The Signs of St. John's



Dear Beloved St. John's,

Slow down. Keep quiet. It's Advent.

These are the words that have echoed in my mind each and every year since I first heard them in 2010. They are an invitation and a directive, countercultural and completely welcome. I find these words harder and harder to live by, and yet more important than ever.

Slow down. Intellectually, I know what this means. My body, however, does not. With my life the way that it is (and the way that I have made it), I know two speeds: *Warp Speed* from 7 AM to 9 PM - with daycare, work, dogs, meal prep, etc. - then *Dead Stop* from 9 PM until I make it up to bed. Slowing down means almost nothing to me. How do I keep doing all the things that I need to do, get at least some of the rest that I need, and honor this season of waiting? The answer is that I can't. Slowing down necessarily means that some things are not going to get done. Slowing down means being more intentional about the things that do happen, and being more present while they are.

Keep quiet. Another phrase that is foreign to me. For better or worse, I always have something to say. And I'm not afraid to say it—LOUDLY. During my hours of Warp Speed, quiet actually makes me uncomfortable. I've never been to the grocery store and not had a lovely conversation with someone unexpected. The office is always buzzing with conversation, the printer, a distant piano playing, or the noise from my own keyboard. In the car, I always have the radio or a podcast playing, or I'm talking to Mac about the day. I find it incredibly challenging to keep myself quiet, and to keep my environment quiet as well. Keeping quiet means being uncomfortable, actively creating spaces void of noise—including my own head. Keeping

quiet means listening on a level that would challenge the most introverted therapist. It's Advent. Ah, now that I understand. It's the time that we, as a faith community and followers of Christ, set aside to wait. To prepare. To slow down and keep quiet, whether we like it or not. The only other time in my life that has had the vibe of Advent is the month before I gave birth to Mac. I had a million things to do at work to prepare for maternity leave and two million things to do at home to prepare for a baby. I didn't get to a fraction of them due to a combination of distraction, brain fog, and sheer exhaustion. I had to slow down because I physically and mentally couldn't go any faster. I had to keep quiet if I was going to get any rest. Circumstances forced my hand, making it the most exciting and exhausting period of my life.

Friends, this is Advent—exciting and exhausting, forcing ourselves to go in the opposite direction of the world. When everything and everyone is telling us to move faster, buy more gifts, bake more cookies, spend more money, sleep less, listen to more Christmas music before it goes off the radio, and lose patience with each other. Advent tells us the opposite. Advent tells us that this time of waiting is precious. It tells us to do less, to go slower, to find something between *Warp Speed* and *Dead Stop*. This season, give yourself over to the waiting—to the excited anticipation and the beautifully exhausting task of just being.

Slow down. Keep quiet. It's Advent.

Vestry Notes from November 16, 2023 Meeting


The Memorial Garden maintenance contract was approved for 2023/2024.

SAFETY CORNER

The holidays are a magical time. Unfortunately, it's also the time of year when scams become a nightmare. Here are some tips for a safer holiday!

Verify online stores

To avoid <u>shopping scams</u>, when typing in a URL, doubleand triple-check the spelling to ensure you are on the correct page. Scammers often create a URL with one letter off from the authentic one in hopes you won't catch it.

Change the way you think

Learn how to not engage. You are under no obligation in these modern times to respond to calls, emails or texts from strangers — especially given that so many of them are fraudulent

Learn to say no. Sometimes a caller will get through. Get tough: Say, "I do not do business over the phone. Goodbye." Then hang up without remorse.

Stop at the mailbox

Informed Delivery is a free service from the U.S. Postal Service. The agency emails photos of letter-size mail expected to be delivered to you that day or shortly after. This is a great way to be sure that nothing is stolen from your mailbox by ID thieves.

- 1. The red cross on the white field is an ancient Christian symbol, white representing the purity of Jesus and red representing his sacrifice on the cross and the blood of Christian martyrs. The red cross is known as the cross of St. George, patron saint of England, and indicates the Episcopal Church's decent from the Church of England.
- 2. False All baptized Christians are welcome to take communion in the Episcopal Church.
- 3. As of 2018, the diocese has **16 regions** with 68,902 members and 180 congregations.
- 4. We belong to The Diocese of Southern Virginia. The diocese was formed in 1892 from the extensive Diocese of Virginia. Today, the diocese stretches more than 300 miles from the Atlantic Ocean westward to the Dan River and from the south side of the James River at Richmond to the North Carolina border.
