

From The Music Director....

And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.....And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts.

(Acts 2:42, 46)

How blessed they were! These first disciples, who had been live witnesses of the resurrection and had just come through the Spirit's outpouring on Pentecost, were able to then live a life built around the presence of the Lord. They gathered around God's Word, both in public and in their homes, and joined in prayer and in the Lord's Supper (the "breaking of bread"). They knew the commandment that instructed them to worship on the Sabbath, but they gathered not because they had to, but because they wanted to. How blessed they were!

How blessed we are! We, the members of the same church that was begun back in the day of the first apostles, share the same faith that

they taught. We have heard of the Lord's resurrection, we have heard of the Spirit's outpouring, and we rejoice in the Word that says "faith comes from hearing, and hearing from the Word of Christ." (Romans 10:17) We have a public place in which we gather for worship, and we pray in our homes. We even share a similar outline (a "liturgy") with them, as we gather around Word, prayer, and the sacrament. How blessed we are!

Yet life in the first century had its share of sin and distractions. Those first believers had political problems, social woes, and spiritual struggles. Still, these first believers continued to emphasize the importance of gathering regularly to hear the Word of God, and because of their witness, the church grew. (Read the book of Acts to see how it happened.)

And what about our life today? We deal with sins and distractions as well. Are we still making the same commitment to gathering weekly to receive the gifts that God gives through His Word and sacraments? May our prayer be that of the hymn writer:



Stewardship Minute STEWARDSHIP OF THE TEMPLE

Many times we have often ignored a fundamental issue of Christian stewardship---the use and treatment of our bodies. Far too many Christians abuse and misuse their bodies.

Man has been given the authority and dominion over the earth by God. We should at all times seek to achieve God's purpose in the use of the body and with our world, as we are God's managers in all that He has given us.

Our attitude and beliefs will determine our actions. If we believe we have great worth and we should, we need to treat our bodies accordingly. We have great value because God tells us and has demonstrated that for us. We all have been given gifts, talents, and abilities in which to serve others and glorify our Lord. We have real significance and meaning as we grow in Christ and walk in faith with Him.

Our healthy well-being is wholesome when we cherish our spiritual, mental, and physical health. These are inseparable, as one affects the other!

God placed a high value on our bodies when He said "Do you not know that your body is a TEMPLE of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought

at a price, so honor God with your body." 1Cor. 6 vs. 19-20

God has established laws and principles in which to promote good health. We are commanded to glorify God in our bodies. Poor health can adversely affect our work, our family, our social life, and everything else. We should seek to gain knowledge and develop good healthy habits to ward off disease, lack of energy, and lack of zeal. We are God's creation and His managers of His creation of which man was created in His own image. We are very special of whom He loves greatly!

Here's some basic principles for good bodily stewardship:

- 1. Breathe clean air and drink clean water
- 2. Consume nutritional food with a balanced diet
- 3. Get adequate sleep and rest
- 4. Get adequate sunshine
- 5. Get regular exercise
- 6. Have proper hygiene, especially dental
- 7. Do all things in moderation
- 8. Avoid tobacco and other stimulants
- 9. Work—it's good for you
- 10. Strengthen your faith to keep you from fear and worry
- 11. Exercise your brain with wholesome thinking
- 12. Develop and maintain a positive and grateful attitude


