4TH SUNDAY OF EASTER

“This is why the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again.” - Jn 10:17

Notes from Fr. Steve

During the Easter season we hear each week from the Acts of the Apostles. "Acts" was written by St. Luke, the same Luke who wrote the Gospel of St. Luke. In Acts, Luke is so moved by the activity of the Holy Spirit. What we have in Acts, is essentially his diary. With that in mind, here is an explanation of the first reading, we heard at Mass.

Acts 4:8-12 captures a pivotal moment in the early Christian movement, showcasing the courage, conviction, and unwavering faith of the apostles Peter and John. This passage not only highlights the confrontational nature of their encounter with the religious authorities but also underscores the central message of salvation through Jesus Christ.

Verse 8: "Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: 'Rulers and elders of the people!'"

Peter, empowered by the Holy Spirit, stands fearlessly before the rulers and elders of the Jewish people. This moment signifies a profound transformation in Peter, who, once timid and prone to denial, now boldly proclaims the truth of Christ. The Holy Spirit empowers believers to speak with authority and conviction, demonstrating the divine guidance that accompanies faithful witness.

Verse 9: "If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a man who was lame and are being asked how he was healed."

Peter directly addresses the accusation brought against them, highlighting the absurdity of being questioned for performing a compassionate deed. Their actions, driven by love and compassion, become a testament to the transformative power of Christ's love. The healing of the lame man serves as a tangible demonstration of the authority and presence of Jesus among His followers.

Verse 10-11: "Then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed. Jesus is 'the stone you builders rejected, which has become the cornerstone.'

In these verses, Peter boldly declares the source of their power and authority: Jesus Christ. Despite facing opposition and persecution, Peter fearlessly proclaims the resurrection of Jesus Christ, emphasizing His victory over death and His role as the cornerstone of the Christian faith. The rejection of Jesus by the religious leaders parallels the rejection of the cornerstone in construction, yet God's plan unfolds despite human resistance.

Verse 12: "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved."

This powerful declaration in the Acts of the Apostles is the essence of Christian Theology: salvation is found through Jesus Christ alone. Peter's words affirm the exclusivity of Christ as the Savior of humanity, emphasizing the foundational truth of the Christian faith. The apostles' unwavering commitment to proclaiming this message underscores the urgency of salvation, extending God's grace to all who believe. So that all might be saved.

In conclusion, Acts 4:8-12 serves as a poignant reminder of the transformative power of faith and witness. Through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, believers are emboldened to proclaim the truth of Christ fearlessly, regardless of opposition or persecution. The passage highlights the centrality of Jesus Christ in the Christian faith, emphasizing His role as the source of salvation for all humanity. As modern-day followers of Christ, may we draw inspiration from the apostles' example and boldly proclaim the gospel message to a world in need of hope and redemption. The Risen Lord is just as active in the community of believers as he was in the early community.

And then, as now, salvation comes from Jesus Christ!

I want to congratulate all of the young adults who were presented with the Timothy Award last weekend by Bishop Fisher. The award is given to young adults who have shown outstanding leadership qualities in the Church.

Please remember the parish in your prayers, especially the sick and the suffering, your prayers bring them healing, comfort, and hope!

JWJ Catholic Academy Eucharistic Revival Handbook Part 2




Eucharist is the true body and blood of Christ for the nourishment of the soul.

5. Jesus' Love: Jesus loves us so much that he wants to be close to us in this special way. When we receive Communion, we are receiving Jesus himself into our hearts.

6. Encourage Questions: It's okay to have questions about this belief and you are encouraged to ask them. If family members or parents can't answer your questions, ask a leader at the church or even the priest or deacon.

7. Practical Application: How can you respond to this belief? Prepare your hearts to receive Jesus. Approach the Eucharist with reverence and love. Reverence is regarding something with respect or a profound emotion inspired by God.

8. Reinforcement: Reinforce the concept of the Real Presence through stories from the Bible and the words of the Last Supper: "This is my body," "This is my blood," "Do this in remembrance of me." You can also reinforce the concept through participation in the Mass, receiving Communion and through other Catholic rituals.

Readings for Fourth Sunday of Easter

Reading I

Acts of the Apostles 4:8-12

Peter filled with the Holy Spirit, said: “Leaders of the people and elders: If we are being examined today about a good deed done to a cripple, namely, by what means he was saved, then all of you and all the people of Israel should know that it was in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazorean whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead; in his name this man stands before you healed. He is *the stone rejected by you, the builders, which has become the cornerstone*. There is no salvation through anyone else, nor is there any other name under heaven given to the human race by which we are to be saved.”

