<u>Health & Wellness - Barbara Cross & Jo Norrís</u>

Hope all of you enjoyed our September program educating us on the many scams that are out there and learning how to avoid falling victim to them.

Thank you for your generous donations to our food drive. We delivered close to 200 pounds of food to Virginia Wingard's Food Pantry and to Harvest Hope. Both organizations were very appreciative of our contribution.

November's meeting will be our annual fundraiser for Operation Smile. You'll be hearing more on that effort from Gail.

This month is Breast Cancer Awareness month. Breast cancer accounts for about 30% of all new cancer cases in women each year in the United States. Here is a look at the latest U.S. breast cancer statistics. About 13% (about 1 in 8) of U.S. women are going to develop invasive breast cancer in the course of their life. In 2023, an estimated 297,790 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in U.S. women, along with 55,720 new cases of DCIS (**Ductal carcinoma in situ**). In 2023, an estimated 2,800 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in men. A man's lifetime risk of breast cancer is about 1 in 833. There are currently more than 4 million women with a history of breast cancer in the United States. This includes women currently being treated and women who have finished treatment. Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among U.S. women. Remember to continue those mammograms and monthly self-exams! This information is provided by <u>Breastcancer.org</u>.

We plan to start our 30 minute walking prior to the meeting this month. No special gear, just comfortable walking shoes. We will be using the track inside Union so weather will not be an issue! Gail will meet us at the side door, where we enter for meetings, at 6:30 and walk us to the area we will be using. See you then!

Special Addition: Progress Foundation

Please review the following 3 requests for the Progress Foundation and be prepared to vote at the meeting in October as to which charity you would like to see receive the money. Thanks, Laurie.

1* I would like to nominate <u>**Turning Pages**</u> for the recipient of the Progress Foundation this year.

I would like to request \$3000.00. The money would be used for learning material for the learners.

Turning Pages is a 501c3 and has been around since 1968. They provide Adult Based Education for adults reading at a 9th grade level or lower. It is a 24 week program and you meet with the tutor for one hour a week. The learner is reassessed after the 24 weeks. I have been an active tutor with the program this year.

2* The Arts and Culture would like to recommend <u>Killingsworth</u> in the amount of \$5000 for a Progress Foundation grant. These funds would be used to adopt several residents by paying their monthly rent of \$541. Currently they are housing 17 residents.

Killingsworth is a unique community residence in downtown Columbia, SC for women who are emerging from crisis situations.

Within the eight bedroom home, women recovering from alcohol and/or drug abuse, incarceration, mental and emotional problems, violence and assault, or family crisis situations can find shelter and support. The residential program includes room, board, guidance and support for a nominal fee. Financial and vocational assistance to the residents is often available from partner agencies in the community.

Each resident is required to be involved in some organized productive activity during her stay. For most residents that means employment. Training or educational programs which lead to employment are equally acceptable. This requirement is basic to each woman's steps toward self-sufficiency and return to community life.

Women are referred to Killingsworth from human service agencies across the state, from the Department of Corrections, from treatment centers, as well as from churches and self-referrals. For admittance, the referral agency or counselor contacts a staff person for an application package. A personal interview is scheduled prior to acceptance for admission.

Killingsworth is a ministry of the United Methodist Women who provide some financial support as well as resourcing and training for the staff and the Board of Directors. United Methodist Church members across South Carolina contribute volunteer services and fundraising support as well. Financial support also comes from individuals, other church groups, community-based organizations, grants, and fees paid by our residents.

The residents of Killingsworth are a community of women from all walks of life, from varying kinds of families, with differing educational backgrounds and different life experiences. Their diversity gives them strength.

Killingsworth is a 501c3 nonprofit ministry of the United Methodist Women. Our Federal ID # is 57-0659510.

3* I would be interested in the club supporting the <u>After School Program at</u> <u>Ezekiel Ministries</u>, a 501c3 nonprofit ministry, with a request of \$5000 from Progress Foundation.

Ezekiel Ministries was birthed in 2009 after a group of men and women served in a downtown community so forgotten that it was often called "The Gates of Hell". After forming tight-knit relationships with some of the kids in that neighborhood, they knew they couldn't stop there. There was so much potential in these kids, yet no one was taking the time to invest in them. This is where Ezekiel was born.

Children can participate in our programs through community-based mentoring, after-school programs (Richland and Lexington County Schools) or through a preapprenticeship. Each program is designed to partner with parents and local church members to help children beat the odds.

After School Program

Our After-school and summer programs are meant to be affordable. We invest daily in the spiritual, academic and social development of children through a fun and active curriculum, helping children find their spiritual footing and gain the tools they need to succeed. For a small weekly fee, parents are encouraged to take ownership in our programs by being as active as possible. If you're a parent who's been struggling to find trusted community support, we'd love to help you find a safe place for your child to grow into a healthy adult. Ezekiel Ministries knows how to help. For 10 years Ezekiel Ministries has been developing and implementing programs that meet kids and families where they are and sticks with them long-term. Our After-School Program serve dozens of children daily through well-crafted curriculum that includes:

- Tutoring
- Healthy snacks
- Small class sizes
- Energy expending
- Bible lessons and relationships for the whole family

We do our best to develop the WHOLE child through partnership with the WHOLE family.
