Follow up to Treating Early for Mites

Last month I wrote about my decision to treat for *Varroa* mites early in the year. Previously, I chose not to treat early and this resulted in a higher number of mites later in the year. So, I treated on March 1st with oxalic acid vaporization. It took me about ten minutes from start to finish with a total cost of less than 50 cents.

Let's start with what I observed. After I treat for mites, I like to check the insert every day or two to see if there are dead mites. It's a simple way to see if my efforts in treating produced results. The first seven days, I found an average of eight mites per day. The next two weeks I found an average of less than four mites per day. That means the treatment worked. Once again, it is important to know that after a treatment, the hive should drop mites for ten to 14 days, higher the first couple days and then slowly dropping.

The next step is to see what I learned! The hive dropped a total of 112 mites in three weeks. The hive seems pretty strong, so maybe 20-30,000 bees.

If there are 20,000 bees in the hive, that would mean about 0.5% infestation, which would be very good. If there are 30,000 bees that would be only about 0.37 percent. Both numbers would be well below published allowable levels for this time of year of one to two percent.

But the best part came when I estimated how many mites would be in the hive if I waited until July to treat.

Most of you know that mites can double about every three weeks (since brood emerges every 21 days). If we start with 112 mites on March first, there are 123 days until July. That means the mites could double almost 6 times! That could result in a staggering 7,000 mites!

Of course, the big question is what does this mean to our hives? If you treat in mid-July the hive could be infested with viruses and the bees could be weak with shortened live spans.

The end result should mean a stronger, healthier hive able to build up faster in Spring and produce a better honey crop. This hive was so busy hauling pollen and nectar this afternoon that I took the mouse guard off for a few hours.



Member **John Vrtachnik** shared a photo of one of his recently-installed swarm boxes. Keep us posted on your experience!






Swarm Panel

Most of us have heard about the new vaccine being developed by Dalan Animal Health to protect honeybees from American foulbrood. While studies are still analyzing effectiveness, one recent study estimates a 30% to 50% increase in resistance to American foulbrood in a vaccinated queen's offspring. Field trials are planned for 2023.
