- Awarding over \$52,000 to Granville County school teachers in grants including:

 Experience Grants for memorable out-of-classroom experiences
 Performing and Visual Arts Grants to enhance creative efforts in the field of art
- Funding several cultural arts programs throughout our district schools
- Supporting literacy by providing each elementary school with a \$1,000 Literacy Grant
- Providing resources to specific programs and interests (i.e. textbook purchases and reading programs) by way of pass-through donations




The Granville Education Foundation (GEF) recently awarded over \$50,500 in grants to Granville County School teachers. This year, 48 grant applications were received and GEF awarded 26 grants in 11 different schools. Teachers were eligible to submit grant applications that were reviewed and scored by GEF Grant Committee members. The grant applicants name and school were made anonymous before the grant committee members read and scored the grant. On Tuesday, December 8, 2020, the GEF "Prize Patrol" visited and celebrated the grant recipients in person and via Zoom.



As an educator in Granville County schools, Mrs. Lela Eaton was known for providing a unique style to her teaching methods. She used various creative ways to teach children and expand their learning experience. Named after Mrs. Eaton, the purpose of the Lela Eaton Creative Teaching Grant is to enhance instruction and student achievement through creative and innovative classroom projects. "The Drumming Out Stress grant was used to help students with their social and emotional learning and to teach them stress management strategies. Students were asked what kind of mood they were in before and after the lesson by putting a sticker under a smiley face, meh face or sad face. The students participated in cardio fitness drumming routines where they would follow an instructor and perform the activity. At the end, students in the older classes were given time to come up with their own routines and then they would show it to a partner. After the lesson many of the moods changed to a happier state. The students left the class ready to learn with smiles on their faces and a better understanding of positive stress management skills. They also left feeling a "good tired" as some students put it because they were moving around so much. The grant was used in grades 2nd – 5th but I used the equipment with all grades levels and changed up some of the routines to accommodate different learning levels. I feel that the grant was a success because I have had students asking to be able to use the equipment again. I hope to use the grant next year to help get out stress for the teachers and to help students before tests.



The Granville Education Foundation is always looking for new ways to provide opportunities and experiences to the students in Granville County Schools. The purpose of the Experience grant is to enhance instruction and student achievement through experiences outside the classroom. In 2020-2021 the Granville Education Foundation funded 3 experience grants awarding over \$2,500 to Granville County Schools. Please see the list of grant winners below.

Students were also able to make science ice, participate in the heating and freezing process during our matter unit. Thank you so much for the opportunity to offer this experience to our students. 


Success Through Technology









Arts in School

The Granville Education Foundation is a proud recipient of the 2020-2021 NC Arts Council Grassroots Arts Grant. This year the foundation received \$18,720.00 to fund our arts in School Project. The funds were used to provide cultural arts residencies, programs, and experiences for the students in GranvilleCounty Schools. Here are some of the highlights from GEF and Granville County School this year.

In 2020-2021, we provided the opportunity for over seven hundred Granville County School K-2 grade students to watch a pre-recorded performance with live zoom question & answering of Willa Brigham's "Storytelling Fun!". This performance helped our students develop listening, understanding, and character development skills. They also learned the needs of a good story; a strong opening, colorful adjectives, details and descriptive characterization as the story comes to an explosive end.





Number Drummer creator, Troy Kryzalka, has worked in music education for over 15 years and has delivered his integrated math and music learning approach to thousands of children and educators. He has an amazing ability to reach creative "outside the box" thinkers that have been discouraged by the traditional ways of learning, and because of his focus on mathematics in music, he represents the increased value and importance of music in schools. Combining his musical ability, mathematical perspective, and creative teaching methods, Troy inspires, engages, and motivates children to understand math and music from a fresh new perspective, regardless of age or ability. This year, Troy provided a pre-recorded performance with live zoom question & answering on "The Math Machine". Over seven hundred Granville County School 3-5 grade students attended.

Carlota Santana Spanish Dance Company was created by Ms. Carlota Santana an internationally renowned flamenco artist and educator. The "Fiesta Flemenca Lecture Demonstration" provided over 600 Granville County School 6-8 grade students the opportunity to be exposed to Latino cultural expression through flamenco dance. Our students learned the history of flamenco, the instruments involved, and the importance of the artists' teamwork. These performances were offered in both pre-recorded and live zoom with dancer interactions.







Finally, Mr. Marcos Augusto Napa Ormeno has dedicated his career to Afro-Pruvian music and dance. Marcos provided pre-recorded performances for over 700 Granville County School 9-12 grade students. Our students learned the history of Afro-Peruvian culture the instruments involved, and the dances associated.

All these programs and performances gave our students exposure to the arts. Most of our schools only have one type of art class, if they have art classes offered at their school. So, GEF places a lot of emphasis on the importance of our Arts at School Programs and strives to provide art programs to supplement the students' curriculum, while also giving them memorable, cultural arts experiences. These programs engaged the students and got them excited about learning. They were also given an opportunity to learn about different cultures in a way that was fun and interactive. The feedback we receive from the schools and teachers about these programs is always positive, which is why it is imperative for GEF to continue funding programs like these.

Literacy Initiatives 🦠



Having always placed emphasis on literacy in Granville County Schools, the Granville Education Foundation finds it imperative to continue supporting this initiative by assessing each year where literacy support can be most beneficial and providing resources aligned with those needs. For the 2020-2021 school year, after receiving positive feedback from the schools, we again directed our support to the elementary school level and gave each elementary school a \$1,000 Literacy Grant to use for their particular literacy needs, as the specifics ofthose needs varied from school to school. GEF saw fit to continue this initiative and proudly donated \$11,000 to provide each Granville County Elementary School with the \$1,000 Literacy Grant.

Examples of how this literacy funding was used include:

- support for new teacher classroom libraries
- school lending libraries
- · phonics and online reading programs
- · resources for volunteers to use in one-on-one intervention programs
- and more, the list goes on!

We hope to expand our literacy budget in the coming years and to continue supporting this initiative.
