Pentecost Season - July, 2021

From the Senior Warden

Very little has been normal in our lives since the beginning of the pandemic. Clearly, this includes our lives at Trinity. As you know, our expenses – assessments to the Diocese of Bethlehem, insurance, utilities, maintenance and upkeep, taxes, administrative costs and most of our budgeted expenses – continue with or without Sunday services. I thank everyone for hearing our plea and continuing to ensure pledges are kept current.

But, we can't plan for the unexpected: In 2020 the rectory chimney had to be rebuilt and the church boiler had to be replaced. The vestry withdrew funds from our Diocesan Investment Trust accounts (DIT) to cover the \$16,405 total. Fortunately, we were awarded grants from The Society of the Episcopal Church for the Advancement of Christianity in Pennsylvania (hereafter referred to as The Long Name Society, or LNS). Those grants covered all but \$3300 of the expense so we were able to put most of the money back into the DIT. Our investments in the DIT are not large, but we do depend on the interest earned for part of our operating budget.

We discovered this spring that there is a need for some repointing around the lower portion of the stone walls of the church. The mason who did such excellent work on the chimney has estimated around \$6,000 for repairs, which should be done soon. In addition, major leakage during a recent storm indicated the need to replace the rectory roof. We knew this roof was nearing the end of its useful life, but we were hoping it could be stretched a couple of years. The roof

and gutters were replaced in early June at a cost of \$16,350. Now, we find that the north-facing church roof will need replacement soon. We are seeking estimates. Thankfully, the south-facing roof is in good condition having been more recently replaced. To date we have drawn just under \$30,000 from the DIT to cover these expenses.

We will again apply for a grant from The Long Name Society this fall, but there are no guarantees that any funds will be awarded.

Obviously depleting our DIT funds means that we will earn much less interest — interest we use for our operating budget. To make a long story short, it would be great if we could replace at least some of the funds withdrawn from the DIT to insure there is not a shortfall of operating income.

So here's an idea. Some of us really needed that stimulus money which was part of the Covid recovery package and some of us saw it as a windfall. If you were part of the latter group, would you consider donating a portion of that to help Trinity's financial stability in the wake of all these unexpected expenses? If you can see your way clear, please make out the check to Trinity Athens marked "roof replacement" in the memo line.

I am grateful for the vestry's excellent efforts to be good stewards of the buildings entrusted to us by those who came before.



• Sign up to host a coffee hour. You'll have help with making coffee; your job will be to provide

 Become a lector. You can be scheduled to read the Old Testament lesson, or, as a Worship Leader, the Prayers of the People, the Epistle, and, when we are allowed to again, serve the chalice at communion. If you're interested in becoming a Worship Leader (Lay Reader), training is available.

- Altar Guild. Those who take part in this quiet ministry set up and/or take down the altar for worship, prepare linens, polish brass (although that's usually a group event), order flowers, or arrange offerings from their own gardens, and generally make certain all is ready for worship. Training will be provided.
- **Gardening.** Our resident gardener would love some help. Maybe you have some better ideas for how our memorial garden is arranged, or maybe you like to weed (it's very therapeutic).

If you're interested in any of these areas or in something not on this list, speak to a member of the vestry or to Barbara, our parish administrator.

Prayer List — we are still rebuilding the prayer list after our long hiatus from corporate worship. Please add or subtract names; the list is on the back table in the church.

Birthday/Anniversary List — make sure you and your family members are listed. It is regularly updated, so please check it for accuracy — add or edit as needed.
