Jarrod felt that we could accomplish that goal with a Benelli semi-auto. As luck would have it, we found a good used Benelli at the local Cabela's sporting goods store. The stock needed to be shortened by about 1.5 inches to fit Donna. Jarrod took it apart right there at Cabela's and determined that he could, indeed, cut that much off. It was Friday night and Donna bought her first shotgun right then and there. Sunday afternoon, she shot 50 rounds through it and everything worked well. When we met him, he was disassembling old rifles and cataloguing the parts to be used as templates for creating new parts. We asked him about retirement, and with a very warm smile, he said he planned to retire when he turns 100. We're not sure he was kidding. What an inspiration.
