Message from Father Apostolos

When The Phone Rings



Twenty years ago one sparkling September evening our lives were forever changed by a phone call that announced the passing of our 16 year-old goddaughter in an automobile accident on the drive home from school. Ten years later on another beautiful September afternoon another phone call announced the passing of my best friend and brother priest to a heart attack.

In both instances, the world stopped spinning as we were tipped into the blackness of profound grief. For many long weeks there was but a micro-second of peace upon waking before the shadow of loss stretched over the breaking day. We went through the motions of everyday life joylessly, affecting a cheerful disposition for our children's sake but hollowed out inside.

In time, the pain subsided to a dull ache and the blessed rhythm of the mundane helped us get acquainted with a "new normal" with gaping holes where loved ones used to be. And I offer this reflection to share whatever insights I may have gleaned, personally and pastorally, with others who are struggling or who will struggle with grief.

How do we keep moving when a phone call or a piece of mail rocks our world? When the stability of our life is stripped away and when doubt replaces faith, when darkness seems to overtake the light? There are no pat or easy answers. Grief is a first-person experience and unique for each of us. Even our most precious Orthodox faith can be sorely tested in the fog of mourning.

When tragedy strikes we must give ourselves permission to grieve, to cry, to rage. Acceptance is the final stage of the grieving process but it cannot be rushed and there are no schedules or timetables for how quickly we move through the stages of denial, anger, and negotiation.

Years ago, the bitter taste of loss settled heavily over the parish I was serving as we witnessed in a few short weeks the passing of babies and children, brides-to-be and young people, those in the prime of life and venerable family members. In order to help the community navigate the grieving process, I invited grief counselors to conduct a seminar for the parish and their presentation was very helpful.

For instance, we were encouraged to reach out to our family physicians for medical support when needed and this without any taint of shame or judgment. One unexpected death in the parish I served years ago was so devastating that the entire family of the deceased had to be admitted for treatment in the same hospital where the father had died.

Loss impacts our bodies as forcefully as our hearts, minds, and souls. Insomnia, loss of appetite, lethargy, intense anger, and clinical depression are all common ailments and can be particularly pronounced for long-time caregivers. Seeking medical help is often necessary to allow the somatic shock of the loss to subside.

Questions of faith and the purposes of God may also arise, certainly in the case of an untimely death or the passing of a child or young person. These questions, arising from the depths of the heart, cannot be answered but must be asked. The question "Why?" is the one most readily posed and the one for which no good answer exists. I have learned to resist the urge to offer up glib replies, even passages from Holy Scripture, until the intensity of grief has abated.

After one of the many funerals I conducted that dread summer years ago, my Metropolitan pulled me

aside as I struggled with my own grief to tell me "God takes us to Himself when we are closest to Him." Hearing this from him helped me confront my own feelings of doubt.

What can we do for those who are enduring a period of grief? How can we effectively alleviate at least some of their pain? Grief counselors all agree that merely being physically present is of tremendous benefit. In the flurry of activity between death and burial the family and friends gather to support the survivors. But it is after the shock of loss wears off that the heaviness of grief settles in and it is at this point when support is truly needed.

Words are of very little value here, certainly trite ones like "God never gives us more than we can bear," or "He/she is in a better place." Such well-meaning clichés can even do more harm than good. Simply being a comforting presence, stopping by with food or coffee, helping with everyday tasks, or sitting quietly to share memories, on the other hand, are tangible expressions of care.

And as Orthodox Christians, we have access to tools which can guide us through the grieving process. The Trisagion service can be said for the souls of any we have lost, even in the case of our non-Orthodox family members and friends. This need not be done only on a Sunday after the liturgy but may be offered privately at a time convenient to the suffering.

The little-known but beautiful Akathist Hymn for the Departed may also be offered. These stanzas of lyric prayer can be incorporated into our prayers in the home and need not be formal. St. Paul reminds us that "when one member of the Body suffers the whole Body suffers." Grief, though always personal, ought not be endured in isolation.

As much as we may wish it otherwise, grief and loss is part of the fabric of life and cannot be avoided. But "a burden shared is a burden halved" holds true and by "bearing one another's burden" we "fulfill the law of Christ" among ourselves.

