A Musical Exploration into Watercolor Media

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I have chosen watercolor as the topic of my research because of my personal lack a familiarity and a certain level distaste towards the medium. The purpose of this project was to gain a better understanding of watercolor media by looking at its history, properties, and uses within the field of art therapy and art facilitation, through research and musical expression. With this document, I aim to provide a thorough explanation of the research that was the inspiration for the accompanying musical expression, as well as insight into the creative process.

The History of Watercolor Media

Although evidence of the proof of the use of watercolors has been found dating back thousands of years, watercolor media did not gain popularity or recognition as a serious form of artistic expression until the early 1800s (Arthistory.net, n.d.; Parks, 2011). Early humans used water and natural pigments, such as charcoal and ochre, to create visual interpretations of the world around them on the walls of caves (Arthistory.net, n.d.; Haaga & Schwartz, 2022). Watercolors were used by many different ancient civilizations across the world. Egyptians were known to use watercolors to decorate the inside of tombs and the walls of the pyramids. The Chinese used watercolors to depict landscapes and religious icons. During the 15th century, Albrecht Durer began experimenting with watercolor media, and helped to bring attention to the luminous and transparent effects watercolors are capable of (arthistory.net, n.d.; Parks, 2011). However, the use of watercolor was still not thought of as art, rather it was thought of as a means to add tint, or shade to drawings and sketches (Parks, 2011; Wise, 2005). In England, at the turn of the 18th century, technological advancements in papermaking allowed for the widespread use of watercolors. Mr. James Whatman created a new, smoother paper that could withstand the application and layering of watercolor washes without disintegrating (Parks, 2011; Wise, 2005).

Though kept to a small, overcrowded area, the inclusion of watercolor media by the Royal Academy of Art marks the emergence of watercolor as a serious art medium (Parks, 2011; Wise, 2005). As a result, the Society of Painters in Watercolor were formed. According to Parks (2011), "In response, the Society of Painters in Watercolor was formed in London in 1804, and its own exhibitions served to promote and spread the art with considerable energy" (p. 31-32).

Musical Expression

"Mr. Whatman," is written from the point a view of a watercolor artist arguing with an oil painter who refuses to acknowledge watercolor media as an equal. The first verse refers to a "rising tide of luminosity," which symbolizes the emergence of watercolor as a serious art medium, as well as the underlying reference to water and color with the word's "tide" and "luminosity". The first verse also refers to the royal academy, watercolors translucent effects, and the Society of Painters in Watercolor. The idea for the chorus came to me almost immediately when Mr. Whatman was mentioned in the two articles from Parks and Wise. The second verse gives a brief description of the various examples of watercolors found throughout history. What pleased me the most about this piece was that I was able to get every other line of verses to rhyme throughout the entire song.

The song structure and lyrics to "Mr. Whatman," the musical expression of the history of watercolors, are presented in Table 1.

Properties, Advantages, and Disadvantages

According to Wise (2005), "In the purest sense watercolour is a painting medium which uses pigments dispersed in water and bound in gum, applied by brush to a paper support" (p. 40). A rough and textured finished is preferred to allow for the pigment particles, or grains, to settle within the grooves of the paper (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Wise, 205). Although watercolors are

transparent in nature, opaque levels can be achieved through various techniques. Transparent effects are achieved through the application of a wash, or diluted paint, in contrast to a glaze which the application of layers to create an opaque effect (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Wise, 2005). Although light is what gives watercolors it's transparent effect, exposure to light can cause the purity of the pigments to diminish over time (Wise, 2005). Watercolors are easy to transport, set up, and cleanup. They are also less expensive than other forms of paint and dries quicker too. One major advantage to using watercolor media is that it works great with other art mediums.

Musical Expression

Unfortunately, I was unable to complete a musical piece for this topic. I had a hard time finding inspiration, so I ended up skipping this one in the hopes of finishing it later. However, by the time I finished the other songs, I had made mention to several of the properties and disadvantages, that I was out of ideas.

Art Therapy and Therapeutic Art Uses

I found this topic to be the most inspiring. So much so, that I ended up writing two separate songs about it. One song is about the benefits using watercolor media as an art intervention. The second, is about the practical considerations of watercolor media.

