## **Year 10 - CURRICULUM BULLETIN SUMMER 1**



## What the students are learning in

English	Students will be working through their study of Shakespeare's tragic play 'Macbeth' in their Literature lessons, and an ad-hoc lesson of exploring the poems from their Power and Conflict Anthology during Week A. During Week B, students will be studying Language Paper 2 writing skills. This is a focus on writing a transactional/discursive piece of viewpoint writing.  ASSESSMENT – 1. Completing an analytical paragraph of a character from the beginning of the play. 2. Completing a viewpoint writing response to a provided statement. E.G. Letter to the local council on a local issue.
Maths	This half term, Higher students will work with the equation of a circle, quadratic formula, completing the square, area, circumference, volume and surface area. Foundation students will work with Pythagoras, scale diagrams, surface area, area, circumference, and basic trig. They will also start working with sample space and venn diagrams
	ASSESSMENT – No formal assessment this half term but there will be small topic tests on each
	of the new topics we are studying.
Science	Biology – Students will look in detail at the process of photosynthesis, how it allows plants and algae to fix carbon and what effects its rate.  Chemistry – Students will explore the reactivity of different elements and how an understanding of this allows mankind to extract and refine essential resources with a focus on electrolysis.  Physics – Students will explore the particle model of matter and how this links to the density of materials, with the famous storey of the origins of 'Eureka'.  All homework is set 'Friday for Friday' online at 'Educake.co.uk'.

Religious Studies	This half term students will be finish their study of Christian Beliefs and will begin to learn about Christian Practices, including worship, festivals and pilgrimage. We will then begin to apply Christian beliefs to a range of topics within the 'Issues of Life & Death' unit including the origin and sanctity of life, abortion and euthanasia.
Spanish	ASSESSMENT – Christian Beliefs (questions A-D) and Christian Practices (questions A-D)  This term students will be continuing to develop their awareness and understanding of phonics
Spanish	This term students will be continuing to develop their awareness and understanding of phonics, applying it to a range of situations and conversations. They will continue to improve their understanding of present, preterite, future and conditional tenses within the topics of 'Environment' 'Social issues'.





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	ASSESSMENT - Progress Check: Grammar, Translation, Reading, Listening sections. Students
	are not expected to prepare in advance, this is to check their longer-term topic
	knowledge/retrieval. This will take place towards the end of each module.
Art	Students will continue their creative journey based on collections. They will be undertaking a final set of still life photographs to aid their final piece. The artist Joel Penkman will be delivering a workshop to aid their understanding of her art and to support them in developing a quality canvas painting. During this project students will cover all assessment objectives by exploring in more depth how to develop and refine ideas into a final outcome.  ASSESSMENT – Not assessed
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Design	Students will continue to investigate famous products and designers following on from this term's very successful Design History project – well done to all students in the group! There will also be targeted revision lessons throughout and exam practice questions to prepare for the next exam. Practical skills and techniques will also be progressed using workshop facilities. Students will begin preparation of their NEA which contributes to 50% of their final grade. Students are also encouraged to complete coursework preparation, lesson and homework at Y10 Design Club each Wednesday from 3.05 – 4.05pm.

Hospitality	During Hospitality and Catering lessons students will learn about food related causes of ill health. This will
