I have just returned from the 2023 Genera Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Or, to be more precise, I have torn myself away from my computer screen, for this year for a change, I was an online commissioner as since Covid, the Assembly has been a hybrid assembly.

Despite the doom and gloom of some of the reports that has been reported extensively in the media, the Assembly never fails to be in many ways challenging and inspiring. Without going into all the debates and covering the many issues covered, I was impressed by the speech of one of our overseas delegates, the Rev Lydia Neshangwe. In addressing the GA on behalf of all the overseas delegates, she said that one thing the Church of Scotland has in common with all churches around the world is that we are living in what has been termed a VUCA world. VUCA is an acronym that was coined years ago, to describe that we are operating in conditions of Volatility, conditions of Uncertainty, conditions of complexity and conditions of extreme Ambiguity.

It is into this VUCA world that we are all trying to serve God in the church and in society. In other words, it isn't surprising that we are facing challenging times, personally, in our church, in society and in our world.

And yet, has it not in some sense always been tis way?

The Church has faced many times of challenge in the past, both in Scotland and around the world.

Jesus was born into a challenging world. He experienced volatility, uncertainty, complexity and ambiguity too.

We are called, as the Church, to be people who have hope. Our hope lies in Jesus Christ. The theme of the General Assembly this year was , 'Remember who you are'. We are people who have a living hope.

Anne Frank, in her book, The Diary of a Young Girl wrote,

'It's really a wonder that I haven't dropped all my ideals, because they seem so absurd and impossible to carry out. Yet I keep them, because in spite of everything, I still believe that people are really good at heart.'

Children of God, people of faith, have hope. Remember who you are, remember whose you are.

FINANCE TEAM REPORT

The Trustees Report and Financial Statements for the year to 31st. December 2022 were approved by the Trustees at their meeting on 30th. March 2023 and were signed off by the Independent Examiner, Graeme Handley on the following day, 31st. March.

In summary, the Statements show:-

Income from all sources £116,191 Expenditure £125,626 Deficit for the year £9,435 Total Reserves at end of year £142,663

The deficit for the year might have been greater had it not been for the financial support of members, through regular giving, through fundraising events and also through donations from Church organisations. There are also members who provide support by volunteering in different ways and that type of support is not reflected in figures.

Given the current economic position, it is anticipated that some items of expenditure will increase in 2023. Unfortunately the number of members giving by monthly Standing Order or Free Will Offering envelopes has reduced in recent months, mostly through deaths. With expenditure in 2023 expected to increase and a potential reduction in income, the Church's reserves could be adversely affected. We would therefore ask members to consider their method of giving and if it is right for them, to look at giving by monthly Standing Order, if they do not already do so.

Any member who is interested in giving by Standing Order should contact any member of the Finance Team who will be happy to provide them with the appropriate forms or deal with any queries.

Sincere thanks are extended to all members for their continued support of the Church.

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The last couple of months have been busy ones for the Church in Kilbarchan but not only with regular worship.

At the start of March, the Session presented Rev Stephen Smith with a Celtic Cross and card to mark the 30th anniversary of his Ordination to the Ministry.

On that Sunday, we also recognised the fact that it was 100 years since Jimmy Henderson had been appointed as the organist of what was then part of the United Free Church of Scotland and that for the last 40 years his nephew, Ian Trushell has followed in his footsteps as organist and choirmaster. A plaque recognising Jimmy's time as organist was put on the organ and Ian was presented with a certificate in recognition of his dedicated service. The hymns which were sung that day would have been very familiar to Jimmy during his time at the organ.

It was good to have the Choir lead the Maundy Thursday service with a selection of music from Karl Jenkin's Armed Man as we joined for worship on such a significant evening in the Church calendar.

Our service of Reflection brought about 150 people together to remember friends and relatives who died during the previous three years. Many of those present came forward during the service to light a candle in remembrance of their loved one and during this part of the service Rosie Picken and Ian Trushell played some reflective music. The choir contributed to this service by singing The Lord's my Shepherd to the tune Brother James' Air. Many of the congregation then enjoyed a time of fellowship while having some refreshments in the hall.

