Verbs and Prepositions followed by gerunds:

Which sentence is correct? 1, 2 Or both?

1. I enjoy to watch old movies. (not correct) X

2. I enjoy watching old movies. (correct)

First of all, what's a "gerund"?

Gerund: ing! "an English noun formed from a verb by adding -ing";

*a present participle used as a noun.

A. Verbs: enjoy, avoid, don't mind.

*There are many more verbs that follow with a gerund only, such as:

can't help; can't see; complete; consider; delay; despise; deny; discuss; dislike; imagine; keep; practice; postpone; mention; risk; suggest;

1. **Enjoy:** as we said before we do not follow with an infinitive after "enjoy". We use a gerund. For example, what are some things you enjoy?

I enjoy **trying** new foods;

I enjoy traveling

I enjoy going camping

I enjoy **playing** sports.

*Also, you can use a regular noun after a gerund: I enjoy **sports, soccer, scary movies**, etc.

2. Avoid: also, only gerund, no infinitive.

I <u>avoid</u> **staying up** late.

I avoid eating fast food. Also: I avoid fast food.

I avoid **speeding**.

3. Don't mind: also, only gerund, no infinitive.

I don't mind helping you move

I don't mind giving you a ride

I don't mind paying for dinner;

*Don't say: I don't mind to help you. Or I don't mind to pay for dinner. X

B. Prepositions

in, into, on, onto, for, to, about, from, above, over, etc...

Pretty much All prepositions Follow with a gerund

*Into: I'm into playing soccer. I'm into soccer. I'm not into playing soccer.

I'm into traveling.

I'm into checking out new restaurants.

I'm into learning new languages

*feel like: (**when "like" is used with "feel" in this phrase, "like" is a preposition.)

I feel like **taking** a walk.

I feel like staying home and watching a movie.

I don't feel like **doing** my homework.

C. Infinitives OR Gerunds possible:

Infinitive: to + verb

*Can't Stand:

I <u>can't stand</u> **being** in a messy room. I <u>can't stand</u> **to be** in a messy room. I <u>can't stand</u> **driving** in slow traffic. I <u>can't stand</u> **to drive** in slow traffic.

*Love and Hate:

I <u>love</u> **taking** my friends to cool new clubs. I <u>love</u> **to take** my friends to cool new clubs. I <u>hate</u> **getting up** for early morning classes. I <u>hate</u> **to get up** for early morning classes.

*Like

I <u>like</u> getting up; I <u>like</u> to get up early.
I <u>like</u> working out; I <u>like</u> to work out.

*Prefer

I <u>prefer</u> **riding** my bicycle to work; I <u>prefer</u> **to ride** my bicycle to work.
