"Garland, Sinatra and Us!"



Not long ago, someone brought some old Christmas cards with the chancel of St. John's decked out in red with gorgeous poinsettias, wreaths and garlands, and I could almost hear the songs of the season coming through the card. The simple beauty and the message of love and care shared in lyrics and melody have a way of touch even the most cynical soul at the core.

Christmas music almost always brings up nostalgic memories of days gone by where life seemed simpler,

maybe even somewhat happier, and the music often causes my eyes to fill with tears and my voice to have a bit of a lump in my throat. One such song is the classic, Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas, the musical equivalent of a warm hug. This gently melancholic tune sings out a narrative of festive hope, telling of a nostalgia for past times – "happy golden days of yore" – and faith in the future – "From now on, our troubles will be out of sight."

Judy Garland, the shining star of Hollywood's Golden Era, sang it first for a scene in Meet Me in St Louis (1944) in which her character comforts her younger sister, Margaret. Garland objected to the original lyrics, apparently, saying they were too depressing and if she were to sing them, "Margaret will cry, and they'll think I'm a monster." Eager to please their leading lady, Hollywood executives requested a rewrite.

Today, two versions are popularly sung. There's the version lyricist High Martin tweaked for Judy Garland – "Someday soon we all will be together, if the fates allow. Until then we'll have to muddle through somehow" – which is a rather poignant listen this year, as many families around the world are physically apart, by war, being refugees or immigrants. There's also a later version by Frank Sinatra, who asked Martin to sprinkle a little festive joy on that rather downbeat line for his Christmas album. And that's how 'Hang a shining star upon the highest bough' came to replace Garland's melancholic lyric.

Now you know the story, here are the full original lyrics...

Have yourself a merry little Christmas. It may be your last. Next year we may all be living in the past.

Have yourself a merry little Christmas. Pop that champagne cork. Next year we may all be living in New York. No good times like the olden days. Happy golden days of yore. Faithful friends who were dear to us will be near to us no more.

But at least we all will be together, If the Lord allows.
From now on, we'll have to muddle through somehow. So have yourself a merry little Christmas now.

And here are the ones we sing today...

Have yourself a merry little Christmas. Let your heart be light. From now on our troubles will be out of sight.

Have yourself a merry little Christmas. Make the Yule-tide gay. From now on our troubles will be miles away.

Here we are as in olden days, Happy golden days of yore. Faithful friends who are dear to us Gather near to us once more.

Through the years we all will be together, If the fates allow.

Hang a shining star upon the highest bough, And have yourself a merry little Christmas now.

Here we are as in olden days, Happy golden days of yore, Faithful friends who are dear to us Gather near to us once more.

Through the years we all will be together, If the fates allow. So hang a shining star upon the highest bough, And have yourself a merry little Christmas now.

As we come to tell the story of God's love, born anew into our world through the Christ Child, Jesus, may we be stirred once again in our memories of hope, peace, joy and love in this Advent season, to share the immeasurable blessing of God's message of good news for all people... "to you is born in the City of David, a Savior, who is Christ, the Lord!" May we share this life changing message in our

words and deeds, and sing the song of hope, whether in Judy's version or Frank's, and let us be those who...

"Worship, Love and Serve ~ No Matter What!"



2024 Budget Approved

At the Fall Congregational Meeting held on Sunday, Nov. 12 during the morning worship service, the congregation voted to approved the 2024 Budget. Our sincere thanks to Sue Weldner, Treasurer, and the Stewardship and Finance Committee members for the information shared and the observations about how God continues to grow our capacity post COVID. Copies of approved budget are available upon request to the Church Office.

Sue Weldner shared the following highlights for 2024 over 2023:

- 4% overall increase in income in projected
- 4% increase in weekly offerings
- 5% increase in fundraising events income (Coming back to pre-pandemic levels)
- 4% overall increase in expenses
- 2% salary increases; health insurance increase est. at 5%
- \$16k "excess" revenue is projected (While we are working toward ability to grow additional staff positions, we are not there yet.)



Need A Lift?

Some weeks, we all need a little extra support, and with our elevator still inoperable for the time being, some have not been able to come to worship on site since they cannot use the elevator to get to the sanctuary or to Fox Hall. Here's how you can help!

