LA City Controller Kenneth Mejia

Past warning from Controller at year end JUN2023

"spending exceeding expected levels. The estimates of the City Administrative Officer.....a budget shortfall in excess of \$143 million to be addressed by a partial hiring freeze and tapping the City's Reserve Fund. The shortfall could swell to as much as \$400 million next year"

"current staff shortages and long-term underinvestment in the training, technology, equipment and facilities for our workforce hobbles productivity and shortchanges our residents"

"without a long-term approach to putting our fiscal house in order, short-term decisions will doom Los Angeles to an inexorable decline in public services, undermining our quality of life and the economic prospect of our residents"

"A transition to a two-year budget cycle would save enormous staff time, give greater opportunity for meaningful community participation, and allow for a more strategic approach to the City's Finances. The City also needs a transparent Capital improvement Program beyond the current wish list of billions of dollars in unfunded projects. Participatory budgeting, expanded beyond its current experimental pilot, would offer greater citizen engagement in the City's fiscal health."

Mayor Bass' Proposed 12.8 Billion dollar budget, less than last year The General Fund is where most of the attention goes to (Police, Fire etc)

Mayor says getting rid of vacant positions (2,000 vacancies) will not have any impact

Some departments with vacancies:

Controllers office - handles every LA city department – manages accounting, payroll and spending, conducts audits and investigations.

Emergency Management Department – responsible for its emergency preparations (planning, training, and mitigation) as well as provide a basis for direction and control of emergency operations
