I took my first music class in an all-black elementary school in the Jim Crow South. They tried, but no, they couldn't teach me to sing. They placed a variety of musical instruments in my hands, but again, they failed. I had no talent for playing or singing. The music class, however, changed my life. It planted within me an eternal interest in the origins and history of black music in America. The knowledge that I gained from chasing down this history helped to change the way I viewed myself and how I fit into the hostile environment in which I was born. It changed me for the better. It is indeed possible that no other class that I ever took helped me more than my music class in spite of the fact that I never learned to play or sing.

Here I go again: preaching about the importance of music in our school system. I know that, in most instances, our readers already know this; and I am, therefore, preaching to the choir. Most of the young people who benefit from the music programs supported by our Instruments for Children Program will not become professional musicians. However, their lives, like mine, will be eternally enriched by the experience; and that is just wonderful.

However, some seeds do grow into mighty oaks. Quincy Jones, who plays a multitude of musical instruments, got his start in church; but he probably would not have become the music icon that he is today without the support he received in a public school in Seattle, Washington. Louis Armstrong, an orphan, got his start in the Fisk School for Boys and after some problems with truancy continued his musical education in the New Orleans School for Colored Waifs. Ray Charles' musical reign was spawned in the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind in St. Augustine Florida.

All three of these music titans credit much of their success to the support they received in the classroom from committed veteran musicians. We have added *Master Classes* to our Instruments for Children Program because we too, know how important it is for these young people to connect with established musicians.

Whether our students simply like to sing in the shower; or they chose to make an everlasting impression in the music world, it is all good; and it is our goal to support them whatever they decide to do.

2016 posed some new challenges for our organization primarily due to limited support and resources to assist with our various programs. We have been forced to re-think our goals and programming leading to three major concerns; the continuing effort to attract attendees to our musical events; the introduction of the Master Class to our Instrument for Children Program recipients; and on-going discussions within our Board concerning the

number and types of events we will hold annually. We consistently attempt to

attract audiences to our musical events through several approaches; mailings, email, facebook, website, advertising in local media, word of mouth and collaborations with other organizations. We have achieved less than adequate results. One of the discussions we need to have concerns the target group we are attempting to attract. The philosophy/goal of our organization is to 'preserve & promote R&B music through activities, events and education . . . as a musical art form.' In my view we have done a commendable job in achieving this goal. However there is more to be accomplished. We must focus on a

new and younger constituency; namely younger adults and students in targeted schools. In an effort to accomplish this, I, with the support and assistance from Randall Ashe introduced the concept of Master Classes to the students and faculty at the Trinity Academy for the Performing Arts (TAPA) in Providence. This was extremely successful and well received by students, faculty and administrators at TAPA. Plans are in the works to continue this approach and expand it to other schools and school systems in the future. This type of class is essential to the future development of young musicians and the involvement of their parents and friends.

In an effort at attracting younger adults to our events we will need to change the types of entertainment/bands featured at our dances/concerts. This will also necessitate a change in our methods of advertising and promotion. The major emphasis/task will be to identify the popular bands that are successful in our area. To do this we must attend venues where these bands perform. Hopefully this approach may provide a connection with a new audience. In addition, promoting a major event may provide an incentive for a new population to become more aware of and interested in our organization.

Taken together, these concerns; focusing on a younger audience, conducting Master Classes and promoting major events may be a way to re-energize and more us forward.

This has been an extremely successful year for our Program with

donations from individuals finding out about us through our internet presence, media and at event. Local Boy Scouts worked on a variety of projects for RIRBPS. One of three Boy Scouts who worked on fundraising collected 33 instruments. Greycin Bobola, a Scout in Troop 1, Diamond Hill, Cumberland, RI organized the car wash in October 2016 as part of his Eagle Scout award. In his request to RIRBPS he stated that "It would be great if I would be able to help you and your organization through this project". This effort highlights the many ways that supporters of our programming may contribute to RIRBPS. Of the donated instruments the brass and woodwind instruments are at Roberts Music for inspection. Many guitars were donated, too many to distribute to school programs. Some need extensive repair, others are available for sale. We also have a drum kit that the schools do not need and we are trying to sell. Two of the four keyboards were placed with the Trinity Academy for the Performing Arts (TAPA). Two others are probably not serviceable.

The Music Department in Woonsocket is in need of flutes and horns. Once Roberts Music cleans, repairs and returns the inventory, we will place them in their program. The Woonsocket School system held a Winter Concert with some of our instruments recipients participating. We are seeking other school systems and music programs that may be in need of instrument donations including the Warwick School System and East Providence School System.


