I once read about an eighteen-year-old boy who drowned while experimenting with an aqualung. He was a mild tempered gifted lad full of great promise. When his father looked down upon his body that afternoon, he cried out in anguish, "Why did this have to happen? Why have you been taken away from us when you had so much to live for?" A young minister arrived upon the scene and tried to comfort the distraught father by placing an understanding hand upon his shoulder and saying, "It is God's will. You must understand, it is God's will." The father with face distorted from grief and anger, raised his eyes to the

sky and shouted, "God, if you could do this, if you could take my only son from me, then I want nothing to do with you, ever!"

I have heard those kind of thoughts many times in my ministry. The story reminds me of the time when one of my best high school friends tragically died in an accident after his first year of university. He and two other graduates of my high school class borrowed a small aircraft and tried to fly from Ohio to Annapolis to visit another friend of mine. They encountered bad weather and, in the darkness, flew into the top of a mountain in West Virginia. My friend's parents, immigrants from Germany, lost their only child. Soon after the accident, they sold their farm and moved away. Rumor had it that they resettled in Florida somewhere. They were grief-stricken. They too raised their eyes to the sky and shouted, "God, why did you take our only son from us?"

I don't think it is "God's will" that anyone die. Many of us today weep in our hearts when we see the images of the destruction in Ukraine, in the Gaza strip, or in Sudan. Perhaps some of us have lost family members or friends who have been deprived of years of productivity. Easter has reminded us again that there is an enemy, "Sin, Death, and the Devil," that was vanquished by the victory of Jesus upon the cross. But the enemy lingers. The fruits of Christ's victory are visible now in our faith, in our will to love others, in our prayers. But the victory is not yet realized. Hegel identified the enemy as "man's separation from Being," and Solzhenitsyn blamed the line that cuts through the heart of every human. Our era is still marked by the tension between good and evil that spawns violence in all forms, the ensuing confusion at the border between two human imperatives.

The Letter to the Hebrews implies that we are still caught between two events: the coming of Christ the first time and the coming of Christ the second time. The time of the present is filled with faith optimism, something not known to those who lived before the ministry of Jesus on planet earth. The father who lost his son could only impute his own faith into the experience of his son. That, in my opinion, would have been more helpful than the insensitive "assurance," "It is God's will." It is helpful to me to understand that we humans are not blessed with the full picture of the world's events. "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known.," (I Cor. 13: 12)

Our existence is colored by our separation from God although that gap has been bridged by Christ the "pioneer" as Hebrews puts it. Once Clarence Darrow visited a group of ghetto dwellers in Chicago. He heard their stories of hunger, drug abuse, unemployment and street crime. When he spoke to an elderly black woman, she said, "Mr. Darrow, we got a passel of troubles, but we still got Jesus." We got our troubles, but now Easter reminds us, we got Jesus.


