

Sunday, August 18th, 2019 - 9th Sunday of Matthew

This Morning's Readings

St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 3:9-17

Brethren, we are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, God's building. According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and another man is building upon it. Let each man take care how he builds upon it. For no other foundation can any one lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Now if any one builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw - each man's work will become manifest; for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each one has done. If the work which any man has built on the foundation survives, he will receive a reward. If any man's work is burned up, he will suffer loss, though he himself will be saved, but only as through fire. Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? If any one destroys God's temple, God will destroy him. For God's temple is holy, and that temple you are.

The Gospel according to Matthew 14:22-34

At that time, Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat by this time was many furlongs distant from the land, beaten by the waves; for the wind was against them. And in the fourth watch of the night he came to them, walking on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out for fear. But immediately he spoke to them, saying "Take heart, it is I; have no fear." And Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, bid me come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat and walked on the water and came to Jesus; but when he saw the wind, he was afraid, and beginning to sink he cried out, "Lord, save me." Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "O man of little faith, why did you doubt?" And when they entered the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God." And when they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret.

We Need a Moment....

August 18th, 2019

It seems like it comes earlier and earlier every year; the lull of Summer is ending and our lives are taking off again in all their hectic glory. Summer hopefully brought some much-needed relaxation to our lives but it feels like within the first few weeks of school (whether we're in it or our children are) our lives have returned to "the grind" or "reality." They can quickly become overwhelming, or even worse, numbing. We can feel as if we're just going through the motions to get to the next task on our list, be it schoolwork, housework, or at our jobs. Here's where we need to pay attention to what the Gospel is telling us this week.

There is a very powerful sentence in the Gospel today that we will read right over if we are not careful. After Jesus had fed the 5,000 with 5 loaves and 2 fish and before he continued through the countryside in his ministry, "and when He [Jesus] had sent the multitudes away, He went up on the mountain by Himself to pray."

If our Lord and God Incarnate needed time alone to pray, to collect Himself, how much more do we? We are made to be in communion with God and our tradition tells us that retreating into ourselves in silence is absolutely crucial in our life and spiritual struggle. This is often extremely difficult in our busy lives. However, when we are alone and in silence (this means no phones either!) we are truly able to focus on Christ and our soul. In this silence and retreat (even just to our rooms) we are forced to be with ourselves and to see ourselves for who we are and who God is, and when we are confronted by our sinfulness and our struggles, we offer that prayer of Peter, "Lord save me!"

It can be overwhelming to be absolutely silent with just the Jesus Prayer ("Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner") on our lips, but this is where true spiritual growth happens and our soul, which is so often neglected, is nourished. In this silence we can confront our struggles or our joys and offer them to God.

As human beings we have an innate need to be in communication with our Maker but we look in the wrong places. This is what we search for when we dive deeper and deeper into our "connections" through technology and social media. We seek communion with the Infinite God but in finite things. St. Maximos the Confessor (who we celebrated this week) warns us of this path that we often follow down, speaking of an endless pursuit of "pleasure," that we seek through connection with other things in our life and unless we seek our fulfilment in God, this pursuit will always end in spiritual, physical, and emotional "death." Only communion with God can offer us this outlet for our infinite desire and love that we have been created with, by God. We need to stop and be silent with God.

Our lives are so busy that we often hope to see God in powerful, noticeable moments right in front of us and gain our spiritual nourishment from that. We can look to the example of Elijah in the Old Testament to see how this is not the way that God usually operates. In 3rd Kingdoms Elijah asks God for guidance and goes into the wilderness. He rests and prays and God tells him that He will send a powerful wind that knocks down mountains, then an earthquake, and then a great fire but the Lord will not be in any of these. The Lord will come to him in a gentle, quiet breeze. In our loud and busy day, let us retreat to silence and listen for the Word of the Lord in the gentle breeze.
