What could children possibly do for entertainment in a world where the light bulb was invented about 45 years ago, televisions with moving images weren't out to the public, having a car wasn't the norm, telephones didn't exist, and computers weren't even a thought? Kids would actually go outside and talk to each other. It's very surprising, isn't it? Honestly, I like the advanced technology we have now, but I wouldn't mind growing up back in 1925. I would prefer to live my life as I have, but it would be no problem in my opinion to live back then. They used to do many things like us such as play sports, have essay contests, and have pretty much boy and girl scouts. On the other hand, they faced many hardships as well such as a major breakout of the disease Trachoma and not having milk to feed newborn babies.

Not everything in 1925 was fun and games for children. Starting in Port Reading school, an illness called Trachoma started spreading. You may be thinking, what does Trachoma mean? Well, Trachoma is a sickness similar to the modern day Pink Eye or Conjunctivitis. In the March 20th issue of Woodbridge Independent, the author stated how fear of the malaty was rising. Also, there was a drive organized to collect milk for babies in needy families. This fact makes me forlorn, just knowing that families needed milk that they didn't have to sustain their children. These events are not still happening today in this area to this extent, but around the world, people are still struggling to get enough food to survive.

One major similarity between 1925 and now is sports. Schools had teams and rivals in everything from baseball to basketball to soccer. We still have activities well alive in schools extremely similar to these. In addition, we have leagues separate from school for leisure.
