 Consistency and Reliability: The nature of a child's attachment experience is shaped by how consistently and reliably a caregiver responds to the child's distress signals1. Consistent, reliable, and responsive caregiving is associated with an optimal attachment experience1.

- 2. Responsiveness: The caregiver's responsiveness to the child's needs is a crucial aspect of forming a secure attachment1. This includes being available when needed and responding appropriately to the child's distress signals1.
- 3. Physical Contact and Emotional Expression: The quality of physical contact and the caregiver's emotional expression towards the child are important indicators of the attachment quality 2.
- 4. Setting Limits and Acceptance of Autonomy: How the caregiver sets limits and accepts the child's autonomy can also influence the attachment quality2.
- 5. Positive Interactions: Frequent positive interactions between the child and the caregiver can foster a secure attachment 2.
- 6. Age-Specific Behaviours: The behaviours to look for can vary depending on the child's age2. For example, the attachment behaviours of an infant might be different from those of a toddler or an older child 2.

Remember, assessing attachment requires specialist training and is usually undertaken in prescribed situations where the child's responses to its caregiver are observed and coded1. If you're concerned about a child's attachment to their caregiver, it's best to consult with a professional who specializes in child development or child psychology.
