### **Tutor Spotlight**

Aileen Figueroa Sierra, one of our Whittier College work study students, has been working with WALC for nearly two years. She will graduate this coming spring with a Bachelor's degree in Biology and hopes to become a physician in the near future. She is also a member of the Whittier College organization known as The Palmer Society, the first women's society of Whittier College founded in 1921. This is a women's organization dedicated to helping its local community through promoting the ideals of service, loyalty, scholarship, and friendship. Aileen was recently recognized for her excellence in modeling these values and was awarded the first place prize for the Palmer Society Alumnae Endowed Scholarships. These are merit based awards given to currently active Palmer members. She was awarded \$3,000 and will use it toward her medical school application costs. She hopes to continue dedicating her time toward her students and WALC in her path toward becoming a doctor.

#### On Education

Selections from On Education, Collected Essays by Ralph Waldo Emerson, an American Transcendentalist (1803-1882), speaking and writing on what was needed to complete the formal, classroom education of his day. (American Transcendentalism Website.)

The experience of every parent and teacher shows that the secret of Education lies in respecting the pupil. Each individual must be taught anew.

Respect the child, respect him to the end, but also respect yourself. Be the companion of their thought, the friend of their friendship, the lover of their virtue.

Letter by letter, syllable by syllable, the child learns to read, and in good time can convey even the sense of Shakespeare. By many short steps the stammering child and the hesitating youth come at last to their full power that makes all the steps forgotten.

You must have the believing and prophetic eye, and the self-command you wish to inspire. Wait and see the new product of Nature.

So to see the student requires rare patience: a patience that only faith in the forces of the soul can give.

This natural method underlies all experiments, and we must still come back to it. The whole theory of the school is on the mother's knee. The child is as eager to learn as the mother is to impart. There is mutual delight. The joy of our childhood in hearing beautiful stories must be repeated in youth. No less delightful is the mutual pleasure of teaching and learning good reading and good recitation of poetry or prose. Sympathy—the female force—is subtle and lasting and creative. I advise teachers to cherish mother-wisdom.

Of course, you will keep the grammar, reading, and writing in order, . . . but smuggle in a little contraband wit, fancy, imagination, and thought.


If you have a taste which you have suppressed because it is not shared by those about you, tell them that as well.
