#### Do you Smell the Goldenrod?

For the first time in a while my bees have been very active and I see them on the Goldenrod. I'm also hearing from most of you that your bees have been equally active. But I haven't yet enjoyed that rich aroma. Hope it happens soon!

A great use of thermal imaging. Yvonne Gibson recently sent me information on a call she had for bee removal. After climbing a ladder to the top of the roof, she discovered that the bees were somewhere in a triple chimney. She was not sure how they would determine where exactly they were located.

Turns out the owner worked for NASA and had access to thermal imaging equipment. This is the same type of equipment some beekeepers use to check where the bees are in their hives in winter.

**Food for winter**. I know this is repetitious, but don't forget to check your hives to make sure they have enough winter stores!!!

Varroa Mites. Lastly, this will be the last reminder for this year regarding checking and/or treating for Mites in your hives. It is a bit of work, but the result can be a healthy hive better able to make it through the winter. You'll love yourself come Spring!

There is a ton less capped brood in your hives now, making it an excellent chance to knock the mites down since they are mostly phoretic (few cells to hide in).

## Get a bee's eye view of your landscape

Beescape is a web-based tool developed by Penn State University to help beekeepers, gardeners, urban planners, growers, researchers, and land managers assess the quality of their landscapes for supporting bees and other pollinators. Bees can fly up to 3 miles (5 kilometers) from their nest to find food, and Beescape provides an easy way for you to explore the landscapes surrounding your location.

After launching Beescape, select your location by entering your address or by manually navigating to your location using the web interface. Beescape will return information on habitat quality, the economic impact of pollinators, land use, climate, and more. Visit https://pollinators.psu.edu/bee-health/beescape to view more information.