Sunday 14 May saw Fulton Dunn being presented with a Church of Scotland certificate in recognition of the 40th anniversary of his ordination as an elder. Fulton has supported the work of the Church in many ways including as session clerk and presbytery elder, and continues as a district elder, volunteer at the Monday Tots group and working in the buildings and grounds of our property.

It is good that Cuppa at the Kirk is now established and is welcoming about 20 folk each week for a time of fellowship as well as enjoying tea and biscuits.

We were sorry to be told that Kilbarchan Guild had been wound up following its annual meeting on 28th March. An invitation had been received from the Guild at Howwood Church to join with them after the summer break and this had been welcomed by members. The Guild was a valued part of our Church for many years, providing fellowship, raising awareness of local, national, and international issues, and undertaking fundraising. We are grateful to all those who have been involved.

The Presbytery Mission Plan was approved by Presbytery at their meeting on 18th March and will now be considered at the General Assembly. The plan will impact on

many churches in this area, but it is unlikely that the decision-making process will be finally concluded until nearer the end of this year.

Stephen will be attending this year's General Assembly as a commissioner although he will be participating online rather than in person.

We are pleased to welcome another new member to our fellowship but sadly, four members have died recently and at the start of May our roll now has 355 members. It was lovely to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism recently when two young boys were joined by their family and friends on such a special occasion.

Our Stated Annual Meeting was attended by 49 members who heard the financial report for 2022 as well as a summary of the main achievements of our Church. At this time thanks were extended to everyone who gives of their time to make Our Church as successful as it is.

MEET THE MDERATOR FOR 2023-2024



The head of a Christian charity which fights global poverty has been named as the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, 58, who has led Christian Aid in Scotland since 2016, has taken a year's sabbatical to become the Kirk's ambassador at home and abroad for 12 months from the General Assembly last month.

The Church of Scotland minister said she is looking forward to meeting and encouraging people involved in church work at local, national and international level at a time of unprecedented challenge and opportunity.

The Moderator said: "I'm excited about what the year will bring.
"I genuinely love and am inspired by the Church of Scotland and its people.
"Over the past years of the pandemic in the face of a global climate emergency and now a cost-of-living crisis, people across the Church have been stepping up and doing their very best to make an extraordinary impact in communities, locally, across our nation and in the world."

Born and raised in South Carolina in the USA, Mrs Foster-Fulton has been a Church of Scotland minister for more than 20 years and has served in several parishes as well as hospitals as a chaplain.

She is married to Rev Stuart Fulton, a fellow Church of Scotland minister who serves the parish of Newlands South Church in Glasgow.

The couple, who live in Glasgow, have two adult daughters, Alex and Gracie. Mrs Foster-Fulton recently became a grandmother and she said her new role has "shifted her perspective and given new meaning" to her commitment to try and make the world a better place.

The Moderator convened the Church of Scotland's former Church and Society Council from 2012-2016 and helped advance work on human rights, climate justice and support for people struggling to overcome poverty in Scotland as well as overseas.

She campaigned on behalf of detainees at Dungavel House immigration removal centre near Strathaven in South Lanarkshire and led the Church's work with ecumenical and interfaith partners to create networks of support for asylum seekers and refugees.

In the run up to the 2014 Scottish Independence Referendum, she helped create space for respectful dialogue between campaigners on both sides of the debate. Mrs Foster-Fulton said the Church of Scotland's voice on national and international issues has authenticity because it represents people working across the country to support and uplift local communities

She said she is proud of the support that local churches give to national and international partners.

Mrs Foster-Fulton said: "What church congregations do locally in their communities is critical.

"It is what gives the Church's voice validity when we speak truth to power.

"Sometimes we talk about local and international work as if it is an either or, but if there is one thing my work with the Church of Scotland, Christian Aid, this recent pandemic and the climate crisis has affirmed, is that we are all in this together.

