Legislative Affairs Officer's Report

Well, it is the time of year where one can get tangled with a *Chrysaora chesapeakei*. Better known as the sea nettle, the most common jellyfish in the Bay. There is the sketchy and remarkably robust underworld of Chesapeake folk remedies for jellyfish stings. Some recommend “splash seawater and apply meat tenderizer to the sore area”.

Our local sea nettle delivers a moderately painful sting that doctors say is not usually dangerous unless the recipient develops a severe allergic reaction or a small child is stung over a large part of their body (in which case call 911 immediately). The pain from most sea nettle stings usually peaks within five minutes and dissipates over the next few hours.

There is evidence that Native Americans applied tobacco leaves directly to the body to alleviate pain and that a tobacco poultice was used prior to 1860 to treat insect stings, so this may be the oldest known recipe for relief from Chesapeake jellyfish stings.

The truth is that there is no firm consensus from the medical profession on the ideal treatment for sea nettle stings. The Seattle Children's Hospital provides the following care advice for stings from jellyfish in the Chesapeake:

- Rinse the area with seawater to remove large tentacles.
- Scrape the area with a credit card or blunt knife to remove small stingers.
- Rinse the area with a mixture of seawater and baking soda for 15 minutes (for Chesapeake jellyfish do not use vinegar, which may trigger the stingers).
- As needed, give the patient pain medicine such as acetaminophen, rub with an ice cube, and apply hydrocortisone cream.

But you can also always exercise the only 100% foolproof way of avoiding stings—grab a beer, sit high and dry on your boat or dock and watch the jellyfish enjoying their lives pulsing around in the beautiful Chesapeake Bay.

And finally food for thought. We all know as boat owners it is our responsibility to know our boats and to be prepared for emergencies. We must ask ourselves are we able to handle our boat in rough conditions? Do we know where all our thru hull valves are located? Are we able to make simple repairs to our boat's engine should the need arise? If a crew member were to fall overboard, would we be able to recover him or her? Do we know the location of essential items such as our boat's fire extinguisher, VHF radio, medical kit, light switches, hatches, tool kit and other items—and can we find these things in the dark?

Here are five tips from the nonprofit BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water that can help ensure everyone's safety as temperatures climb during the **Hot , Hazy, Humid Days of August and September**. Take care and Be Safe.

“1. Create shade. Direct sunlight can make the air feel 10- to 15 degrees warmer. Reduce the time you spend in it. If you don't have a cabin or bimini top that offers sun protection, wide-brimmed hats; loose fitting, moisture-wicking clothing (try a UPF-rated long sleeve shirt); or fishing neck gaiters are next best. Of course, reef-friendly sunblock is a must for burn prevention.

2. Keep extra water aboard. Yeah, that's a no-brainer. However, you'd be surprised how many boaters bring just enough water for a single day's outing. Crew and guests may want to consume water like out of a firehose on super-hot days! (Good boating housekeeping tip: Keep a supply of bottled water in a locker or dry bilge area next to the hull, below the waterline. The water will stay cooler than the air temperature, and it makes it easy to share – or restock your cooler.)

3. Know how to stay cool, safely. Of course, boaters can take advantage of the best way to stay cool: jump in! Just don't jump off a moving vessel. Find a safe, out-the-way anchorage, drop the hook, and enjoy!

4. Know the signs of heatstroke. Heatstroke occurs when the body is unable to cool down. It can happen either gradually or suddenly. Telltale signs are heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, fainting, skin hot to the touch, nausea or vomiting. Infants and children are especially susceptible. Immediately moving the victim to a cooler environment and providing lots of fluids can help buy time for a heatstroke victim until you reach first responders.

5. Have a way to communicate. If you have an unexpected breakdown or other issue, this is not the time of year to be stuck out on the water. Not only is the temperature a significant



stressor, atmospheric conditions, especially in the afternoon hours, can bring sudden and powerful storms. Ensure your VHF is operational, and bring your cellphone, keeping it dry and charged.”

