#### **Observing Black History Month**

#### A Mostly White Church in a Mostly White Town

While in seminary in Atlanta, Georgia, I served a rural congregation east of the city. The ministers of the area, mostly younger seminary student pastors, decided to have a joint service project for our congregations. There was a county cemetery that had a significant section which was not part of the "perpetual care" where a chain-link fence separated the area from the rest of the well-kept graves. We quickly came to learn that this was the Black section of the cemetery, and that most of those buried there had meager markers or headstones if there was one at all. Originally, the space was completely separated by a small cart path of the two pieces of land, yet over time the two locations to bury the community dead came together, but still remained separated by the fence and unkempt grounds.



Being inexperienced in issues of blatant community racism, we saw no problem with proposing to take down the fence, clean up the grounds, and ask each participating congregation to mow and trim the cemetery once a month. Unknowingly, we stirred the hornets nest of racism, even in a cemetery. This marked a declaratory beginning of my faith transformation in racial justice. I made it my personal mission to tend these graves and contact community and family members where possible to share about our project and ongoing desire to see all the graves and peoples' stories respected.

#### Racial Justice is our Responsibility

For many who join the movement toward racial justice, a particular moment or experience serves as a catalyst. Something happens that makes it impossible to go along unchanged. But what happens after that moment of conviction? How does a cataclysmic moment become a life-long journey of anti-racist practice? Our collective journey, whether from a moment of awakening and conviction, or through education and exploration to covenant, commitment, and ever-unfolding actions, calls us to be people of ongoing transformation.

Too often throughout history, we see people of faith complacent and complicit in the face of racism. It seems clear that our church community should have felt called to confront racism before the murder of George Floyd in May 2020. How could it take such gruesome and violent cruelty, videoed for all to see, to make us care enough to dig deeper? Sadly, his death remains one of thousands upon thousands to which we've become accustomed over the decades and centuries of our nation, and in the global community.

As the decades have gone by, from the years of slavery to the Civil War and reconstruction era, to the continuing days of Jim Crow laws and systemic white supremacy culture, to the Civil Rights Movement and the work of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and others, to the awareness of inequities in all our systems of life which perpetuated a culture of inequality, the church has been both an agent of change and a source of resistance. We have also too often stood in the way of the very progress and liberation we said we wanted to eradicate. We find ourselves in similar places still today.

While we may not all agree and be of one mind, we can all seek the mind of Christ and look to Jesus' own example of justice and inclusion, bringing the least and most marginalized of his day to the open table of grace and redemption. We still have much to learn, much to confess, much to correct and much to bring to life as we seek to do the work of creating places for ALL God's children to be honored and celebrated. As Archbishop Desmund Tutu said, "If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor." This month as we observe Black History Month, I welcome you to the following prayer from the organization called "enfleshed," clergy and laity offering spiritual nourishment for collective liberation: Holy One, our Guide and Journey Companion, though we may be quick to pray for your justice to roll down like waters, we can be slow to accept what that may require of us.

We struggle – is justice sweeter than security, than survival, than power, or comfort?

...On this day, and always, wherever white supremacy rears its ugly, evil head, in rallies, in words, in norms, in prayers, in institutions, in relationships, let nothing take precedence over our commitment to Love – Love that overturns evil, Love that protects, Love that lays down its life for its friends, Love that acts in solidarity, Love that refuses to compromise on the belovedness of your people, Love that confronts, Love that heals, Love that looks inward, Love that shuts down hatred.

May our prayers for your justice be enfleshed in our minds, our bodies, our hearts, our commitments. Amen.



#### Music at St. John's

A hymn is an expression of worship—our glad and grateful acknowledgment of the "worth-ship" of Almighty God, our confession of our own creatureliness before our Creator, our bowing before his transcendence. Hymns are a celebration of who and what God is and of what he has done— songs of praise, thanksgiving, and joy in God. Christians sing hymns because our God is worthy to be praised.

> The words of a hymn are the most important aspect, and good music should enhance and strengthen the message conveyed by the words. The best tunes for a hymn are those that help worshipers connect with the text, as it is the words, not the music, that determine the worth of a hymn.

What are some hymns that have left this impression on us? Would Christmas Eve be the same without singing "O Come All Ye Faithful" or "Silent Night"? How about Good Friday and the singing of "Were You There?" or Easter Sunday singing "Christ the Lord is Risen Today?"

Music and hymns are always changing, always evolving. Melodies and texts leave lasting impressions on the singers and listeners of these hymns. They tell a story, and help us in something even more, — prayer!

#### **Knauss Family Loaded Potato Soup Recipe**

8 Peeled & cubed cooked potatoes
1/2 Cup butter
1/2 Cup flour
8 Cups of milk
1/4 Cup or medium size onion
1 [8 Oz.] Container of sour cream
1/2 Cup or a bit more cheddar cheese

Cook your potatoes and onions, drain and set aside.

In another pot melt butter over medium heat. Whisk in flour until smooth, gradually stir in milk. Careful not to burn the milk! Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium and simmer for 5 to 10 minutes or until slightly thickened.

Stir in the potatoes and onions and cook for 5 or 10 minutes. Stir in the sour cream and cheddar cheese until melted and well blended. Season with salt & pepper (I add parsley).

I got a lot of compliments on this soup I brought for the pot luck dinner for Pastor Dave. It is sad to see Pastor Dave leave us, but may God always bless him!
