Further Down the Rabbit Hole

A Rumination by Fr. Ben Lentz

I have found that retirement, isolation, and a wet Spring (keeping me from cutting the lawn as often as I'd like) have provided me with the opportunity to do research and study that have frequently been left to the back burner. Subtly encouraged by a newsletter editor who shall remain nameless, I began researching and contemplating Trinitarian Heresies.

There are two primary heresies involving the doctrine of the Trinity: Modalism and Arianism (not to be confused with Aryanism and the Nazis). There are however, many derivations of these two primary heresies: Sabellianism, Docetism, and Socianism (not to be confused with socialism) to name only a few.

Don't stop reading yet. I'm not going to try to deal with all of them!

Although it's always dangerous to attempt to distill a heresy down to a sentence or two, that's never stopped me before. I live for danger, at least theologically.

Modalism collapses the three persons of the Godhead into one person. God is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, but not simultaneously. In other words, at one point in history God was the Father, then switched to being the Son, and now is the Holy Spirit. A pictorial representation of modalism:

As delicious as it appears, Modalism treats the Trinity as sort of a divine schizophrenia. Since Modalism does not allow

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for an eternal fellowship between Father, Son, and Spirit, it is considered by the Church to be a heresy.

Arianism claims that Jesus is God's greatest creation and therefore rules over all of creation. A pictorial representation of Arianism (not Aryanism, well maybe): As enticing as this is, it does mean that Jesus is not truly God because he's still only a creation of the divine, thus declared a heresy.



I must admit that after having to preach on Trinity Sunday for 40+ years, some of my earlier illustrative examples of the Trinity most likely dipped into the heresy pool (by accident, of course). It is because being three in one is not humanly possible. Therefore God can't be three in one. And when we try to figure out how a triune God could be possible, up pop the heresies.

The basis for all heresy is that humanity (the created) struggles to force God to act and be restricted by the same rules confining humanity. It doesn't seem fair that God doesn't have to abide by the same rules that we must follow, but that's what God does.

The Trinity is akin to the proverbial paradigm: Can God make a rock so big he can't move it? Answer: Yes, because God is not bound by the temporal human imagination.

So if God's way of being God is to be Father, Son, and Holy Spirit simultaneously from all and for all eternity, perfectly complete in a triune fellowship of love then that's the way it is. We must accept it on faith, using it as a starting point for talking about God. When attempting to discourse about an unfathomable divinity, it always takes a basis of faith.

That's the story of Job. In a nut-shell, God says: "Trust me."

Trinity Sunday



We celebrate our name-day this weekend, beginning the service with the very familiar hymn, *Holy*, *Holy*, *Holy*! It was written by a parish vicar, Reginald Heber, for Trinity Sunday. In the early 1800s the only music sung was from the Psalter, and usually badly. He wrote over 100 hymns in an effort

to improve the singing in his small parish. The text reflects both the *Sanctus* and Revelation 4:1-11. The music was written by John Bacchus Dykes in 1861, after Heber's death. He named the tune *Nicaea*, after the First Council of Nicaea in 325, which formalized the doctrine of the Trinity. It is a tune we all know and which has opportunities for rich harmony, so sing it with gusto!

How Many??

Speaking of the Trinity, there is going to be a contest of sorts: how many representations of the Trinity are there in and on our church building? This will include everything - windows, pews, wood trim, etc. Look around and start counting and we'll compare notes and publish the findings in our next newsletter, which, hopefully, will also include the updated pamphlet created in the 90s about the symbols in our church building. we'll plan to do that next year. The Shasta daisies will bloom soon, in the meantime the zinnias are struggling, between the hard frost we had and the voles, they've had a bad time. However, it's warm

now and coffee grounds and cayenne pepper have discouraged the critters, so they will fill in the area between the daisies and other annuals. We'll be slowly adding new plants as the daffodil greens die backalyssum and dahlias are also on the list. The peonies are at their peak this week, although fewer than previous years and they also were affected by the freeze and current very hot temperatures. Worship is Sundays at 10 a.m. followed by coffee hour in the parish hall, which is located across South Main Street.

Our services are Holy Eucharist II. Our worship is enrichened by Fr. Ben's exceptional sermons as well as a variety of music and musicians.

Sunday, June 4 - Trinity Sunday, our Name Day. We will begin the service with the traditional hymn for the day, *Holy, Holy, Holy!* We will also switch to our summer service music from *Wonder, Love and Praise.*Come celebrate!

Sunday, June 25 - Vestry meets after coffee hour.

Help is needed:

- **Sign up to host a coffee hour.** You'll have help with making coffee; your job will be to provide snacks. We'll be grateful for anything, from crackers to cake and anything in between.
- Become a lector. You can be scheduled to read the Old Testament lesson. Since we have resumed offering the chalice, you can be trained as a Chalice Bearer. To become a Worship Leader (Lay Reader) further training and licensing is required

- to lead public worship. That training is available and if you'd like to learn more, speak to Fr. Ben or Barbara Caum, Doug Plank, Marny Gerhart, or Dan Gerhart.
- Altar Guild. Those who take part in this quiet ministry set up and/or take down the altar for worship, prepare linens, polish brass (although that's usually a group event), order flowers, or arrange offerings from their own gardens, and make certain all is ready for worship. Training will be provided.
- **Gardening.** Our resident gardener would love some help. See p. 2.