Protocol Matters

Official Change of Officers

As the summer winds down, most yacht clubs in our area are preparing to change their officers to lead their clubs and organizations for the next term. So, when does a Commodore Elect become the Commodore, at the ball or at the Change of Watch?

The Commodore-elect becomes Commodore when they are sworn in. The swearing in occasion where the new group (traditionally called "The Bridge" in yacht clubs) officially takes over from the old group is called Change of Watch (COW). In the nautical tradition, a sailor on official duty is said to be "On Watch". The oncoming group officially takes on their duties and responsibilities by relieving the current watch standers and assuming the watch.

The Commodores Ball is the official celebration of the Change of Watch and it is perfectly proper for the COW to occur at the Ball. The CCC Ball is a perfect example where the COW occurs at the Ball.

In typical yacht club fashion, where simple events often become great parties, Commodores Balls grew from the simple COW ceremony. People thought "why not have a dinner, a cocktail hour, and a band, etc.?" There is no need for a club to hold two separate parties for COW and the Commodores Ball as this is hammering the same nail twice.

For practical reasons, there is often a lot of time between the official COW, as called for in the club By-Laws, and the Commodores Ball. In such cases, clubs will hold a simple swearing-in, usually at the end of the annual meeting. At the Commodores Ball, even though people are already in office, the ceremony symbolically goes through the COW again, often including swearing in and handover of the gavel. That is why the outgoing Commodore "assumes the watch" for the final time and receives the visitor salutes. This practice also allows the guest of honor, the incoming commodore, to be introduced last, as is right and proper. Keep in mind that the new commodore and officers have already greeted their guests in the receiving line prior to the ceremony.

YCM Burgee: Can be flown by any member of a club that belongs to YCM. It is not to fly in place of the club burgee at the bow but may be flown on a portside hoist or attachment point or a separate rail mount flag post aft of the bow post.



YCM Delegates Flag: Can be flown by any Current Club Delegate to YCM. Flown as a club office on the Starboard side or on the port side under the club burgee for which the person is a delegate. As a current office, is flown above the P/C Flag and below any higher-ranking current club office.



What Yacht Clubs of Maryland provides for its member Clubs

Below is a summary:

1. Legislative and Regulatory Representation: Because we are focused only on Maryland and rely on directly affected local volunteers, we are usually ahead of other organizations in knowing and acting on issues of concern to Maryland yacht clubs and their members. If you have been following our publications or getting meeting reports from your representatives, you know that the 2015 legislation session held no significant problems for clubs and boaters. Other years have been a different story. Recent efforts have included, YCM submitting written testimony in opposition to the Boating Fees Bill (HB 1307) and the Luxury Tax Bill (HB 1345), contacted legislators, and had YCM reps attend the hearings on behalf of the clubs. At one of the hearings, with Cheryl Blakey and Joe Hellner (attending on behalf of YCM) noted committee members hitting points right off our written testimony. We worked collaboratively with CBYCA and kept them in the loop. We also investigated and then contacted officials and other organizations on the large gathering permit bill, which, once amended in response to feedback from the marine trades, YCM, and boating groups, had no effect on normal yacht club activities. Throughout the year, coordinated by our Legislative Director, volunteers looked into waterway and boating issues brought to us by our members. We also dug to find useful Maryland boating and waterway information so our members wouldn't have to. In 2015, YCM P/C Joe Hellner was appointed by the DNR Secretary to the Maryland Boat Act Advisory Committee as a representative from the yacht club community.

