Notes from Fr. Steve

As the liturgical calendar brings us into the season of Advent, a period of joyful anticipation and reflection, Christians around the world engage in a spiritual journey marked by hope, peace, joy, and love. Please remember in your Advent prayers to pray for the sick and the suffering, your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace. Come Lord Jesus!!



Advent Scripture Reflection First Sunday in Advent

Today's Scripture passages express the Advent topics of hope, vigilance, and repentance. From the Book of Isaiah, the prophet expresses his desire for his people (the ancient Israelites who have returned from Babylonian exile) to atone for their sinful ways and turn their hearts back to the Lord. For God has done great deeds for them. In St. Mark's Gospel, the evangelist quotes Jesus' warning to his disciples, Be watchful! Be alert! You don't know when the time will come. Here our Lord and Savior is referring to when He will return at the end of time. St. Paul reminds the Corinthians, and us, that our fellowship in the Lord fortifies us with many spiritual gifts-a timely reminder as we start this Advent season. May we, as faith-filled stewards, put our hope and trust in the Lord, recognize our sins, and seek with contrite hearts, Jesus' mercy and forgiveness. Advent is an excellent time to confess our sins by taking part in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

The Catholic Church places a significant emphasis on the role of music in the liturgy, particularly during the celebration of the Mass. Music is considered an integral part of the worship experience, and its purpose is multifaceted, aiming to enhance the sacred atmosphere, support the liturgical actions, and facilitate the congregation's active participation. Here are some key aspects of Catholic teaching on the purpose of music at Mass:

1. **Worship and Praise:** Music is seen as a means of expressing praise and adoration to God. Through hymns, chants, and other musical elements, the faithful can unite their voices in giving glory to God and acknowledging His majesty.
2. **Enhancement of Liturgy:** Music is intended to enhance the overall liturgical experience. It adds a dimension of beauty and solemnity to the Mass, helping to create a reverent atmosphere conducive to prayer and reflection.
3. **Scriptural Basis:** Many elements of Catholic liturgical music draw inspiration directly from the Bible. Psalms, in particular, have been traditionally sung during Mass, connecting the liturgy to the rich scriptural tradition of the Church.
4. **Facilitating Participation:** The Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) emphasized the importance of active participation by the congregation in the liturgy. Music is seen as a tool to engage the faithful more fully in the Mass, encouraging them to sing, respond, and actively take part in the worship.
5. **Unity and Communion:** Music helps to foster a sense of unity among the worshipping community. By singing together, the congregation expresses its unity in faith and communion with one another. The communal aspect of music contributes to a sense of belonging and shared identity among the faithful.
6. **Reflecting Liturgical Seasons and Themes:** The choice of music often corresponds to the liturgical season or theme of a particular Mass. For example, during Advent, there may be a focus on anticipation and preparation, reflected in the choice of hymns and chants.
7. **Sacramental Significance:** Music is considered a sacramental, a means through which God's grace is mediated. It can deepen the experience of the liturgy and help individuals connect more profoundly with the sacramental actions taking place during the Mass.
8. **Artistic Expression:** While the primary purpose of liturgical music is worship, it also serves as a form of artistic expression. The beauty of music contributes to the overall aesthetic dimension of the liturgy.

It's important to note that different cultural and regional traditions within the Catholic Church may influence the styles and forms of music used in worship, reflecting the diversity of the global Church while adhering to the principles outlined by the Church authorities. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) and other documents provide guidelines for the appropriate use of music in the Roman Catholic liturgy.

The processional hymn in a Catholic Mass serves several important purposes:

1. **Liturgical Entrance:** The processional hymn is typically sung or played as the clergy, altar servers, and other liturgical ministers enter the church and process down the main aisle to the sanctuary. This hymn marks the beginning of the worship service and creates a solemn and reverent atmosphere.
2. **Liturgical Season or Theme:** The choice of the processional hymn often reflects the liturgical season or a specific theme related to the Mass. For example, during Advent or Lent, the hymn may have themes of preparation and penance, while during joyful seasons like Easter, the hymn may celebrate the resurrection of Christ.
3. **Gathering and Unifying the Congregation:** The processional hymn is an opportunity for the entire congregation to come together in song, expressing a communal spirit of worship. It helps to unify the assembly in a shared musical expression of praise and devotion.
4. **Invocation of the Holy Spirit:** In some cases, the processional hymn may include an invocation of the Holy Spirit, asking for guidance, inspiration, and the presence of God as the worship service begins.
5. **Preparation for the Liturgy of the Word:** The processional hymn sets the tone for the Liturgy of the Word, which follows the entrance procession. It helps to transition the congregation from the gathering phase of the Mass to the proclamation of the Scriptures.
6. **Sacred Atmosphere:** The hymn contributes to the creation of a sacred and worshipful atmosphere within the church. It engages the senses and helps participants focus their minds and hearts on the sacred mysteries being celebrated in the Mass.

