A photographer from the American Guild of Organists met me at the church recently to photograph our new organ in order to publish an article about our new instrument. Local AGO chapter members will meet at CLC to see and hear the new organ on May 18. There seems to be some local interest generated by the installation of our new instrument, gifted to us by Allen Dreyfuss. There are some community members who believe that the new acquisition will attract visitors and, potentially, new members.

What does it take to enlist new disciples for Christ? When I drove to Grosse Pointe, Michigan in the fall of 1965 to begin my year of internship at St. Paul Lutheran Church, I was surprised when told that the congregation hosted over 200 kids every weekend for Sunday School. The church was alive on Sunday and during the week bustling with activities. The congregation, for example, hosted four women's circles and offered three Sunday services. Now I am told that only a few dozen folks worship on Sundays at one service. And that is the story of many ELCA congregations. Churches are closing their doors and numerous congregations are yoking with other congregations and sharing one pastor with one or more churches. Since 1976, the ELCA lost 30 % of its membership and closed 12.5 % of its churches. The Presbyterian membership loss was 40% and the Methodists lost almost 17%.

How can one do evangelism in an age of secularization? I'm a Christian because Charlemagne in 776 AD used fire and sword to march the recalcitrant Saxons to the river for baptisms. (His advisor, Alcuin had to convince him to wait until the "converts" had been properly instructed before the march to the river.) Other tactics were orders by pain of death proclaimed by the Magyar prince Geisa in the 10th century.

In 1096 AD, Pope Urban II ordered the Christians of Europe to send armies to the Holy Land to re-Christianize the Muslims. At the end of the 13th century, Jerusalem was still in the hands of the Muslims and thousands of Christians, young children, and Muslims had been pillaged and slaughtered. Lutheran historian, Martin E. Marty observed, "...the most important lesson of the crusades was this: a Patrick or a Martin, a Boniface or an Ansgar could accomplish more for the Christian mission as such than could conquest by the sword." Nowadays some disciples of Christ might not use guns or swords to march people to the baptismal font but threatening people with images of the fire and brimstone of hell doesn't work either.

Those on the far right today who advocate the mission of "Christian Nationalism" are also barking up the wrong tree. It's too late to turn America into a white Christian nation. Jesus died on the cross to establish a kingdom of heaven (visible on earth through witness and good deeds), not the kingdom of America or, for that matter, the kingdom of China or Russia. The Kingdom of Heaven is in the heart, achieved through witness of lives changed by faith. No swords, no threats, no guns, no watered-down gospel, no "best-show-in-town" performances on Sunday morning. The witness compelled by Jesus is our mission. We tell others about Jesus and let God count those who are in the Kingdom, not the visible church but the church known only to God.

Will our new organ bring hundreds to our door? I hope so but maybe not. I only know this: we will sing the joy of salvation and not worry about numbers. Numbers do not the kingdom make. Easter reminds us that Christ rose from the dead. The victory has been won. We proclaim the victory. Let the Spirit do the rest. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

HEAR THEIR STORY AND SEE THEIR BEAUTIFUL OLIVE WOOD CRAFTS

On April 14, 2024 and during the service, we will be hearing a ministry moment about the Christians of the Holy Land, and after each service we will be hosting in the narthex a nice display of handmade olive wood religious articles from Bethlehem available for purchase. These carvings include olive wood Nativity sets, crosses, Christmas ornaments, candle holders, angles and many other religious crafts that could make a nice wedding, baptism, confirmation, Easter and Christmas gifts. The carvings are handmade by Christian families from Bethlehem who rely on it for their daily bread.

More than 70% of the Christian Community in the Holy Land depend upon tourism as their only source of income . For decades those Christians have been enduring many hardships as tourism in Bethlehem has plummeted and access to other sources of income has been sharply restricted due to the ongoing conflict, the wars, the 12 yard wall built around Bethlehem, the COVID-19 pandemic, and nowadays the catastrophic ongoing war, due to this tourists are afraid and unable to visit the Holy Land . This made it very difficult for the Christian families to find their daily bread and forced them to immigrate and flee their homeland since they lost their source of income . The Christian population of the Holy Land was 30% in the last century, today it is less than 1%. If it continues like this, in few years we will find no Christians in the land of Christ, which could cause tragic consequences to our faith and holy sites.

Please help support our Christian brothers and sisters in the town where Christ was born by purchasing their carvings.

A Christians family from Bethlehem will be telling us the story of the Christians of the Holy Land and they will be presenting these carvings after the services.

It is never too late to help. All proceeds go to support Christian families from Bethlehem. Let us carefully tend our roots, the Christians of the Holy Land. And let us pray together for peace in the Holy Land.




