

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

As the CEO of SERCAP, Hope Cupit knows how to address issues and find solutions

Hope's Corner

Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project, Inc. (SERCAP), a 501(C)3 nonprofit organization, is currently assisting the Town of Monterey by providing a small grant of \$1,172.00 to the Town, from the agency's fundraising efforts via a popcorn fundraiser. SERCAP's Regional Department received a request from the Town of Monterey for assistance in relieving some of the negative financial impact to the Town's water system from \$4,148.82 in delinquent water bills from 11 customer accounts. The Town only has a population of 125 residents, 19.2% of whom live in poverty, with a typical household income of only \$29,375.00 per year. Given the Town's rural status and poverty level, SERCAP was happy to grant funds to offset a portion (approximately 28%) of the currently delinquent water bills. COVID 19 has caused small rural water utilities to suffer financially from unpaid water bills by customers.

SERCAP's mission is to improve the quality of life for low-income individuals by promoting affordable water and wastewater facilities, community development, environmental health, and economic self-sufficiency.

SERCAP works towards accomplishing its mission by providing training, technical, and financial assistance to communities and low-to-moderate income (LMI) individuals for water, wastewater, housing, and community development projects.

Even during the difficulties of 2020 and 2021, SER-CAP's dedicated staff members have continued to support Community Water/Wastewater Systems, Water/Wastewater Operators, and LMI individuals struggling to maintain access to clean, safe drinking water and environmentally sound wastewater facilities. In conjunction with World Water Day in March of 2021, SERCAP raised \$586.00 through a small

popcorn pop-up shop fundraiser. The proceeds of that fundraiser, along with a dollar for dollar match from SERCAP's Water Is Life! Fund, are the funds designated to assist the Town of Monterey and its water utility.



This is how my first day back in the Star City went. As my mentor gave me a tour of the facility, the CEO of NuFocusedX told me of all the upcoming opportunities that would be flooding my path. Afterwards I arranged my room as I saw fit folding my clothes and making my bed. Then on to what would take up a majority of my day, a self-guided tour of my old stomping grounds. I walked from 130 Whitten Ave(A pivotal piece of NFX) along the beautiful Roanoke Greenway towards downtown. On the way, I

tossed a penny into the Berglund Center Fountain for good luck, and stopped by McDonalds on Williamson Rd. for a delicious soft serve cone. CAREERS IN WATER/WASTEWATER OPERATIONS AND STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

State-certified Water/Wastewater Operators and Stormwater Managers, run community water/wastewater systems so that residents and businesses have reliable access to clean, safe drinking water, environmentally sound wastewater facilities, and well managed local infrastructure.

Water/Wastewater and Stormwater Professionals:

- Water Operators treat water, making it safe to drink.
- Wastewater Operators remove harmful pollutants from domestic and industrial liquid waste so it is safe to return to the environment.
- Water/Wastewater Operators manage a system of machines, often through a system of control boards, to transfer and/or treat water and/or wastewater.
- Stormwater Managers control the use of stormwater runoff in a community through: planning for runoff; maintaining stormwater systems; and regulating the collection, storage, and movement of stormwater.

TRAIN TO BE A WATER/WASTEWATER OPERATOR OR STORMWATER MANAGER

SERCAP has partnered with Mountain Empire Community College to provide a comprehensive Water/Wastewater Operator Training Program. SERCAP will help interested individuals to prepare for the program, register for classes, apply for financial assistance, study for the certification exam, and find an internship/apprenticeship with a water/ wastewater treatment facility. The Program is designed to provide participants with the tools, resources, and support needed, to get them trained and into the workforce.

- Program classes are delivered Online, followed by a 6-month in-person internship at a water/ vastewater treatment plant.
- SERCAP places participants in an interreliip and assists in making connections in this new career
- After 6 months working in a water/wastewater facility, participants will be eligible to sit for the state licensing exam.

SERCAP's Water/Wastewater Operator and Stormwater Management Training Program will help participants to succeed by providing

Water/Wastewater operators are the first line of defense in public health. They deliver safe, plentiful drinking water to their customers and ensure that fire hydrants have enough water to fight fires. Being a water operator is a very meaningful career choice-you make a huge, positive difference in the health of your community.

Water/wastewater operators have an average nationwide salary of \$40,000 per year, but experienced operators can earn around \$80,000 per year in large communities-more in supervisory positions. Many utilities offer excellent benefits and opportunities for career advancement.

