This Morning's Readings

St. Paul's Letter to the Hebrews 11:24-26, 32-40

Brethren, by faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to share ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. And what more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets -- who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, received promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign enemies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release, that they might rise again to a better life. Others suffered mocking and scourging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were killed with the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, ill-treated -- of whom the world was not worthy -- wandering over deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, though well attested by their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had foreseen something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

The Gospel According to John 1:43-51

At that time, Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And he found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael, and he said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming to him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" Nathanael said to him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathanael answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." And he said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

In the Image of God

March 8th, 2020

The first Sunday of Great Lent is set aside to commemorate the triumph of Holy Orthodoxy over the heresy of iconoclasm in the 8th century. At the end of the Divine Liturgy this morning, our children will process around the nave holding their icons while the hymns are sung, then to recite together the Synodikon of the 7th Ecumenical Council.

Yet, beneath these externals there exists the primordial truth concerning the nature of humanity's existence as being fashioned in the Image of God. Our origin story begins with the Trinitarian proclamation "Let us make Man in Our Image" before God "fashioned" us from the dust of the earth and breathed into our nostrils the breath of life and we became "a living soul."

St. Paul reminds us that this Image-bearing potential in us will ultimately be fulfilled in Jesus Christ; "and just as we have borne the image of the earthly man, so shall we bear the Image of the Heavenly Man." (1 Cor. 15:49) Jesus Christ is the Prototype of humanity as the Perfect Man, the God-man by Whom all things were and are created. (John 1)

We live in an image-drenched world, one in which images flash ceaselessly before our eyes in a blur of advertising chatter. Every available marketing space is made to serve the cause of commerce, every encounter measured on the P&L for profit potential. No aspect of human existence is immune from this impulse and lost in this maelstrom of images is the beleaguered image of God in man. "How is this the case?" one might ask. Iconoclasm was not finally defeated in 787 AD in Nicaea. It persists to this day and wears many faces.

Wherever poverty exists, wherever children go to bed hungry, or are abused or neglected, wherever refugees are herded into internment camps or cages, wherever little ones quake in fear as war erupts around them, Iconoclasm is present.

Wherever young ones are sex-trafficked for sordid pleasure and profit, wherever adolescents struggle with false images of alleged perfection and are made to feel inferior to the photo-shopped images held up as 'normal,' Iconoclasm is present.

So too, wherever the breathtaking ignorance of bigotry and racism persists and where political, social, economic, or nativist divisions affirm the humanity of some while denying it to others, Iconoclasm is present.

Our proclamation of the Synodikon of the 7th Ecumenical Council will ring hollow so long as we fail to apprehend the face of Christ in every human person we encounter. The Church has ever stood as a bastion of support for all the Image-bearers on the fringes of life from whom the powerful would gladly strip the dignity of humanity. And in her finer moments, she has evinced the courage to oppose the various "-ism's" behind which iconoclasts run for cover.

As we celebrate the triumph of Holy Orthodoxy over the iconoclasts, let us pray that our hearts might be enlarged in love to embrace the Image of God without reservation of qualification in every human soul we encounter.

Therefore, with fraternal and filial love we praise the heralds of the faith, those who with glory and honor have struggled for the faith, and we say: to the champions of Orthodoxy, 'faithful emperors, most-holy patriarchs, hierarchs, teachers, martyrs, and confessors: May your memory be eternal.

Everlasting be their memory. (Three times!)

Let us beseech God that we may be instructed and strengthened by the trials and struggles of these saints, which they endured for the faith even unto death, and by their teachings, entreating that we may to the end imitate their godly life. May we be deemed worthy of obtaining our requests through the mercy and grace of the Great and First Hierarch, Christ our God, through the intercessions of our glorious Lady, the Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary, the divine angels and all the Saints. Amen