"There is no separation between what we do for people in our global neighbourhood and what we do here at home.

"There is no them and us, there is just us and we have all got to look after one another."

Ordained as a Church of Scotland minister in 1999, Mrs Foster-Fulton's first charge was Camelon Irving Parish Church in Falkirk where she spent four years.

The married couple took up the role of co-pastors for a Presbyterian Church in the USA congregation in Seneca, South Carolina, and stayed for four years before returning to Scotland, the place that the Moderator considers home.

In 2007, Mrs Foster-Fulton was appointed associate minister at Dunblane Cathedral where she served for 10 years before taking up her role at Christian Aid.

CLYDE PRESBYTERY Saturday 18th March 2023

The moderator constituted the meeting with the hymn: Guide me, O Thou great Jehovah, and the Readings: Isaiah chapter 9: 2 - 7 & John chapter 14: 2. After a number of administrative matters thereafter the remainder of the meeting was given over to the Presbytery Plan.

The convener of the Planning committee began by thanking the congregations of Clyde Presbytery for their assistance in producing the Presbytery plan including their Mission Audit reports. The Mission Plan Task Group representatives had all be assigned a Local Mission Group from the opposite side of the River Clyde to analyse. This was to prevent any conflict of interest.

The submission of each congregation had been analysed according to the following:

- 1-5 Evidence of demonstration of each Mark of Mission
- 6 Is the congregation a Priority Area congregation?
- 7 Proximity to other churches
- 8 Size of Parish
- 9 Asset Management Building Audit AMBA score
- 10 Where are the 'gaps'?

NOTES: Five Marks of Mission criteria can be found on CofS website https://churchofscotland.org.uk/about-us/our-faith The financial situation of each congregation as far as keeping up with M&M payments is concerned, was also noted but was not a part of any 'score'.

Based on this information the Presbytery Plan was produced for the conference. Each area was discussed then voted on. The complete Clyde plan can-be found on the homepage at https://clydepresbytery.org

The Moderator read out the narrative regarding Kilbarchan and Howwood.

Area B5 – Howwood and Kilbarchan

Net population: 7,402 Parish Area: 37.39 sq.miles [5]2022 M&M Allocation:

HOWWOOD £29,428 and. KILBARCHAN £73,336

PROPOSED ALLOCATION 1.0 Full Time minister (FTE)

(A - building is required to be kept at the present time.)

MISSION HIGHLIGHTS AND POTENTIALS:

Both of these churches have a strong sense of calling to witness for Jesus in their

own communities and we have seen that Howwood and Kilbarchan are very separate and distinct communities. We recommend that a linked charge be created between Kilbarchan and Howwood churches, and that one Minister of Word and Sacrament (MWS) is allocated to the charge.

The full details had been modified slightly from the previous version, she noted that the amendments which we had submitted were to be included in the final document, which was.

"The continued omission of any reference to the extension of our parish boundaries to include Lochwinnoch was felt to be a weakness in the Plan." This was then voted on and passed with the amendment.

After all areas were voted on the meeting closed with the Grace in unison.


The fund-raising team has now been incorporated into a new Session Mission Team and we hope to organise some events to bring local people into the church and halls. Any suggestions will be much appreciated.

RENFREWSHIRE FOODBANK



When looking for inspiration for putting pen to paper for this contribution regarding the Renfrewshire Foodbank, my mind became fixed on the New Testament story (Matthew 14:13-21) of "Jesus feeding the Five Thousand" or as Jamie Stewart titles it in his book "A Glasgow Bible" (bible stories in the Glasgow vernacular), "Jesus feeds the Five Thoosan". It struck me that there are many similarities between the New Testament story and the work of the Foodbank.

