



Halloween, as we know it today, has evolved from a rich tapestry of traditions that date back centuries. Its origins can be traced to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, celebrated in what is now Ireland, the United Kingdom, and northern France. Samhain marked the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter, a time when the boundary between the living and the dead was believed to blur. It was a time for bonfires, feasting, and divination to ward off malevolent spirits. Over time, as Christianity spread and absorbed pagan customs, Samhain transformed into All Hallows' Eve, the night before All Saints' Day (November 1). It was still a time when the supernatural was thought to be closer to the earthly realm.

Trick or treating, or the practice of going door-to-door in costumes to ask for treats, has its roots in the medieval custom of "souling" or "guising." In exchange for prayers or songs for the deceased, poor individuals would receive soul cakes. This tradition evolved in America into the familiar Halloween practice of children dressing up and collecting candy from neighbors. Today, Halloween remains a celebration of both spooky and playful traditions, blending ancient customs with modern festivities.

The Hunter's Moon, is the full moon that will occur on October 28th, 2023. This name is derived from Native American tribes and early colonists, who noted that this moon marked the time of the year when game was ready to be hunted, making it an important period for stocking up on food before the harsh winter. The Hunter's Moon will rise in the afternoon in 2023, around 2:30 at its peak. Symbolically, this full moon is associated with themes of harvest, abundance, and preparation for the winter months. It's a time to gather resources and reflect on the cycle of life and death, as well as to appreciate the bounties of nature. In some cultural and spiritual traditions, the Hunter's Moon is considered a time for gratitude and honoring the cycles of nature, making it a meaningful and spiritually significant event.
