Partners in Ministry,

We are called to care for creation, serving, preserving and living God's love into the world. That calling includes loving our neighbors — especially those who are suffering — and loving justice.

Those were primary messages during the 2022 Central States Synod Assembly, which took place last month in Olathe. The assembly is an annual opportunity for Central

States Synod congregations of the ELCA to gather for praying, breaking bread with each other and sharing information about the different gifts each of our communities brings to the wider church.

Keynote presenter Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda, professor of Theological and Social Ethics at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, Calif., and one of the foremost theologians doing work on our care of creation, led us into a deeper understanding of what it means to till and keep the earth as humanity is called to do in Genesis. She exhorted us to see the care of creation as central to the care of our neighbor and integral to our baptismal calling. While we are sinners and often fall short of our callings, she also spoke deeply about the gift of the gospel, which proclaims the good news of the resurrection that redeems not only us, but all of creation.

It's good to remember that we don't do ministry in a vacuum, and that we have partners from across the country and around the world with whom we share holy work. In that spirit of sharing, we heard reports from the churchwide office of the ELCA, as well as from different ministries of the synod. The assembly considered three resolutions, and after conversation and debate moderated by Bishop Candeia, we adopted all three. Those resolutions call the synod and, by extension, Immanuel to:

- Lift up our companion churches in Russia and Papua New Guinea. The Russian invasion of Ukraine calls for special support and prayers for victims of war.
- Develop LGBTQLIA+ education. Hearts Across the Heartland, a group of which I am a part, is focused on promoting educational materials that are affirming.
- Adjust compensation in line with ELCA recommendations. For example, sabbaticals can be three months or more, and compensation for supply pastors is now \$160 per service. That amount increases if the supply pastor plans the service, teaches or assists with visitation.

In a recent email to synod leaders, Bishop Candeia wrote: “It is no surprise that the latter two resolutions got more comments and debate. We are not all of one mind on these issues, and that is okay! It is the body of Christ, our unity in baptism, that binds us, not our agreement on various issues. Therefore, here is my invitation to you as leaders – while some of these topics have the potential for conflict and differing points of view, we can help our people talk to one another, respect one another, and keep the gospel central. The way we invite people into these conversations is crucial. It is about an invitation and an opportunity to grow in our understanding of both the gospel and the world around us.”

There is important work to be done, and I see these resolutions as a way to outline how the synod can move forward. I hope Immanuel will be a leader in this work.

I’m grateful to Ingrid and Dave Peterson for serving as our congregational delegates to the assembly. Read on in this newsletter to benefit from a few of their insights, and look for an opportunity to learn more during an upcoming Adult Forum. In the meantime, don't hesitate to reach out to them or me if you have question or comments.

As Dr. Moe-Lobeda emphasized in her presentation, there has never been a more important time to be the church. Let's get to work.

NOTES FROM OUR SYNOD ASSEMBLY

DELEGATES: DON'T LET GUILT OR A SENSE OF POWERLESSNESS GET IN THE WAY

As Lutherans, we draw hope and power from God's love. Despite the fact that we are sinners, God calls us to "neighbor-love," to be the body of God's love on earth.



Climate change affects all of us, but those who will be most devastated are our global neighbors who have not been responsible for the human activity that is accelerating the changes. They are also the ones who have the least resources to combat food shortages and other effects.

So, since climate change affect us all, what gets in our way of caring for creation?

We may sense that, as individuals, we don't matter, and are powerless or too late to act. Guilt about how we have fallen short and confusion about where to begin also can be factors. We know we can't do it all, but that does not give us an excuse to do nothing.

The keynote speaker during the Synod Assembly gave us "10 Fingers of Action" that can help break through a sense of guilt and powerlessness, see faithfully and critically how climate change is affecting creation, and help us move forward as a community:

1. **Adopt lifestyle changes.** To make the changes achievable, take one step for a month, then add a little more the next month. For example, stop using paper products, and/or drive less.
2. **Participate in public policy advocacy** through groups such as the Kansas Interfaith Alliance and Missouri Faith Voices.
3. **Invest in economic equity** by supporting fair trade.
4. **Become aware of community organizing efforts** that support creation care.
5. **Participate in demonstrations and marches** that help raise public awareness about the climate crisis.
6. **Support small-scale local food providers**, such as vendors at farmers' markets.
7. **Seek out and participate in climate change education.**
8. **Reflect theologically and biblically** on opportunities to care for creation.
9. **Lift up creation care** in liturgy, preaching and art.
10. **Pray.**

Songs that the assembly sang together powerfully encompassed our opportunity to care for the whole of creation. Here are the lyrics to "Earth is Full of Wit and Wisdom."

*Earth is full of wit and wisdom sounding God's delighted laugh.
From the tiny roly-poly to the tree-top-tall giraffe,
all creation sings in wonder; even rocks and trees rejoice
as they join the ringing chorus: echoes of our Maker's voice.*

One team prepared and served lunch for Gathering Table guests, packed sack lunches and helped set up a Gathering Table office in the northeast KC church building that the ministry calls home.

