Carol's Corner

Dear Friends,

"I think it is necessary for us to realize that we have moved from the era of civil rights to the era of human rights...[W]hen we see that there must be a radical redistribution of economic and political power, then we see that for the last twelve years we have been in a reform movement...That after Selma and the Voting Rights Bill, we moved into a new era, which must be an era of revolution...In short, we have moved into an era where we are called upon to raise certain basic questions about the whole society." This is a quote from Martin Luther King Jr. at the Southern Christian Conference Leadership retreat a year before his assassination. It is also the beginnings of the Poor People's Campaign.

Indeed, his assassination and the assassination of Senator Robert Kennedy, a proponent of the campaign caused disarray and confusion and much of the agenda was never completed. King emphasized the need for poor whites, Blacks, Latinos, Asians, and Native Americans to unite. He asserted that the Poor People's Campaign would only be successful if the poor could come together.

Recently several leaders have been gathering and re-igniting this campaign. They have a list of fundamental principles and I'd like to lift up a couple.

"We believe that people should not live in or die from poverty in the richest nation ever to exist. Blaming the poor and claiming that the United States does not have an abundance of resources to overcome poverty are false narratives used to perpetuate economic exploitation, exclusion, and deep inequality"

Often, it appears to me we fall for this narrative of scarcity in our country and even in our world. God promises us abundance. We are called to love one another, to care for one another and we have hungry people in our cities, our towns and even in the most rural of areas. We have homeless men, women and children, who are struggling to find a way back. Yes, some of them are struggling with mental illness, others might have addictions but as God's people we are called to love them and to look for ways to be there for them.

Another principle of the current campaign is this:

"We aim to shift the distorted moral narrative often promoted by religious extremists in the nation from issues like prayer in school, abortion, and gun rights to one that is concerned with how our society treats the poor, those on the margins, the least of these, women, LGBTQIA folks, workers, immigrants, the disabled and the sick; equality and representation under the law; and the desire for peace, love and harmony within and among nations."

This one, to me sounds a lot like Jesus' ministry. He spent most of his time among the least of these. He welcomed the poor, tax collectors, women, the ones on the margins as followers.

In John's gospel in the farewell discourse he tells his disciples, "love one another, as I have loved you." Asked by the lawyer about the most important commandment he said, "Love God, love your neighbor" and when the lawyer asked, just who is my neighbor, Jesus said basically "anyone who has a need".

I don't know where this campaign is going but I believe strongly that God loves and cares for all of creation. I also believe it is our job to live out God's love in the world, welcoming all, caring for all and seeing each person we meet as God's beloved child.

As we move into summer open your eyes and see the world around you. Be willing to listen to the stories of those you meet. Open your hearts to God's love which guides us all. Finally, look for ways to live the gospel. Remember that you may be the only Jesus someone ever sees.
