ.

Pretzel Jello

FIRST LAYER: 1 1/2 c. crushed pretzels 4 tbsp. sugar 3/4 c. melted margarine SECOND LAYER: 1 (8oz.) pkg. cream cheese 1 c. sugar 8 oz. ctn. Cool Whip THIRD LAYER: 6 oz. pkg. strawberry Jello 1 3/4 c. water 10 oz. pkg. frozen strawberries, without juice

Combine all first layer ingredients and spread into 9x13 inch pan. Bake for 10 minutes in a preheat 400 F oven; cool. Cream together cream cheese and sugar. Then fold in Cool Whip. Spread over cooled pretzel layer. Be sure to spread over the entire pan to seal the edges. This is to ensure the Jello won't seep through. Slightly that the strawberries, slice and put aside. Combine Jello and boiling water until Jello is dissolved. Gently pour over cream layer. Evenly distribute sliced strawberries over layer; refrigerate.