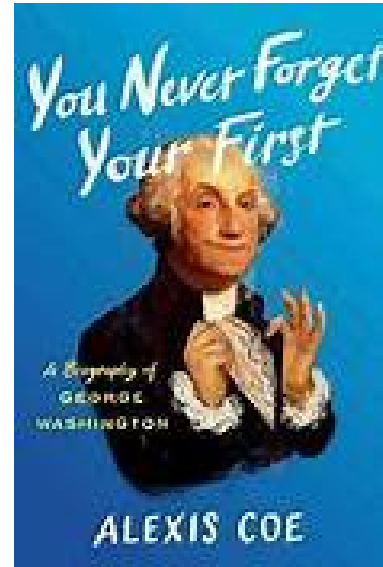
YouthWorks teams will live at Immanuel each week through July 29.

CENTRAL STATES SYNOD BISHOP RESPONDS TO SUPREME COURT DECISION REVERSING ROE V. WADE



In a June 24 message to the people of the Central States Synod, of which Immanuel is a part, Bishop Susan Candeia wrote:

Today we learned that the U.S. Supreme Court reversed Roe v. Wade, declaring that the constitutional right to abortion, upheld for nearly 50 years, no longer exists. The decision regarding abortion rights is now in the hands of states, nearly half of which are prepared to ban abortions.

This decision was made by a six to three split of the justices. Those dissenting – Stephen Breyer, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan – wrote, “With sorrow – for this court, but more for the many millions of American women who have today lost a fundamental constitutional

protection – we dissent.”

That sentence reflects my own reaction. With sorrow for how this decision will impact the lives of women and others, I dissent. I do so understanding that we are not of one mind on this issue. As described in our social statement on abortion, <https://download.elca.org/ELCA%20Resource%20Repository/AbortionSS.pdf>:

The topic of abortion evokes strong and varied convictions about the social order, the roles of women and men, human life and human responsibility, freedom and limits, sexual morality and the significance of children in our lives. It involves powerful feelings that are based on different life experiences and interpretations of the Christian life ... the concern for both the life of the woman and the developing life in her womb expresses a common commitment to life. This requires that we move beyond the usual ‘pro-life’ versus ‘pro-choice’ language in discussing abortion.

As people of faith, we step beyond rhetoric into the messy complexity of life. We step into the conflict to speak and act with love because we ground our actions in scripture, in the reality that all are created in the image of God, that all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, and that we are justified by grace which gives us the freedom to have difficult moral deliberations and make decisions that differ from the decisions of others. Taking away the right to these deliberations and decisions not only harms women but our whole society.

Our social statement, one of the first we adopted as the ELCA, does an excellent job of inviting us into scripture, into our theology, into love of neighbor, and into the complexity of life for which there are no easy answers. In its concluding remarks, it reads:

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(Bishop Responds to Court Ruling, continued)

Because of our conviction that both the life of the woman and the life in her womb must be respected by law, this church opposes:

- *The total lack of regulation of abortion;*
- *Legislation that would outlaw abortion in all circumstances;*
- *Laws that prevent access to information about all options available to women faced with unintended pregnancies;*
- *Laws that deny access to safe and affordable services for morally justifiable abortions;*
- *Mandatory or coerced abortion or sterilization;*
- *Laws that prevent couples from practicing contraception;*
- *Laws that are primarily intended to harass those contemplating or deciding for an abortion.*

I encourage you to read and share the social statement. During this time when once again we will experience polarization in our nation and our churches, I encourage you to speak with compassion, respect and love. We have the opportunity to “shape attitudes and values that affirm people in whatever circumstances they find themselves” (social statement p. 11). So let us take this opportunity to share attitudes of compassion and respect, and affirm the value of all life.

COMING SOON: NEW BOILER, HOT WATER HEATER AND MORE WITH BIG PRICE TAGS

The boiler that provides heat and the hot water heater that provides hot water to Immanuel's building must be replaced, so new units will be installed this summer. The new models will decrease the church's energy costs, but the initial investment is huge. Repairs to the roof, stained-glass windows and air conditioning units are coming up, too.

We're fortunate to be able to apply a generous bequest from the estate of George and Evelyn Roberts, and the family of Ann Erickson has asked that contributions in her memory go to the boiler-replacement fund. But donations to help cover the costs still are appreciated.



Here's one last look at Immanuel's old boiler. Later this summer, it will be replaced by a new model that is significantly more energy efficient. Replacing it is among several property projects that come with big price tags.

Stay tuned for news about how much the upcoming projects will cost and various ways in which each of us can assist.

NEWS FROM YOUR CONGREGATION COUNCIL

Immanuel's congregation council met June 28. During the meeting, the group:

- Appointed Janette Rodecap to fill the council vacancy created by Deborah Crawford's resignation.
- Approved spending \$13,000 to repair roof leaks where the sanctuary roof meets the choir loft bump-out and where the roof meets the bell tower.
- Discussed how staffing needs could be covered with the departure of Pastor Ann Rundquist and administrative assistant Linda Fewell.

UKRAINIANS NEED OUR HELP

It's now about four months since Russian troops invaded Ukraine, and fighting continues to intensify as humanitarian conditions deteriorate.

The United Nations Humanitarian Report estimates that 6.6 million people have fled the country and 8 million are displaced internally. The UN estimates that more than 24 million people — more than half of Ukraine's population — will need humanitarian assistance in the coming months.

In addition to continuing to provide refugees with food, shelter, hygiene kits and medical supplies, Lutheran Disaster Response and its partners in the region support those fleeing the violence with psycho-social care, pastoral care, housing, job searches, language study, school admission, legal services, cash assistance and more.
