Music at St. John's



COVID, Flu, RSV and Showing Care

It seems as if we learn to live with one health emergency and global public health concern only to have the annual flu season return with greater impact after our spending 2 years in masks and isolation. We are tired and frustrated by the continuing variants, the need for keeping boosters and vaccinations updated and trying to protect ourselves, our families, and especially our most vulnerable elderly community. We're living with the changes and the discomfort of life still not quite feeling normal or returning to what we were used to in our old patterns of behavior and ways of being with each other and doing things.



As we enter the official winter season, we are seeing the new threats of Flu, RSV (for both children and older adults) and the two newest dominant COVID variants calling for our continued attention and consideration. To do our part to help prevent a return to mandatory mask-wearing, we are urged to get flu vaccinations and COVID boosters as soon as possible. With our increased group activities, we remain thankful people have taken measures to isolate, mask and return to activity when recuperated.

Some have asked, "When will we return to passing the offering plates? Wouldn't that help us receive more contributions?" Others have asked, "When will we pass communion through the pews again?" We must first ask if these activities were ever good health practices to begin with. Can we find other means of participating in the intentional sharing of our gifts to God in worship? Can we receive and give the sacraments in ways that also don't unintentionally create a health risk for someone? Do we want to risk anyone becoming ill because we like a particular method of doing something? The Consistory is open to our collective conversation and encourages our continued willingness to discern together how we can best be a supportive and healthy community. Through Spring 2023, the Consistory plans to maintain current health measures of mitigating risks and adapting our practices for the wellbeing of our whole community.

Our current vaccination, "boosting" and masking recommendations are posted on the website. We continue to urge all to give added attention if you are seated in close proximity to others and demonstrate greater care for those with health conditions. For those vaccinated and unvaccinated, masking is optional during all aspects of our worship and other gatherings. We strongly recommend vaccination and consideration of others in our congregation. We provide KN95 masks at our entry tables for all who would like one.

Thank you for your continued understanding and participation in these measures.


Blessed to Be a Blessing - Children's Faith Formation

Rev. Alan Miller Dies at 70

The Rev. Alan Miller, remembered by colleagues as a joyful and effective builder of relationships in the ministries of the United Church of Christ, died Dec. 2, in High Point, N.C. He was 70.



He retired in 2017 after more than 40 years in ministry. He was a local church pastor in Pennsylvania, an associate on the staff of the UCC's Southern Conference, and finally Conference minister in Penn Northeast.

His death followed seven years of treatments for cancer

and encephalitis, said his daughter, Christina Miller Lipstreu. That journey is chronicled at this <u>"Miller Strong" page at CaringBridge</u>.

General Minister and President John Dorhauer first connected with Miller when they were both Conference ministers and spoke with him regularly during his illness. "Even in his dying he made me laugh — and cry," Dorhauer said. "That was Alan — never ashamed to express any emotion. He was the hale fellow well met who never knew a stranger."

Retired Conference Minister Rollin Russell, who headed the Southern staff when Miller was an associate there, remembered his "remarkable gifts and abilities." "He had an unfailing love for people and for the UCC, matched by his deep personal integrity, his commitment to ministry, and his great, good humor," Russell said.

Born April 18, 1952, Alan Craig Miller lived all of his early life in Pennsylvania. He grew up in Perkasie and graduated from Pennridge High School there in 1970. He graduated from Lehigh University's College of Engineering, Bethlehem, in 1974, and from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary in 1979.

Miller's illness — specifically, autoimmune encephalitis as a complication of thymic carcinoma, according to his family — came with tragic timing for him and his wife, Candy.

"When Alan retired, he and Candy bought a new truck," Dorhauer said. "He talked about this for a full year before he finished. He was going to outfit it with all his tools and gadgets, and he and Candy were going to travel around to various Habitat for Humanity sites and build homes. He could not have been any happier about that."



Miller is survived by his wife Candy, son Mark and his wife Stephanie, daughter Christina Lipstreu and her husband James, and five grandchildren: Ian, Ellie, Cooper, Miller and Harper.

Memorial services will be held at Jordan United Church of Christ, the Millers' home church in Allentown, PA, on Friday, Jan. 6, 2023, at 11am. A livestream of the service will be available here. More information on arrangements can be found on this <u>Heintzelman</u> <u>Funeral Home page</u>.

"Alan always brought enthusiasm and joy to his work, joy that was contagious," Thomas said. "His smile and his heart were broad and embracing."

"I smile and give thanks when I think of him," Russell said. "We will miss him deeply."

Hans Holznagel, a former member of the UCC news team, retired Dec. 1 after a career that included many roles in the UCC's national ministries, dating back to 1984.

Your donations will help under-gird an expanding spectrum of services such as food, shelter, medical care, WASH (water, sanitation, hygiene), spiritual and psychological care, protection and more in Ukraine and in countries where Ukrainians were forced to relocate. For the month of January contributions will be sent to UCC National to support programs to help with Ukraine's infrastructure and other needs of the Ukrainian people. We are happy to report that for the month of November, \$100 was sent to Project HOPE to help with the people's medical needs.
