Stress Management

Stress and depression can ruin your holidays and hurt your health. Being realistic, planning ahead and seeking support can help ward off stress and depression

The holiday season often brings unwelcome guests — stress and depression. And it's no wonder. The holidays present a dizzying array of demands — parties, shopping, baking, cleaning and entertaining, to name just a few.

But with some practical tips, you can minimize the stress that accompanies the holidays. You may even end up enjoying the holidays more than you thought you would.

Tips to prevent holiday stress and depression

When stress is at its peak, it's hard to stop and regroup. Try to prevent stress and depression in the first place, especially if the holidays have taken an emotional toll on you in the past.

- 1. Acknowledge your feelings. If someone close to you has recently died or you can't be with loved ones, realize that it's normal to feel sadness and grief. It's OK to take time to cry or express your feelings. You can't force yourself to be happy just because it's the holiday season.
- **2. Reach out.** If you feel lonely or isolated, seek out community, religious or other social events. They can offer support and companionship. Volunteering your time to help others also is a good way to lift your spirits and broaden your friendships.
- 3. **Be realistic.** The holidays don't have to be perfect or just like last year. As families change and grow, traditions and rituals often change as well. Choose a few to hold on to, and be open to creating new ones. For example, if your adult children can't come to your house, find new ways to celebrate together, such as sharing pictures, emails or videos.
- 4. **Set aside differences.** Try to accept family members and friends as they are, even if they don't live up to all of your expectations. Set aside grievances until a more appropriate

time for discussion. And be understanding if others get upset or distressed when something goes awry. Chances are they're feeling the effects of holiday stress and depression, too.

5. **Stick to a budget.** Before you go gift and food shopping, decide how much money you can afford to spend. Then stick to your budget. Don't try to buy happiness with an avalanche of gifts.

Try these alternatives:

- o Donate to a charity in someone's name.
- o Give homemade gifts.
- o Start a family gift exchange.
- 6. **Plan ahead.** Set aside specific days for shopping, baking, visiting friends and other activities. Plan your menus and then make your shopping list. That'll help prevent last-minute scrambling to buy forgotten ingredients. And make sure to line up help for party prep and cleanup.
- 7. Learn to say no. Saying yes when you should say no can leave you feeling resentful and overwhelmed. Friends and colleagues will understand if you can't participate in every project or activity. If it's not possible to say no when your boss asks you to work overtime, try to remove something else from your agenda to make up for the lost time.
- 8. **Don't abandon healthy habits.** Don't let the holidays become a free-for-all. Overindulgence only adds to your stress and guilt.

Try these suggestions:

- o Have a healthy snack before holiday parties so that you don't go overboard on sweets, cheese or drinks.
- o Get plenty of sleep.
- o Incorporate regular physical activity into each day.
- 9. Take a breather. Make some time for yourself. Spending just 15 minutes alone, without distractions, may refresh you enough to handle everything you need to do. Find something that reduces stress by clearing your mind, slowing your breathing and restoring inner calm.

Some options may include:

o Taking a walk at night and stargazing.

- o Listening to soothing music.
- o Getting a massage.
- o Reading a book.
- 10. Seek professional help if you need it. Despite your best efforts, you may find yourself feeling persistently sad or anxious, plagued by physical complaints, unable to sleep, irritable and hopeless, and unable to face routine chores. If these feelings last for a while, talk to your doctor or a mental health professional.

Take control of the holidays

Don't let the holidays become something you dread. Instead, take steps to prevent the stress and depression that can descend during the holidays. Learn to recognize your holiday triggers, such as financial pressures or personal demands, so you can combat them before they lead to a meltdown. With a little planning and some positive thinking, you can find peace and joy during the holidays.

Treasurer's Report Sonia L Hunt



Thank you to all the Chapter Treasurer's for providing your chapter 990 information. All information for the Chapters and State have been forwarded to NALS to show that we are 100% compliant with our filings with the IRS.

Just wanted to take an opportunity to let you know about a few cybersecurity things that are happening.

- 1. I did have a chapter contact me to indicate that they had been receiving emails from the IRS about their 990 filing not have been done. Please know that the IRS will not contact you by email. If you receive these emails, please report them to phishing@irs.gov. Do not open them or click on any links under any circumstance as they could contain a ransom malware.
- 2. There is currently a "Tokenization Scam" where fraudsters spoof the phone numbers of wellknown companies or organizations and then call gain access consumers to to information. They will identify themselves as a representative from the company and ask the victims to verify a transaction that has supposedly been attempted on their account. To deny the transaction and protect from future fraud, the fraudster says the victim must read out a code they will be provided to confirm their card. The fraudster, who has actually already stolen the victim's card, then enrolls the card in Apple Pay or Samsung Pay which generates a passcode to the victim. When the victim reads the code to the fraudster, the fraudster enrolls the stolen debit card in Apple Pay or Samsung Pay and starts using the card to make fraudulent If you receive such a call and it purchases. sounds suspicious, hang up and call the organization at the phone listed on their website.
- 3. Credit Card Skimming + "Confirming" CVV is another currently active scam in the Southeast. This scam occurs when a skimmer has been installed on a gas pump or vending machine in order to steal debit card information. The skimmers will allow criminals to steal the card numbers. They then spoof the bank phone number and make a call to potential victims claiming to be a bank representative to obtain

the CVV code on the bank of the card. They convince the victims that the CVV code is needed to freeze the account since it has been compromised. By providing the CVV Code to the criminals, you have now given them an active card that can be used to make purchases, withdraw money and sell things on the black market. Please know that your banking institution will never need the CVV Code on the back of your debit or credit card to access or service your account. If you receive a call from your bank or card company and it sounds suspicious, hang up and call the organization using the known customer service number.

With the upcoming Holiday Season, we all need to remain more vigilant in what we do to protect ourselves and our firms.

NALS Foundation Winter Report Jan W. Berger, ALP









What a wonderful summer and fall the Lowcountry has had! Our chapter has busy learning, growing, and planning.






