This Morning's Readings

St. Paul's Letter to the Corinthians 1:10-17

Brethren, I appeal to you by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree and that there be no dissensions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there is quarreling among you, my brethren. What I mean is that each one of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispos and Gaius; lest any one should say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas. Beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized any one else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power.

The Gospel according to Matthew 14:14-22

At that time, Jesus saw a great throng; and he had compassion on them, and healed their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a lonely place, and the day is now over; send the crowds away to go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They said to him, "We have only five loaves here and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass; and taking the five loaves and the two fish he looked up to heaven, and blessed, and broke and gave the loaves to the crowds. And they all ate and were satisfied. And they took up twelve baskets full of the broken pieces left over. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children. Then he made the disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds.

Back To School Survival Guide

August 11th, 2019

Another summer break has ended as school resumes in the Phoenix area. Now begins the happy routine of bus stops and carpools, lunch preparation, late-night homework cram sessions, and "I forget to tell you, Mom, I'm supposed to bring 50 cupcakes to school tomorrow."

Too soon, this blessed chapter of a parent's time with their young ones will end and the window of opportunity to mold and guide their child's heart, mind, and soul will be closed. It is astonishing to witness the rapid growth and development of our parish youngsters who, over the course of a single summer, may scarcely resemble their former springtime selves.

How may we maximize our time with our children while they are still under our watchful parental care? As they begin the new school year, fresh textbooks in hand, excited and apprehensive, hopeful of making new friends and of being accepted, how may we offer the correct blend of support and freedom? Here are some thoughts I've acquired which I pray will be helpful.

Encouragement is of utmost importance. The implicit message of conditional acceptance is hard to escape for our young ones. A bad hair day, the wrong brand of sneakers, a bombed test, or any notable difference from the group can wreck a student's day. In a place where conditional acceptance is the norm, we must bathe our children daily in the waters of Jesus' unconditional love. Our children are to be loved simply because they are, not because of what they have or haven't done.

Christian identity is essential for our young ones. They must daily be upheld by parents, and by our parish family in our prayers. It is no easier for them to walk the halls of their schools as Orthodox Christians as it was for us. Certainly in university life, if not well before, believing students may be singled out for ridicule in the godlessness of modern American life. We can greatly assist them by weaving our Orthodox Christian faith into the fabric of our daily and weekly routine.

Curtailing social media is absolutely essential to our children's well being. The scourge of online bullying and belittling is an existential threat to young hearts and minds. News accounts have long documented the horrific toll of this menace which in extreme cases has led to suicide. For the sake of our young one's emotional health, there can exist no right to privacy for our student's social media consumption. Parents, be keenly aware of wild emotional swings related to social media exposure.

Communicate incessantly with your children and ignore their protests about your needling them. Be involved and show obnoxious concern about their well-being. As it is said, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." If a child is being harassed or bullied, is struggling with an assignment or course, is trying to help a friend through a personal crisis, they will only benefit from our guidance and we can only guide them if we know what trials they are undergoing.

Finally, frequent daily prayer is a must. Even praying the Lord's Prayer together in the ride to school or at the breakfast table can be a life-saver. Assisting our students to keep their own small prayer rule, to wear and utilize their prayer rope, to pray before dinner and bedtime are key building blocks to a child's sanctuary. Praying together before important tests and presentations, recitals, or sporting events will infuse confidence in our children.

Our Back-To-School blessing will take place next Sunday morning. Let's band together as a family of faith to intercede for our students as the new school year begins!