In 2022, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled:

Dear Friends,

All my life I have found important causes and agencies to pour my energy. Sometimes this has been as a staff person and sometimes as a volunteer. The church cannot survive without individuals stepping forward to volunteer for leadership, committee and team roles within the congregation and the Conference. Apostle Paul

reminds the church in Ephesus that we are all called, but not all for the same roles. Some are pastors, some are teachers, and some roles are not defined by the ancient letter.

What are you being called to do within the congregation to which you belong or within the Conference, or even in the national setting? Where is God calling you? I know we are all busy. Our lives are full of commitments to work, to family, and to the activities our families are engaged in. Yet perhaps the hour or two you spend in a volunteer role in your congregation can make a profound difference in the lives of congregation or community members.

As we walk our journey of faith, we can sometimes feel ill-equipped to take on a volunteer or leadership role. I remember something that was said to me when I was wrestling with the call to be a pastor. I was told, "God doesn't just call the equipped, God equips the called." I am sure a more famous person than my local church pastor said that, but it is his words that inspired me to seriously begin my path to authorized ministry.

So, my friends, if God is calling you, if a neighbor or congregation member is calling you, move into that task, that role, that call with the confidence that God is with you. God will equip you. God will lead you into a future where you can bloom.




with Verso-Chat Bible Study - Wednesdays, 9:00am

General Disaster Relief Fund Middle East Special Appeal

The United Church of Christ, through Wider Church Ministries, has issued a special appeal for humanitarian aid to people affected by the war in Israel and Palestine. The war, which was declared on October 7, has already claimed thousands of lives and tens of thousands of people have been injured. Approximately a million Palestinians in Gaza have been displaced with no place for them to go. Half of them are in emergency shelters set up by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency. It is increasingly difficult for citizens to find safe space, as even hospitals have sustained damage. Food, water, fuel, and electricity have been cut off. Convoys of trucks carrying humanitarian relief await the opportunity to bring muchneeded relief into Gaza from Egypt.

Pastor Steve has these words to say about the people affected by this war:

"As the conflict continues to intensify, with now over 10,000 Palestinians killed in response to the 1,400 Israeli lives lost and the 240 hostages continuing to be held by Hamas, the solidarity of humanitarian response to people suffering is inspiring. While many of us support Israel's right to defend itself against the terrorist attacks of Hamas, at the same time, many of us are moved with compassion for the plight of innocent people simply trying to live in peace, to escape the bombing and endure the trauma of the devastation of their lives and homeland.

I urge us all to make this Israel-Hamas War and the plight of hostages and the innocent people of Palestine part of our daily prayer and our personal response by reaching out to our national legislators to share our concern for humanitarian relief. Too much aggression and an overwhelming response leave few options for people of goodwill, medical aid and care to bring support in meaningful ways.

As we come to the season that calls us to prepare the way for God's hope, peace, joy and love to be born anew in the world, may our efforts demonstrate our commitments to these calls for compassion and the ongoing work of justice and peace. Thank you for your prayerful discernment and your heart of mission and love for all of God's people."

Update on Other Mission Outreaches

Thank you to everyone who contributed to **Neighbors in Need** in October. A total of \$145.00 was received. This year's theme focused on environmental justice. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund an array of local and national initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. One-third of the offering also supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries.

We express our gratitude to everyone who sponsored this year's CROP Walk and our walkers—Amy Feidler, Cindy Reck, and Karen Stoisits. A total of \$1020.00 was received. CROP Hunger Walks have become community-based events held in cities across the United States, raising dollars to support the global mission of Church World Service to eradicate hunger and poverty. Twenty-five percent of the funds raised stay within our local community to support the Ecumenical Food Bank and the Lehigh Conference of Churches' Conference Kitchen.

The final amount of donations received for Hawaii Disaster Relief amounted to \$865.00. Your donations were sent to the Hawaii Conference to offer assistance in recovery efforts from the wildfires that devastated Maui and other parts of Hawaii in August.

In October donations to the General Disaster Relief Fund went to World Central Kitchen for its work in providing meals, food, and assistance to Ukraine and surrounding countries. We are happy to report that \$550.00 was sent to WCK.
