We've added to our programming with an event scheduled for *June 14th 'A Day in the Life'* to be held at the Mt. Hope Library, 315 Academy Avenue, Providence featuring

R&B music, life on the road for R&B performers and an overview of our organization and accomplishments. We will also have a table at the *Juneteenth Celebration (June 19)* at Roger Williams Park Temple of Music. We are planning presentations in schools that receive musical instruments through our Instruments for Children Program, libraries, music venues, clubs and other organizations for outreach. The Instruments for Children program is continuing along, accepting instruments, refurbishing them as needed and filling requests from schools as they come in. School music programs seem to be picking up speed as the pandemic hopefully continues to wind down. Most donations are coming in from our web presence and word of mouth at this point. We still have a decent inventory as most schools are getting to capacity due in part from our efforts to supply their needs. Schools we serve include Woonsocket Middle School, Trinity Academy for the Performing Arts, Lincoln Middle School, Times 2 Academy, the Anthony Carnevale Elementary School, and the Martin Luther King Community Center. Thanks to Roberts Music, Musicians Corner and Village Drum for their support in cleaning, refurbishing and repairing donated instruments.

Nat King Cole and Paul Fillipi at the Celebrity Club The Rhode Island Black Heritage Society and the Rhode Island Rhythm And Blues Preservation Society joined hands to raise funds to place an historical marker in Randall Square. This marker commemorates and celebrates Paul Fillipi and his Celebrity Club, Rhode Island's first integrated nightclub. The Celebrity Club was founded by Filippi, an Italian American who loved jazz, and was eager to make a difference in a segregated city. It was the first interracial club in New England, welcoming black and white musicians and audiences. Before it opened, African Americans in Providence who wanted to listen to live jazz, or even just go out for dinner, had to cram into narrow, crowded black neighborhood clubs or travel to other cities.

In addition to providing blacks and whites a chance to enjoy the best jazz music in Providence, the Celebrity Club worked for racial equality. It maintained, notes historian McGill, "a solid stance of openness and equality," by providing its performers what one of them called "a musician's paradise" and paying its African American

employees top union wages. But not everyone was happy to see a successful interracial club. The Providence police raided it regularly, harassing black club-goers. Filippi sold the Celebrity Club in 1958, and it closed in 1960. A commemorative plaque was erected in 2013 and can be viewed on the east side of the Marriott Hotel where Charles and Ashburton Streets merge.

Duke Ellington stayed with friends when he played the Celebrity Club and could be found casually walking Providence's East Side streets. Music legends Ella Fitzgerald, Nat King Cole, Little Richard, Billie Holiday, Fats Domino and Joyce Bryant all performed in the venue. Red and Arthur Prysock entertained the locals here. It was a small, cozy place, but world-class things happened there.

Even though many of us were not living in Rhode Island during the Celebrity Club's heyday, this effort to commemorate what the Celebrity Club meant to the Rhode Island community is honorable. A reception sponsored by the Rhode Island Black Heritage Society was a wonderful event that gave local people who patronized the Celebrity Club a chance to tell delightful stories about the entertainers they saw there and the great times they shared with their friends and neighbors. Their stories and anecdotes did not exclude the difficulties the club suffered because of Rhode Island racism.

Some of our members attended the reception and enjoyed the whole experience. The late Richard Pina, former Treasurer, told a couple of outrageously funny stories about what happened to him when his mother took him there when he was a child. We hope you'll take the time to find the Celebrity Club Plaque.



He was a founding member of RIRPBS and served as an Honorary Member of the Board. He was committed to preserving, promoting and educating the community on the early history of R&B in Rhode Island. After a 33 year career with UPS he also served as a member of the Fox Point Boys Club and Cape Verdean Progressive Center (CV Club). He could always be found on the dance floor with his

beloved wife Donna, an Honorary member and founder of RIRPBS. He was a mentor to community youth and had a passion for entrepreneurship, encouraging the youth 'to strive for the top'.




Jose Santos (Joe Simmons) 1935-2020 Tribute & Contributions

He was the owner of Video Specialists, was an avid golfer, bowler and skier. He was an Army veteran and member of the Military Police. Jose gave freely of his time as an entertainer for residents of senior housing and performing for the homeless at Newman Congregational Church.