Many water operators are retiring, and there is expected to be an operator shortage in the near future. It's a great time to enter this industry, whether you're just starting your career or looking for a career change!

HOPE IS ALL WE HAVE FOR A BETTER FUTURE

Last year. Christine Wright of Bradley Free Clinic's Hope Initiative sat down with TomA to discuss the many advantages of Bradley Free's much needed service. It was then that he found out the Christine's story of her role there was just the beginning, the journey adds way more depth to her drive to see people overcome addiction through the Hope Inititative. We caught up with her again to get more about her story

TA: Well Christine like I said, I was so inspired by our conversation, that we had two months ago. When we were talking about the Hope Initiative. Of course, the role that you do there, but more importantly you have a real story. You yourself have overcome things and not only been able to stay strong through that but provide that same hope for someone for so many other things and that's such a motherly quality, you know, and it being Mother's Day. We're celebrating, but I've

always wanted to have an opportunity for someone to just speak to me, candidly of coming out on the other side of that and what that trial is as a mother. I don't have any formatted questions, like I said I just wanted to kinda get your story tell me a little bit about you.

3 and the other a year old. The timing of all of this was pretty convenient, coming up on 5 years of recovery, this weekend. I definitely appreciate you reaching out and being interested in my story. Like I said I found out when I was incarcerated, that I was pregnant with my youngest child, and I was actively using. My middle child, my son, was born addicted, and that was a soul shattering experience to have to watch. My innocent child having to suffer the consequences of my actions,

> was a really hard thing for me to deal with. So having been through that and then finding out that I was pregnant again. For the first time ever, I decided that it was the best thing for me to have an abortion. I didn't want another child to suffer the consequences of my actions and my addiction. I got out of jail on a Monday, Tuesday I called and made an appointment to have the procedure done that Saturday. As fate would have it, that Friday I was rearrested for that last time. That saved

Absolutely the

timings pretty ironic right now. 2016 was the last time I was arrested and that was the weekend prior to mothers day. So I was pregnant at the time with the youngest of my 2 children, one was not only my daughters life also my life. I was sentenced to the Alpha program within the jail for 6 months.

TA: Five years on the other side of that, thanks

for sharing that with me, I know it's not easy to bring that kind of stuff back up. I appreciate your courage not only to be able to recognize that but still be in a position to encourage others to stick with it. Has that helped? Is it tough? Just tell me a little bit about that experience, now that I'm sure there are other mothers that come through there with similar situations?

CW: To be in the position I'm in now, where I can help light the way for the next person to find their way out of active addiction. It gives it all a purpose, a reason for happening and it doesn't feel like it all just sort of happened in vain, it was clearly for a reason. Being able to come out and share those experiences with

other people, particularly mothers, is in itself a powerful thing to be able to do. I do encounter women through the Hope Initiative who are pregnant, recently been pregnant, or that have children at home, while

they're trying to pursue treatment, or dealing with legal obligations. Being able to say to them, "I've been there", or "I know what that's like" and try and help them find the strength in themselves. Instead of feeling defeated, and dealing with all of the guilt and shame that goes along with that, as a mother.

The hardest part for me was, the being able to share some of what I've learned in my 5 brief years of recovery. To be able to say, "I know it's hard, and I know it hurts, but here's a different perspective to look at that, to be able to work on yourself, and become the best version of you for yourself." So that your children can reap the benefits in the long run. Just being able to say that I can relate to that experience, that I've been there, provides the greatest hope and bond between the participants.

TA: 'm sure it adds to your purpose, and let me just go ahead and say, that anyone who can stay diligent and productive for 5 years. That is not a short time, that is a long time, a lot of things happen in 5 years. We've had 2 new Presidents of the United States in the last 5 years, so it's definitely something to be proud of.

I probably should've asked this before hand, but do you have a relationship with your children now?

Are things getting better now?

CW:

Absolutely, I have regained custody of all 3 of my children, and we all live together in our home. Just the 3 of them and me spent all weekend going hiking and

to horse stables, and out in nature. Things are incredible, it took a long time to build a relationship with my youngest because I was not around for the first 6 months of her life, due to being incarcerated and in treatment.

So it took time to build that connection and rebuild the relationship and trust with my other 2 children, it has definitely been hard work, but it is more than worth it. I feel as though they have forgiven me. They're still really young and its a lot for them to understand, but I try and be very honest and open with them. So that they understand addiction and if the time were to

come around for them to go through those same struggles to know that they're not alone and understand how it works. Not just be some taboo topic, that you don't talk about, so I'm definitely very open and honest with them.

