FROM PASTOR MUSE

Traditionally this would be the time of year to begin the process of spring cleaning. Overall, this action is done far less than it was in the past, and the intensity has waned. This is mostly due to the fact that we no longer heat our houses with a coal furnace that left the walls, base boards, and curtains covered in a black film. Along with the efficiency of heating, we have better filters that catch the dust and debris before it reaches our living quarters. This all leads to a less intense spring cleaning, though it is nice to open the windows and air out the house. Yet this is a good spiritual image for this time of year.

The winter or wilderness of Lent is over. We have emerged on the other side and are basking in the glory of the resurrection, which fills our very being with the light of life. The is no shadow in the resurrection, there is no part of us that is hidden, so as not to be seen by the savior. We look into the corners of how we give our affection. We are all capable of loving those we love and supporting those who align themselves with out identity, but what about those who we struggle to love and support. Those who are different, who think different, maybe even challenge us in our thinking? Those corners where we push those who we disagree with and want to objectify them. Those who Christ tells us are our neighbors, but we don't quite treat the same. We can wipe away the grime of fear and see in them the image of God, as we ourselves reflect it and desire to lift them up to the throne of grace.

We can look into the corners of how we use our money and resources. We are all so blessed in ways we cannot even begin to comprehend. How do we use this blessing, how do we equate these gifts in the eyes of God?



THERE IS HOPE!

Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. (John 12:23-26)

As you read this, we are moving from Lent through Holy Week, culminating in our Easter Celebrations. We have looked at the theme of "Change" in Lent, and we are now looking at the fulfillment of Jesus' work—his death and resurrection. Death is part of life, and death is necessary for salvation. There are many types of dying. Through our "change" theme, each change in our lives is a small death. When letting go of one thing, something else can emerge. Our congregation is constantly changing. This can be anxiety-inducing, but we continuously turn back to God for guidance, wisdom, comfort, and courage.

APRIL 2024—The Word of God in Worship

<u>Sunday, April 7, 2024</u> Introduction

The Easter season is a week of weeks, seven Sundays when we play in the mystery of Christ's presence, mostly through the glorious Gospel of John. Today we gather with the disciples on the first Easter, and Jesus breathes the Spirit on us. With Thomas we ask for a sign, and Jesus offers us his wounded self in the broken bread. From frightened individuals we are transformed into a community of open doors, peace, forgiveness, and material sharing such that no one among us is in need.

Prayer of the Day

Almighty God, with joy we celebrate the day of our Lord's resurrection. By the grace of Christ among us, enable us to show the power of the resurrection in all that we say and do, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

<u>Sunday, April 14, 2024</u> Introduction

The gospel for the third Sunday of Easter is always one in which the risen Christ shares food with the disciples, meals that are the Easter template for the meal we share each Sunday. In today's gospel, Jesus both shares the disciples' food and shows them the meaning of his suffering, death, and resurrection through the scriptures, the two main elements of our Sunday worship.

Prayer of the Day

Holy and righteous God, you are the author of life, and you adopt us to be your children. Fill us with your words of life, that we may live as witnesses to the resurrection of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Readings and Psalm

Acts 3:12-19 Health and forgiveness through the risen Jesus Psalm 4 The LORD does wonders for the faithful. (*Ps. 4:3*) 1 John 3:1-7 The revealing of the children of God Luke 24:36b-48 Eating with the risen Christ.

Sunday, April 21, 2024 Introduction

The image of the good shepherd shows us how the risen Christ brings us to life. It is the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep, one of mutual knowledge and love, that gives the shepherd authority. The shepherd's willingness to lay down his life for the sheep shows his love. First John illustrates what it means to lay down our lives for one another by the example of sharing our wealth with any sibling in need.

Prayer of the Day

O Lord Christ, good shepherd of the sheep, you seek the lost and guide us into your fold. Feed us, and we shall be satisfied; heal us, and we shall be whole. Make us one with you, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

<u>Sunday, April 28, 2024</u> Introduction

This Sunday's image of how the risen Christ shares his life with us is the image of the vine. Christ the vine and we the branches are alive in each other, in the mystery of mutual abiding described in the gospel and the first letter of John. Baptism makes us a part of Christ's living and life-giving self and makes us alive with Christ's life. As the vine brings food to the branches, Christ feeds us at his table. We are sent out to bear fruit for the life of the world.

Prayer of the Day

O God, you give us your Son as the vine apart from whom we cannot live. Nourish our life in his resurrection, that we may bear the fruit of love and know the fullness of your joy, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Amen.
