

Watering Down and Keeping Quiet?

That's a Risk We Cannot Take!

The vital role of teachers in navigating the complexities of history education cannot be overstated. They tirelessly work to broaden students' perspectives, often challenging the dominant narratives that favor the victors. This effort is crucial for including the voices of the marginalized, whose experiences can significantly alter our understanding of history. For instance, the portrayal of Jesus by contemporary Roman and religious authorities likely contrasted sharply with the accounts found in the gospels, pointing to the power dynamics influencing historical narratives.



The challenge of teaching history today is underscored by recent legislative efforts across the United States aimed at limiting educational content. In 2023, numerous states proposed laws restricting teachings on America's racial history, sexual orientation, and scientific facts, reflecting a broader trend toward censorship in education. This approach, motivated by a desire to avoid discomfort, fundamentally misunderstands the purpose of education, which should involve confronting hard truths to foster understanding and growth.

The discomfort arising from learning about the injustices of slavery, segregation, and systemic racism is essential for a truthful engagement with history. The reluctance of some parents and legislators to confront these realities threatens to sanitize education, robbing students of the opportunity to learn from the past. The pushback against this trend is not only about resisting state-sanitized narratives but also about challenging the societal complacency that allows these narratives to persist.

Highlighting the importance of an inclusive historical education, Florida State Representative LaVon Bracy Davis argues that understanding the full breadth of African American experiences is vital for societal progress. By diluting or omitting these narratives, we risk perpetuating ignorance and misunderstanding. Education should equip younger generations with a comprehensive understanding of history, including the atrocities and triumphs of African Americans, to build a more equitable future.

This ongoing battle against educational suppression is not just about what is taught in schools but also about who gets to decide which stories are told. It's a call to action for educators, parents, and community members to advocate for an education that reflects the diverse and often uncomfortable truths of our shared history, ensuring that future generations can learn from the past to create a more just and inclusive society.

We currently have religious and political extremists trying to push women backward in their hard fought rights for personal autonomy and rights. The current political ideology wants to roll back advances made for persons of color, for immigrants, for LGBTQIA+ persons and many more. To water down or keep quiet about who we believe we are called to be as children of God who follow the way of love and justice modeled and taught by Jesus is to allow for the oppression and discrimination to continue unchallenged.

We cannot keep quiet. I believe if we do, "even the rocks will cry out." Be involved. Speak up. Challenge bigotry and "alternative facts" with the truth and hard lessons learned from our history, our shortcomings and our victories. Tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help us, God, as we

Help America Vote in 2024

Since 2022, UCC's Our Faith Our Vote campaign has partnered with Power the Polls to address the critical shortage of poll workers across the country. This collaboration aims to ensure smooth and efficient voting processes.

Given the anticipated surge in voter turnout for the 2024 presidential election, the need for poll volunteers is more pressing than ever.

Poll workers serve as the backbone of the electoral system, playing crucial roles in keeping polling places open, facilitating a nonpartisan environment, and providing essential assistance to voters.

If you're a UCC member interested in contributing, you can sign up to be a poll worker through Power the Polls. Eligibility requirements vary by state but generally include being a resident of the state or county where the polling place is located, being a registered voter, and being at least 18 years old.

By volunteering as a poll worker, you can directly impact the democratic process, ensuring that every eligible voter has the opportunity to cast their ballot and have their voice heard.




with Verso-Chat Bible Study - Wednesdays, 9:00am