TA: That's great, the fact that they're back with you. I have adult children and they're hard to figure out anyway. What does that say about the organization you work for, knowing that they



know of your history?

CW: They have been beyond supportive, it's really interesting how it all sort of came to be. I did treatment through drug court and since I graduated the treatment and was released from jail. I still had requirements of 100 hours of community service to complete. After reaching out to my p.o. and wanting to give back to the cause around addiction, he connected me with the Hope Initiative. Again the timing was really interesting, the Hope Initiative first formed August of 2016, and I completed treatment just 2 short months later, October 2016. I got out and began volunteering with the Hope Initiative for my drug court hours and as the universe would have it 4 days after graduating drug court. I was offered the first full-time position at the Hope Initiative as an employee.

It was originally volunteer ran, so that they knew everything about me? This is such a loaded question, the answer to something like this is huge. Jeanine and Rue have been incredible mentors for me, in the world of professionalism and employment. This has definitely been an incredible opportunity given to me that I do not take for granted.

The Gainsborough community in my opinion in 1984 was a thriving community with very little vacant properties and some businesses within the neighborhood. Over the years that has changed. Now there are no black owned businesses in the neighborhood very few in the Roanoke if I am speaking truthfully.

The homes are run down, many vacant slipping further and further into disrepair, getting condemned or demolished leaving a vacant lot flourishing with overgrown weeds and littered with trash. I remember as a kid there was so much to do. There were events held for children at the neighborhood library where they would read to us, teach us different arts and crafts like making a Christmas tree from a book or painting ceramics, they also showed us how to make our own healthy snacks like celery with peanut butter and raisins or with cream cheese.

The PAC Office that would take us to the apple orchard, the skating rink or to the Harrison Museum to learn about our black culture. I also have some memory of going into Dr. Claytor's dental office. It was a good experience everyone there was very friendly. I couldn't wait to go back but unfortunately they closed down before I had the opportunity.




There was a YMCA across the street from Gainsborough library that we would go into and play a arcade game, shoot pool, attempt to punch on the speed bag and watch one of the men from the neighborhood teach boxing. There was also a store open on Henry Street that sold candy by the brown paper bag full for a few quarters which I even then found hard to believe. I thought the elders made that kind of stuff up until I experienced it for myself.

I also remember the curiosity of what happened to some of the residents from Henry street. At one time before they tore down the houses I remember walking right into one because the front door had been open for days if not weeks only to find that once I got inside that everything was still there including one woman's purse with her identification card, birth certificate and social security card still inside as well as cash. I couldn't understand it...even now every now and then I wonder where they all went in such a





hurry and why. What was so important to just vanish from your home and personal belongings? I remember the days of The Henry Street Heritage Festival actually being on Henry Street with plenty of black vendors selling items that they themselves made, having good music performed by black entertainers some famous some local but it was always a good time to be had. Those were the good days.

Now that I am an adult and have taken in all the information that has been given to me through my own eyes, I inspired to see that there may be a whole new life coming to Gainsboro. The group of creators I have been working with lately has showed me plans for whole whole New Gainsboro Business Corridor that will not only bring new life to the community, it is targeted at bringing black business and home ownership back to those who have been doing their best to survive the residual effects of life after urban Renewal. It's exciting to see plans for a new Claytor Clinic, renovated Lawson Building, and maybe even The Historic Dumas Hotel.

Due to systemic issues within many facets, these families find themselves in financial struggles often. Our program is established to help address a few of the basic human needs of these families

Description:

An open closet of donated items made available to socioeconomically disadvantaged families. Families that systemic issues lead to them falling through gaps. A place they feel safe to come for assistance without judgment, but definitely with compassion.

Purposed solution:

As a budding solution for this gap in our humanity, it will take people & time. We are currently small but mighty with open doors, donations, and open hearts. We are excited to see where our journey in helping others with compassion and empathy takes us to next.

Action plan & Benefits to the community:

This is a program that can build upon its own success. As it is implemented it can provide additional opportunities for those within the community to learn job skills, social skills, have valuable access to resources that may have been previously unavailable. 
Plan de acción y beneficios para la comunidad:

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












MUSIC TURNED MOVEMENT

Hold on. Hold on. Before I get back into it, I got to shout out my man


Marley G. I completely forgot that you gave me the idea for that hook. 2021 I got a whole bunch of new records out.