Reading II

1 John 3:1-2

Beloved: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God’s children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed. We know that when it is revealed we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

Gospel

John 10:11-18

Jesus said: “I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. A hired man, who is not a shepherd and whose sheep are not his own, sees a wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away, and the wolf catches and scatters them. This is because he works for pay and has no concern for the sheep. I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I will lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. These also I must lead, and they will hear my voice, and there will be one flock, one shepherd. This is why the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down on my own. I have power to lay it down, and power to take it up again. This command I have received from my Father.”

Everyday Stewardship

During the Easter season, we reflect on being followers of the stone that the builders rejected, the crucified and risen Jesus. Like a shepherd he leads us by his voice that echoes throughout the centuries and remains real and effective even in our modern world. To be his disciple means to risk rejection in a similar way as he experienced. The shepherd will not lead his lambs into danger, but there is danger all around us regardless.

Everyday Stewardship can be something we talk about in the abstract or a way of living we simply wish we could follow. It can be an imperfect reality that at times places us in direct conflict with the world. As we decrease and Jesus increases in us, many will be drawn to the love and compassion that flows through us. However, some will see us for fools and will suggest we are ridiculous. Cultivating our gifts for God's sake and the total surrender of all we possess and have become to God is not wise in some eyes. Either they think we are crazy, or, just maybe at times, the example of our lives causes them to question their own values.

If you give a little, you will be admired. If you give a lot, you will be celebrated. If you give it all, you can be rejected. Not everyone will have this negative reaction. Some will see your example and will seek to do the same. They will then join you in following the shepherd. They will become a true sign of Jesus Christ to the world. But their conversion of heart begins with you and your example.

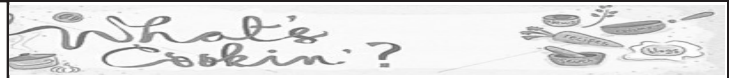

Chicken Parmigiano

- 12 boned chicken breasts
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 c. butter
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 1/2 c. Italian bread crumbs
- 2 (8 oz.) cans tomato sauce
- 12 slices Mozzarella cheese
- 6 tbsp. Parmesan cheese

Pound chicken breasts flat. Dip into egg with salt and pepper. Roll in crumbs and Parmesan cheese mixture. Brown in butter. Place in baking dish and layer Mozzarella cheese over them. Pour sauce over top. Bake at 350 F for 45 minutes to 1 hour. Serves 8 to 10.

Fourth Sunday of Easter

In St. John’s Gospel, Jesus proclaims, *I am the Good Shepherd*, giving us the beautiful image of Him as a shepherd attending to us, His flock. In contrast to the hired hand that bolts at the first sign of trouble, Jesus will never desert His flock. However, he is concerned for *other sheep that do not belong to his fold*. St. Peter, in the Acts of the Apostles, reminds us that *there is no salvation through anyone else* but Christ. In St. John’s First Letter, he affirms that we are *children of God* through the great love of the Father for us. And yet, he observes that the world does not know Him. Evangelization is the consistent theme in these readings. One way to take the Catholic faith to the streets is to join a local St. Paul Street Evangelization team, or to volunteer at a local soup kitchen or homeless shelter serving our less fortunate brothers and sisters.

Marriage:

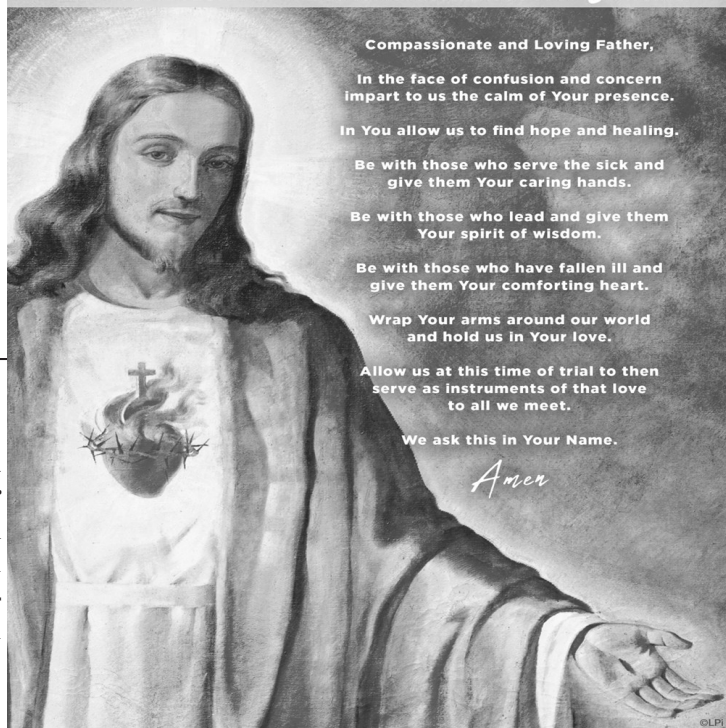
