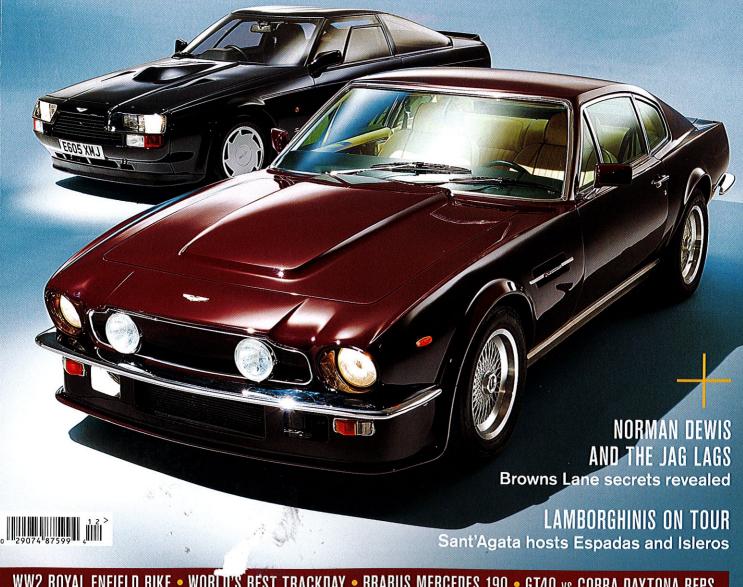

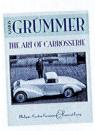

Few tasks could be more daunting than restoring a car for one of the men who created it in the first place. Yet, 50 years after Gian Paolo Dallara helped to engineer the Lamborghini Miura, that's exactly what Lamborghini's new classic division did. It took 14 months and 3000 man-hours but the sensational result was truly worthy of the great man's 80th birthday present.

#### The 'Jabbeke' Triumph TR2 (Glen Hewett/Protek)

The car in which Ken Richardson set a speed of nearly 125mph on a closed stretch of Belgian highway is probably the most famous and significant of all the cars to bear the Triumph badge. It was tracked down in 2015 by Glen Hewett, boss of Triumph restoration specialist Protek, then meticulously restored over a period of 18 months to be precisely how it was at Jabbeke in 1953. Naturally, the TR2 has since returned to the scene of its, er, triumph.



#### Aston Martin Project Vantage (George Georgiou)

lan Callum's Project Vantage was revealed at the Detroit Auto Show in January 1998, toured American dealerships and was featured at Pebble Beach and Amelia Island. It was later productionised as the Vanquish. This original was put into storage and disappeared until sold at auction in a sorry state in 2016. Buyer George Georgiou has since dedicated his time not just to restoring it to 1998 Detroit spec but to making it run and drive, too.



#### Lancia Flaminia Sport Zagato 3C (Thornley Kelham)

Even though it missed out on a class award, this freshly restored Lancia Flaminia Sport Zagato 3C stole the show at the London Concours at the Honourable Artillery Company in London earlier this year. The 1963 example was acquired by a Thornley Kelham customer who used it for a while before realising that it needed a full restoration, a job Thornley Kelham carried out to a simply stunning standard.



#### McLaren F1 GTR Long Tail (McLaren Special Operations)

Making its public debut in the Concours of Elegance at Hampton Court after an 18-month restoration was F1 number 25R. The work was as detailed as you would expect from McLaren: every single component was removed and cleaned, or replaced outright with original F1 GTR parts. This was the first-ever restoration of its kind undertaken by McLaren, and involved many of the same people who built this F1 GTR originally.

Following the prototype's starring role at the wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle, Jaguar has announced production plans for its electric E-type. Buyers will be able to buy one ready-built or convert an existing E-type.

Clearly, vast power and huge speed aren't everything. Few sports cars have excited as much interest as the compact, retro-revival Alpine has generated since its launch at the Geneva International Motor Show in 2017. The aluminium-shelled A110 has just 1.8 turbocharged litres at its disposal, but 250bhp is enough to fire it to 62mph in 4.5 seconds: that's supercar-quick. This mid-engined delight has had nothing but rave reviews, hailing it as a true sports car of the old school with sublime handing to boot. Driving it is the most immersive of treats, even if it does lack a clutch pedal and you change gear by paddles.