Transparency Therapy

The first verse of the songs starts off with stating that painting is an act of rhythm and repetition that, "can release new understandings" (Haaga & Schwartz. 2022). The act of painting also acts as a form of mindful meditation that allows us to become centered in the moment, free of any distracting of intruding thoughts, allowing for a sense self-awareness that allows new meaning to be discovered through every stroke (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Macleod, 2020). As a

recovering addict myself, it is important to me to always include addiction in my research and application, which is why I included the line "that keeps your thoughts off using". The creative arts has helped me throughout my recovery, by allowing me to be completely emersed in the act of creation, keeping my thoughts clear of any distractions, such as "using" my drug of choice. The act of creating art can provide a visual interpretation of emotions that are either unable to be discussed, or hiding below the surface (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Macleod, 2020). The act of painting becomes a form of artistic communication when verbal communication seems difficult. This idea leads right into the chorus, explaining how every brush stroke can provide new meaning (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022). I love the line "every stoke sings us a song," because of the way it incorporates art and music together, noting the similarities within all Creative Art Therapies. Transparency Therapy was my way of stating that I was singing about watercolors and art therapy. The next few lines of the chorus are referencing the transparent effects that watercolors produce (Arthistory.net, n.d.; Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Parks, 2011; Wise, 2005), which became the basis for the entire theme of the song. The transparent effects are produced by allowing the light to shit through the paint and reflect off the paper, usually white or cream in color, which allows the pigments of color to glow (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022; Parks, 2011; Wise, 2005). The last few lines of the chorus are meant to represent a client recognizing watercolors therapeutic benefits.

Verse two starts off mentioning the personal transformation that arises from the act of painting, or creation (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022). Through observation and reflection of the art, one gains insight and finds new meaning of thoughts and emotions they did not know existed. This part was extremely fun for me, as I was able to also include the reflective and transparent properties watercolors produce. The next few lines of this verse are discussing watercolors and

the Expressive Theories Continuum (ETC). The act of blending and layering colors can activate the Sensory component of the ETC, while the movement and repletion activate the Kinesthetic and Affective components.

The outro of this songs means a lot to me personally. Throughout my entire professional carreer, it is important that I can express how the expressive arts helped me through my addiction. Which is why I make the claim, "your love shines on through me".

The song structure and lyrics to "Transparency Therapy," are presented in Table 2.

Turbulent Flow

"Turbulent Flow" is about the practical considerations in the application of watercolors in art therapy. To me this song is full of symbolism. Turbulent flow itself, refers to anything that runs perpendicular to the flow of the current. In this case, turbulent flow is referring to anything that runs perpendicular to the creative flow. Watercolors are fluid, less structured and hard to control (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022). Watercolors can be messy, they mix together, they bleed, and they run (2022). Without knowledge of color theory, and experience of painting tools, watercolors may turn cloudy and muddy, and may produce other unwanted effects (2022). Lacking this knowledge, the act of painting becomes less about creative expression as the artists focuses more on controlling the paint than self-expression (2022).

The pre-chorus, "Chroma causations of fluid frustrations," was another fun symbolic reference to the beauty and brilliance of watercolors. with the use of the word chroma, which means the purity or intensity of color. The chorus is explaining that this song is about what to consider when using watercolors as a therapeutic intervention. Laminar flow means a steady current. So, taking these into consideration will create a steady creative flow. What is discussed in this song, is anything that may disrupt that flow, by imparting creative distractions.

Painting with watercolors, at its core, is simple in nature, but adding layers does add complexity (Haaga & Schwartz, 2022). It takes patience and practice to master watercolor techniques. You have to wait for layers to wash before adding more layers, which one learns

with experience. Without knowledge and experience, it is up to the therapist or facilitator conduct a proper session. By limiting palettes, providing simple compositions, and teaching technique, the facilitator, or therapist, may provide a sense of control in order to be able to focus on the act of creative expression (2022). Baring claims that other considerations are with people with loose ego boundaries, fear of fusion, and individuals with control issues (1997). One other major consideration is that people may worry too much about the final art piece. It is important to stress the importance of the process of creation, rather than the result of creation.

The song structure and lyrics to "Turbulent Flow," are presented in Table 3.