In summary, the processional hymn in a Catholic Mass serves as a significant element in the liturgical celebration, helping to mark the beginning of the Mass, set the tone for the worship, and unite the congregation in a communal expression of faith through music.

Reading I

Isaiah 63:16b-17, 19b; 64:2-7

You, LORD, are our father, our redeemer you are named forever. Why do you let us wander, O LORD, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not? Return for our sake of your servants, the tribes of your heritage. Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down, with the mountains quaking before you, while you wrought awesome deeds we could not hope for, such as they have not heard of from of old. No ear has ever heard, no eye ever seen, any God but you doing such deeds for those who wait for him. Would that you might meet us doing right, that we were mindful of you in our ways! Behold, you are angry, and we are sinful; all of us have become like unclean people, all our good deeds are like polluted rags; we have all withered like leaves, and our guilt carries us away like the wind. There is none who calls upon your name, who rouses himself to cling to you; for you have hidden your face from us and have delivered us up to your guilt. Yet, O LORD, you are our father; we are the clay and you the potter: we are all the work of your hands.

Reading II

1 Corinthians 1:3-9

Brothers and sisters: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always on your account for the grace of God bestowed on you in Christ Jesus, that in him you were enriched in every way, with all discourse and all knowledge, as the testimony to Christ was confirmed among you, so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will keep you firm to the end, irreproachable on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful, and by him you were called to fellowship with his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Mark 13:33-37

Jesus said to his disciples: "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come. It is like a man traveling abroad. He leaves home and places his servants in charge, each with his own work, and orders the gatekeeper to be on the watch. Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming, whether in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or in the morning. May he not come suddenly and find you sleeping. What I say to you, I say to all; 'Watch!'"



GOSPEL MEDITATION

1st Sunday of Advent

Lately I’ve been listening to a science-based podcast on healthy daily living. The host frequently discusses the wide range of health benefits of sleep. So, each night I’m trying to get more, and better, slumber, and it’s helping me feel energized. So, why in the world should we follow Christ’s advice this week? **“Watch therefore, for you do not know when the master of the house will come ... lest he find you asleep.”** Isn’t sleep, especially at midnight and cockcrow, a good thing?

Of course, it is. But the wakefulness the Lord calls us to is a deep, personal orientation to Him. A nightly vigil is therefore a metaphor for this, but it’s not just that. We should give up real sleep in order to pray, too. This difficult practice is a time-tested way to foster wakefulness of heart. When we give up sleep to pray, it focuses us. We learn that life is not an endless series of days. You and I belong to the Lord — awake or asleep, in life and in death. Sooner or later, even our need for our physical sleep will pass away. And our attentiveness to God — that is, whether we are awaiting Him to meet us — will be all that matters.

May I challenge us this week and this Advent to intentionally give up at least one hour of sleep each week for prayer? Stay up later, wake up in the middle of the night, or an hour earlier, and pray. Will we be a bit more tired the next day? Yes. But we’ll be amazed at the spiritual wakefulness that results, too.

Sugar, vegetable oil, crackers, canned fruit, small ketchup, small mustard and small syrup.



Chicken and Sausage Stir-Fry

- 2 to 3 garlic cloves
- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 3 or 4 c. green peppers
- 2 tsp. red wine vinegar
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 2 lbs. Italian Sausage
- 2 lbs. boneless, skinless chicken
- Favorite pasta, cooked to directions
- 1/2 lb. sliced mushrooms (optional)
- 2 onions
- 1 c. chicken broth

Brown garlic in olive oil 2 to 3 minutes. Sauté diced/sliced peppers and onions 3 to 5 minutes. Add spices and optional mushrooms. Cover and simmer with 1 cup of broth. Separately cook sausage and chicken. Add everything to casserole (2 quart) dish; mix will. Serve over favorite pasta.

Note: Include juices from sausage and chicken.