# Aston Martin DB4 GT continuation

Re-starting a limited production run that ended over half a century ago is big business for a couple of high-end manufacturers today, and the hand-built perfection of Aston Martin's brand new DB4 GTs, created at the company's Works operation in Newport Pagnell, is a wonder to behold. Today's technology makes them even better than the originals, but the 25 new cars are officially intended for track use only.



#### 'Bullitt' Ford Mustang 390 GT Fastback

One of the best-known movie cars of all, starring in one of the best car chases, 'vanished' soon after filming finished in 1968. Occasional glimpses were reported in the media of one of two cars used in the film, apparently still intact. In 2016 Sean Kiernan, son of the late long-term owner, contacted Ford, which leapt at a promotional opportunity for its new Mustang.The 'Bullitt'

car remains fully functional

and wonderfully unrestored.



# Lamborghini Marzal concept car

It's all about the acreage of glass along the gullwinged flanks and across the roof. And hexagons, all through the cabin, all over the rear window. In 1967 the Marzal, styled by Marcello Gandini at Bertone and powered by a mid-mounted straight-six, was a utopian vision of a futuristic fantasy. In 2011 it was part of bankrupt Bertone's fire sale. Now restored, the car that sired the front-engined V12 Espada lives again.



#### Land Rover R07 pre-production car

The very early Land Rover found decaying in a Birmingham garden in 2015 turned out to be one of the 48 pre-production cars. Even better, it was originally left-hand drive, was numbered L07 and was the driving demonstrator on the model's world debut at the 1948 Amsterdam show. It was the first Land Rover the public ever saw. Now it's being sensitively brought back to life at JLR Classic. A restoration? Absolutely not.



#### Porsche 911 RSR Turbo Le Mans racer

What a piece of history... the 911 RSR is not only Porsche's first turbocharged race car, but it's also the first turbo car ever to race at Le Mans. It proved quite a success, too: this actual car finished second on that 1974 debut, driven by Gijs van Lennep and Herbert Müller, and might have won had gearbox trouble not intervened. Patina apart, this primordial Porsche turbo remains just as it was in 1974. And just as explosive.

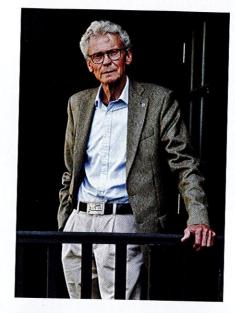

# **Tony Dron**

We all know Tony as an *Octane* contributor of many years' standing, of course. He is ideal for the role, being not only one of most perceptive, most knowledgable and most grammatically rigorous of automotive journalists, but also having been a top racing driver in some widely diverse categories. And while other scribes have also raced cars, and other racing drivers have committed their thoughts to the printed page, few have combined racing and writing for as long as Tony Dron has.

How long? Racing from 1968 to 2011. Writing from 1968 to... well, he's still at it, albeit less frantically now that he's reached 72 years of age. The two disciplines have dominated Tony's life since he was 22. That's a pretty good way to spend half-a-century.

Tony started in Formula Ford alongside his contemporary, and soon-to-be friend, James Hunt. Both were front-runners, but Hunt was better at raising the funds required to maintain the racing habit. Innes Ireland told Tony that he needed to get a job; with ex-racer Ireland manning the sports desk at *Autocar*, the nature



'Innes Ireland told Tony to get a job. Ireland was at *Autocar*, so the nature of that job inevitably followed' of that job inevitably followed. Tony wrote a few stories for the magazine and entered the Guild of Motoring Writers' Sir William Lyons Award, designed to bring on aspiring young motoring journalists. He won, and joined the rival *Motor* magazine full-time in 1971.

By then, Tony had realised that, at 6ft 5in, he was not best suited to single-seaters. He switched to saloons and by 1974, having left *Motor*, was racing full-time. Big success came in 1977 with Broadspeed's works-backed Triumph Dolomite Sprints, when he won five British Saloon Car Championship races. He won the Porsche 924 Challenge the next year.

By then working as a car salesman (Saabs, then Porsches), Tony got two Le Mans drives: a works 924 GTP in 1980, finishing 12th with Andy Rouse, and a 934 in 1982, finishing 13th. That year he joined *Throughbred & Classic Cars* magazine, quickly becoming its editor. Writing, editing and racing continued over the next decade, up to 50 events a year in a dozen different cars. This work-pace ever harder to maintain, in 1993 he turned freelance.

From then until 2011 Tony raced and won regularly in Historics, especially at Goodwood, and he has continued to entertain and inform *Octane* readers of his exploits ever since. Tony, we salute you.
