Recipe Corner Devilled Chicken

Ingredients: 4 Chicken portions 2 level tablespoons Mango Chutney 1 tablespoon Malt Vinegar

- 2 tablespoons Oil
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce

Method:

2 level teaspoons English Mustard ¼ level teaspoon Paprika Pepper Pepper and ½ level teaspoon Salt ½ level teaspoon Mixed Herbs

Lay chicken portions in a shallow ovenproof dish. Put rest of ingredients in small bowl and beat well together with a fork. Pour over chicken, place dish just above centre of oven and cook for approx. 25 mins (or until chicken is well cooked). Baste 2 or 3 times during cooking.
