The superstition surrounding Friday the 13th has a complex and somewhat murky set of origins, with various factors contributing to its reputation as an unlucky day. Here are some key elements that have contributed to the lore surrounding Friday the 13th:

1. The Number 13: The fear of the number 13, known as triskaidekaphobia, is ancient and widespread. It has been associated with bad luck in many cultures for centuries. Loki, the trickster god, was not invited but crashed the party, making the total number of guests 13. It's said that this led to chaos and a tragic outcome, thus contributing to the negative connotations of the number 13.
3. Christian Influence: Another theory relates the superstition to Christian traditions. Some believe that the Last Supper, where Jesus and his 12 disciples gathered, occurred on a Thursday evening and led to his crucifixion on a Friday, making Friday a day of ill omen. Additionally, the idea that there were 13 individuals present at the Last Supper added to the superstition surrounding the number.
4. Historical Events: There are also various historical events and occurrences that have contributed to the superstition surrounding Friday the 13th, such as the arrest and execution of the Knights Templar on Friday, October 13, 1307, by King Philip IV of France. This event is often cited as one of the origins of the fear of Friday the 13th.

It's important to note that these are all theories and legends that have contributed to the superstition surrounding Friday the 13th. Over time, these various elements have combined to create a general sense of unease and superstition associated with this date, leading to the popular belief that it's an unlucky day. Today, many people still avoid making major decisions or engaging in significant activities on Friday the 13th due to these historical and cultural associations.



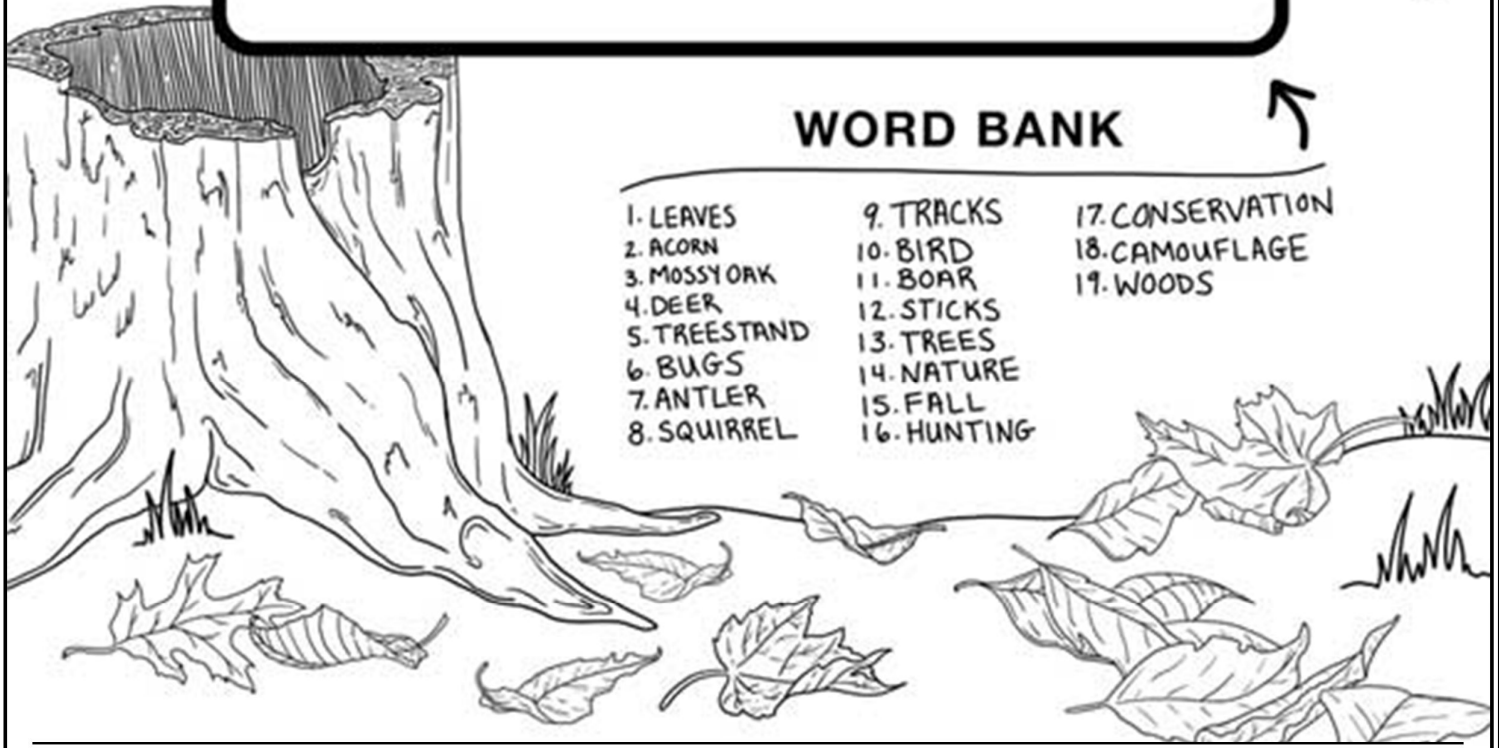

Lewis County lifts restrictions on outdoor burning effective Oct. 9

CHEHALIS – Outdoor burn restrictions on land in unincorporated Lewis County will be lifted at 12:01 a.m. Monday, Oct. 9.

After careful review of the current and extended weather forecast, Lewis County Fire Marshal Doyle Sanford has determined that current weather conditions within Lewis County have improved and outdoor burning will be permitted, subject to an open burning application and approved permit.

"I strongly urge all county residents and property owners to be attentive to the condition of their properties through proactive fire prevention measures," said Sanford. "Always have fire-extinguishing equipment readily available and supervise all outdoor fires until they're completely out."

The Lewis County Fire Marshal works closely with Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR), local fire districts and local fire departments to remind citizens that outdoor burning is restricted to only natural vegetation from the burn site. The burning of garbage, paper or other refuse is always strictly prohibited. To obtain an Open Burning Application and Permit, you may apply online at <https://burnpermit.lewiscountywa.gov/> or in person at the Lewis County Fire Marshal's office at 2025 NE Kresky Ave. in Chehalis.

The burning of debris in city limits and urban growth areas is prohibited at all times.

Refer to DNR for restrictions applying to outdoor burning conducted on state-protected forestlands throughout Washington, which includes state parks, by clicking the link: www.dnr.wa.gov/burn-restrictions.

The burn status will remain in effect until modified or rescinded by the Lewis County Board of County Commissioners. A public announcement of any modifications will be released at that time.

To stay up-to-date on burn restrictions, you can call the 24-hour automated information line at 360-740-1133.