2. Support of Maryland yacht club interaction, communication, and promotion of activities of mutual interest.

a. Hold the Annual Fleet Captains Meeting to allow these (usually new) officers to meet and discuss plans for the upcoming season, collect information about club activities, and collect and publish that information back to the Fleet Captains and member clubs. These folks form the foundation for our Clubs futures and will be working with each other for the next four years. This is the venue that the Rear Commodore uses to introduce the Fleet Captains to the Ship's Log and passes out prior year information that will need to be updated.

b. Maintain the YCM web site, which serves as the Maryland yacht club community bulletin board and is full of information and event news and links. By working with the webmaster, all clubs are welcome to use the website. The past three YCM Monthly Newsletters are always available by link from the website.

c. Publish a Monthly Newsletter covering news of interest, protocol tips, and upcoming activities. By working with the Newsletter Editor, this forum is open to all members. The newsletter is emailed to member club representatives and commodores to pass on to members. Those who would like to get the newsletter directly are welcome to contact the Editor.

d. Meet Monthly with alternating Board and General Membership Meetings as a "Local Community Association" to discuss and work on issues of interests to the members. Each club designates a Representative and Alternate to attend the meetings and provide communication between their club, the YCM, and fellow member clubs around the Bay. These meetings are open to all and lively frank discussion is the norm.

e. Annual SHIP'S LOG: Published each year at the start of boating season contains information provided by each member club intended to be useful to the average club member who wants to know more about other yacht clubs, what they have, and how to visit them. This publication also serves as the annual yearbook capturing people and events of our local yachting community. This is not an ad book as it is intended to and be an informational Service to the Member Clubs. Due to funding limits, printed copies given to each club are limited. The pdf file of SHIP's LOG is available to any member who would like to download the file for club or personal use.

f. Skunk Flag of the Bay Award: Recognizes at least one, sometimes several, members of the yacht club community each year for getting out there and doing something with their boats or with their clubs, leading to outstanding humorous and amusing mishaps and adventures. (continued)



The Awards are given by YCM's own Salty Sam the Sea Dog, who always notes that "Those who don't make mistakes must not be doing anything". Salty also serves as gossip columnist.

g. Regular Email Notification: Each year the YCM Vice Commodore maintains an email distribution list to provide breaking news or information of immediate interest to the members. Examples include "All Hands" notices, flyers from member clubs, Opening and Ball schedules and updates, Sick and Welfare Notices, and Funeral Information. Chances are your officers or Club first "heard about it" from us.

h. Protocol Guidance: Each year, YCM receives and responds numerous questions about why and how we do things in the traditional ways followed by Yacht Clubs, especially the local practices that evolved in Maryland over many generations. YCM appoints a qualified volunteer called "Captain Protocol" to do the research, be the keeper of the knowledge, and find ways to help the member clubs. Often questions become the genesis for regular articles in the newsletter. Recently, "Captain Protocol" provided Pleasant YC with the details of conducting an Opening Day Ceremony as practiced by Maryland clubs around the Northern Chesapeake Bay and distributed a one-page guide to placement of buttons, pins, and nameplates on yacht club uniforms.

3. Organize and Lead the Annual Yacht Club Golf Tournament to get together in a different type of activity that is popular among many club members in addition to their boating hobby. This event is darn hard to do so great credit goes to the Chairpersons and army of volunteers who create this special opportunity for the golfers and would be golfers in our clubs.

4. Organize and Lead the Annual Christmas and Holiday Party open to members and friends of all Maryland Clubs. This event is held at Laurel Park as a unique event, different from regular club activities, which celebrates Maryland's proud heritage of Thoroughbred Horse Racing while providing a centrally located venue where a (continued)



large number of folks from all the clubs together can gather to celebrate the holiday season.

5. General Support of Member Clubs:

a. Our goal is be there when Clubs are stuck on something. One area that has been well received has been our pursuit and stocking of hard-to-find silver buttons for club Past Commodores, especially since local tailors and online companies willing to carry these items are few. We were able to find the company that makes buttons, which provides us with wholesale bulk orders of all the types. We also keep a stock of silver hat braids and hat buttons.

b. Harnessing the power of many: YCM is the place to come if a member club has an idea or a problem that can be acted upon by finding and pulling together people of like mind and who have the passion and interest to pursue it.