- 1. The large crowd that followed Jesus needed to be fed.
- 2. There is a wide section of our society in the 21st century that requires to be fed.
- 3. Jesus instructs his disciples to give the crowd something to eat.
- 4. The Trushell Trust instigated the initiative to request donations of food to feed those in need.
- 5. The small boy in the story donated his 5 loaves and 2 fishes or as Jamie Stewart remarks "there's a wee boy here who's willin tae part wi his piece. It's no a lot mind, 5 rolls and a couple of fish."
- 6. Society has responded to the call from the Trushell Trust to provide emergency food donations and does this through a network of 1300 foodbank centres.
- 7. From a small contribution, given selflessly from a generous spirit and a blessing from Jesus, "Five Thoosan" were fed.
- 8. From donations of all types between April 2022 and March 2023, Foodbanks provided almost 3 million food supplies to people in crisis. And this is a 37% increase on the previous year.

Society's support of the Foodbank and Kilbarchan Parish Church's support, in particular, is magnificent.

If you are able, please mirror the young lad in the story's generosity of spirit which resulted in the crowd being fed and "efterwards they gethered up near twelve baskets o the leftovers", and continue to support the work of The Trushell Trust / Renfrewshire Foodbank.

With Jesus' blessing the crowd were fed and a surplus realised. In our prayers we can ask for ample donations to ensure surplus stocks of emergency food supplies.

The Vision of the Trushell Trust is for a future without the need for Foodbanks. Together, we can build a fairer society where everyone has enough to afford food. This should be our ultimate prayer.

The Foodbank needs our support more than ever.

ADAMS HOUSE MINIBUS

As most folk will know, my dad, Ian, has been a resident of Adams House Care Home in Elderslie for around 18 months. In that time, we have been aware of fundraising efforts towards a much-needed new minibus. The current minibus is getting on a bit and every year, as M.O.T. time comes around, the prayers get more and more serious that it will last another year.

There have been coffee mornings, quiz nights and ultra-marathons done in aid of this seemingly unreachable target. Minibuses with the added requirement of the equipment needed for transporting elderly people with dementia and mobility issues don't come cheap. So, this got me thinking of what I could possibly do to help get a little closer to that target. What on Earth am I good at that I could use to help? Eating!

Or for the purposes of a challenge – stopping eating. Not altogether obviously but as Lent was approaching, I decided to give up all my favourite treats like crisps, chocolate, biscuits and cakes during Lent and hopefully raise some money and lose some pounds in the process.

I set up a Crowdfunder through JustGiving and set a target of £500. It might not get us a minibus, but it would at least get us a bit closer. Little did I know that the good people of Kilbarchan Kirk would make me raise that target three times over the period of Lent. Family and friends played a big part, but it was the phenomenal support from this congregation that really blew my target sky high. After-church coffee time is a big part of the church experience, and it played a huge part in helping me collect donations. Sitting in the hall with a cup of tea, and no biscuit, I was amazed at the amount of people who wanted to hand me money. Every week I'd head down the road with pockets bulging and add it all straight into the Crowdfunder. I can't thank everyone enough for their incredible generosity. Between the Crowdfunder and personal cheques made out directly to Friends of Adams House, the total raised was £2450. Absolutely amazing!

As Lent was coming to an end Linda and I were able to attend a fundraiser organised by Adams House in Elderslie Bowling Club. A few drinks, a dance, a raffle, and no snacks, for me at least. There were a few resident's families there but mostly it was friends and family of the care home staff. Not only do they do an amazing job looking after those in their care, but they also go the extra mile to help add even more to that care. Amazing people. It was a very successful night, raising £3700. I've never seen so many raffle prizes. Adding this to my own total, plus fundraising from other resident's families, we had raised around £7000 in four weeks. A huge step towards the goal. An incredible effort.

The current minibus has just passed another M.O.T. This time it is hoped that it is the last year of M.O.T. prayers as Adams House has just been given permission to order a new bus. Waiting time on orders is around ten months so fingers crossed the new bus is in place for next summer and residents can enjoy a few away days in style.

Thanks again to everyone who contributed in such spectacular fashion, smashing my target on several occasions. A fantastic result.


On our last session before the summer break we met on 20th May when we were outside for fun and games and I can safely say that we all had great fun!!!
