As the season of Lent draws to a close this year, I again find myself quite excited about the arrival of Easter. During our mid-week services we considered "Our Lord's Passion through the eyes of ..." various individuals who would have been there to witness these incredible events. That means that each week I was challenged to think about the events of that very first Holy Week in ways that I may not have thought about them before.

As I read and studied the various Scriptural accounts of our Lord's Passion, I attempted to put myself into the shoes of "... One in the Crowd" (for Ash Wednesday), of "... the Proprietor of the Upper Room," of "... Malchus," of "... Peter," of "... Marry, the mother of our Lord," and of "... a priest serving in the temple at the time of Jesus' crucifixion." And each week I came to see myself from a slightly different perspective. At times I sympathized with the characters, and at times I empathized with them. Sometimes it was easy to imagine what might have been going through their minds; for others this was more challenging to imagine.



And each week I began to appreciate anew that it was for ME that He came. It was for ME that He suffered, and bled, and died. It was for ME that He was ridiculed, mocked, spit upon, and beaten. It was MY sin, MY self-centeredness, and MY rebelliousness that caused His pain. He paid the price for MY greed and pride. He shouldered MY burdens and He paid the wages of MY sin.

All for ME ... and, <u>all for You!!!</u> He did it all because that is what He had been sent to do; that's what He had come to do. As "Mary" shared with us one evening, He could have come down off that cross, He could have "saved" Himself, but He would not, because He loved us that much. It was all for us ... and on Easter morning we discover that all He did was pleasing to God, and that Christ's once and for all time sacrifice for the sins of all mankind was sufficient and complete. The work of redemption was complete; peace had been once again established between God and man, and sin – death - and the devil would no longer have the final word. His empty tomb means ours will one day be empty as well, when He comes in glory to raise us and to take us to be with Him forever.



People loved by God, my sin is great ... but our Savior (and His love for us) is even greater! During Lent we have pondered once again His great suffering on our behalf, and the greatness and seriousness of our sin. But soon it will be time once again for the Alleluias to return and for the Church to give voice to the glorious news of His resurrection. For as He lives so shall we also live. And on Easter morning what a joy it will be to consider the Resurrection of our Lord through the eyes of His Bride, the Church!

Alleluia. Alleluia. Christ is risen!
He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

It's coming ... soon ... praise be to God!

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a ti-

tle company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.



Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first."

You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it: You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor's possessions are his; you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.



But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's leave. All of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors, and the extension of His kingdom.


BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

AMERICAN HERITAGE GIRLS