Father Speaks to the Children

+ THE HOLY TRINITY ENDOWMENT FUND +

The Holy Trinity Endowment Fund was established in 1992 with an initial deposit of \$2,000. The goal was to build the Endowment Fund whereby the interest and appreciation would one day provide sufficient income so Holy Trinity would no longer be <u>totally dependent</u> on an annual festival to supplement Stewardship income.

The Endowment Fund is obligated to preserve the donor's contributions such that the principal will remain <u>inviolate</u> and be held in perpetuity by the Church. The funds are prudently managed by the investment committee, which reports to the Parish Council. The only withdrawals from the fund the investment committee approves are from the earnings and appreciation above the donor's contributions. Withdrawals are used only to benefit Holy Trinity and its ministries.

Over the course of the past twenty-six years the committee has held steadfast to this mission, and as a result, generous donors from our Church, desiring to leave a legacy in perpetuity for their family, have made contributions totaling 520,000. Those original contributions have grown to the current value of \$882,606.

The Endowment Fund has, over the past few years returned to the Church over \$50,000 in dividends and has applied over \$110,000 of appreciated value to reduce the outstanding balance of our loan from \$998,000 to \$651,000. When the Endowment Funds were pledged as collateral at Chase to secure the loan, they reduced the annual interest rate on the loan from 7.25% to 2.45%. This resulted in an interest savings of over \$50,000 per year for over seven years. The loan was transferred to the American Bank & Trust in August 2015, (without the Endowment Funds as collateral) and is now at \$651,000 @ 3 ½%.

During this weekend, we have so very many opportunities to witness to and share our Orthodoxy (and Greek Orthodoxy in particular) with the many visitors we have at Holy Trinity Cathedral. In addition to sharing our foods, Dance, and Music traditions, we are also sharing our Liturgical music and worship through our Church Tours, featuring our Choir and Chanters along with the beautiful explanations offered by Father Apostolos, and through answering the many questions our guests have about who we are we share our very beliefs. Please try



to remember to refer guests to browse through the St. Nectarios Books & Beyond to give them the opportunity to see the items we use in our worship, and to perhaps have a chance to have a more relaxed and personal conversation about Orthodoxy. October Holy Days:

October 6—Thomas the Apostle: in Hebrew the name means "twin," and he was a twin. This is the Apostle who doubted Christ's Holy Resurrection until he could touch His wounds personally. He preached in India, and was martyred on Mount St. Thomas near Madras.



October 18—Luke the Evangelist: the name in Greek means "wolf." A Greek of Antioch, he followed his father's profession and became a physician. St. Luke is called "the Glorious Physician" in Colossians 4:14. He was a fellow worker of St. Paul and stayed with him until Paul's martyrdom. There is no evidence that Luke himself suffered martyrdom.



October 18—Marinos the Martyr: I'm sorry, I only know he was the Elder at Anazarbus.



October 26—Demetrios the Myrrh-Streamer: he was a soldier of Thessalonika in the Roman army who preached Christianity to them and converted hundreds. For this he was imprisoned, and was visited there by his friend, Nestor, who told Demetrios about the Emperor's renowned gladiator Lyaeus. Demetrios asked Nestor to challenge Lyaeus, saying that the power of Christian prayer would allow him to defeat the gladiator. When this came to be, the Emperor was so angered that he ordered the immediate deaths of both Nestor and Demetrios. The title "Myrrh-Streamer" means that from his body flows a sweet-smelling liquid, which has been known to bring about many miraculous events and healings.








Maintenance Corner

September has been a busy month for your maintenance committee. Here are the updates:

We were able to repair our main sewer line issue at the Speros Center. Thanks to Jim Contes and API Plumbing, we were able to hydro-blast 55 years of grease out of our lines and they are now like new. This was a big job, but we are glad we did not have to dig up the line. Savings of \$5500!

We had the east side tree removed and a new gate installed just north of the basketball court. This gate will be utilized to bring in our needed equipment, trucks, and trash bins for our Festival operations.

We had to replace a compressor for the freezer in the auxiliary kitchen.



This was an unexpected breakdown and expense, but the freezer is holding at -10 degrees!



Seeing our children in the Divine Service on Sunday brought joy to our Metropolitan Gerasimos' heart as summer gives way to the new school year. Dance rehearsals for our annual Parish Festival have commenced and Sunday school begins just after Labor Day.
