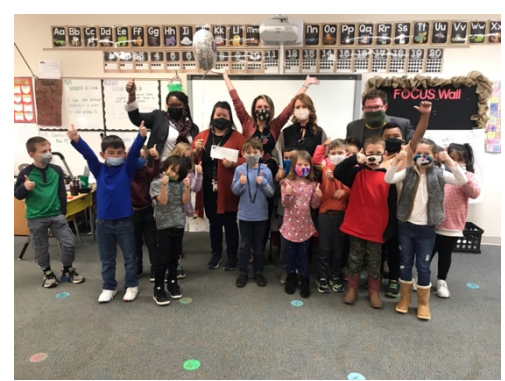
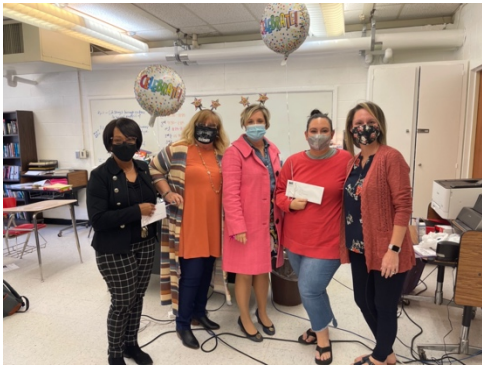


The Granville Education Foundation (GEF) awarded over \$50,500 in grants to Granville County School teachers. This year, 82 grant applications were received and GEF awarded 40 grants in 16 different schools. Teachers were eligible to submit grant applications that were reviewed and scored by GEF Grant Committee members. The grant applicants name and school were made anonymous before the grant committee members read and scored the grant. On Friday, November 19, 2021, and Monday, November 22, 2021, the GEF “Prize Patrol” visited and celebrated the grant recipients.

“This day was filled with surprises, excitement, and tears of joy for many deserving teachers and students. We secretly notified the school principals we would be awarding the grants, but the teachers were unaware. Balloons, checks, and grant acceptance letters were delivered to the schools during the celebrations. It was delightful to witness these very happy Granville County School teachers receive their grants!” said GEF Executive Director, Jennifer Cufalo. “Our grant funding goes directly into the classrooms for these teachers’ innovative projects, which is exciting not only for the teachers receiving the grants, but for their schools, their students, and for our GEF Board of Directors. Lela Eaton Creative Teaching Grant

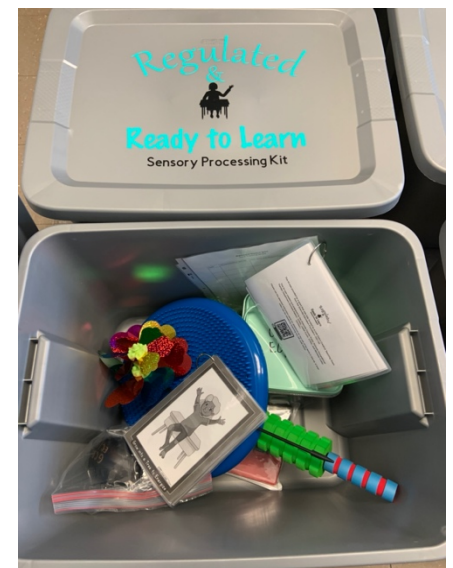


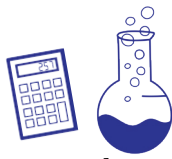

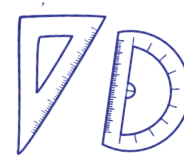
“The funds from this grant allowed the occupational therapy department of Granville County Public Schools to create a Regulated and Ready to Learn Sensory Processing Kit for each of the 8 elementary. Each kit contains a variety of sensory processing tools and instructions for proper use. The tools include noise reduction headphones, inflatable seat cushion, pinwheel, calming tactile strips, pressure foam roller, chair bands, and a bundle of sensory fidgets. Instruction cards include a QR code link to a brief online webinar to provide further instructions/videos for the items in the kits. The kits allow for trial of sensory processing tools to determine which tools enable individual students to reach maximum potential to attain education goals in the academic setting. Items are borrowed from the kit to trial with individual students. A Data Tracking Sheet is included in the kit for teachers to record the date trialed, student name, and student response to the tool. The implementation and use of the items in these kits are producing students that are alert, calm, and more ready to learn.”

“After our Science is Fun field trip, the students were able to describe what force and motion were much better. They were able to have a better understanding of how objects move and created an experiment as a result to demonstrate their new knowledge. I gave the students a pre-assessment before we began our unit to see how much they already know about force and motion. After the end of the field trip, students will use the knowledge they gained to build two ramps as an assessment of new learning. They had to build a ramp out of collected materials that allowed a toy car to roll down the ramp. Using force and motion vocabulary, they described how their toy car is moving and what forces are acting upon it as does. Then, they made a second ramp that will make their toy cars move faster (higher elevated ramp) and then described the differences the height made. Their background knowledge of the vocabulary and the scientific process of conducting an experiment were made possible through the Motion Mania Field Trip. Using a performance-based assessment also reinforced that learning transcends the classroom. Along with valuable content knowledge, the students participated in learning how to use other scientific material such as a pipette and water beaker. This will only add to their knowledge of science vocabulary in the coming years. I am very appreciative of the Granville Education Foundation. Thank you so much for funding our grant!”

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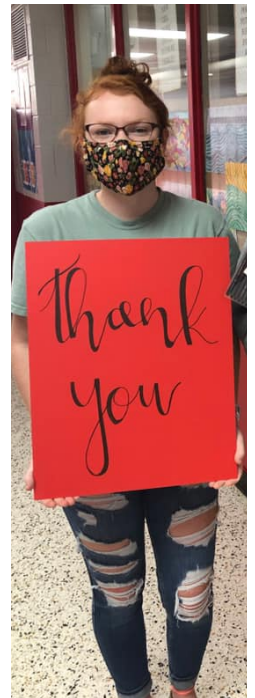


Success Through Technology

Thank you for providing our students the opportunity to grow their reading skills by learning vocabulary words through means that not even the best educator in the world could create. Articulating the gratitude, I have for your awarding "Opening Doors (Post Fostering Foundations)" is beyond difficult, so I asked my colleagues and students to testify about their experiences with Membean. I will begin with my colleagues. Amanda Baker said, "I love Membean! My students enjoyed competing with each other to use the words they learned, and they also would test me as well, hoping to trip me up (they couldn't). They were very motivated by seeing their numbers of successful word use increase and how their quiz grades improved over the semester as they consistently used the program." Leslie Magnanti said, "Membean has been a lifesaver in my classroom for my teaching sanity. I know that students are getting individualized vocabulary instruction with little effort on my part. I find that each and every student who actively engages in the program over the course of the semester increases their vocabulary. My favorite part is having students use the words organically in real conversations with me." Kathleen Stone, our ELA inclusion teacher, said, "Membean is a great way for all students to learn new words authentically at the level they are at. It is a great way to differentiate vocabulary lessons, so all students get the vocabulary support they need. I am delighted to have access to Membean for our learners." Again, hearing me saying "thank you" is definitely not enough. Here are reasons why I do feel such deep gratitude: I asked my students to share words that they could immediately recall that they have learned or even occasions where they have used a word in conversation. Chap instantly recalled words were metropolitan, aesthetic, incarcerate, innovation, intricate, coalition, and paramount. She also shared how she used one word at home: "Abolish, or, formally put an end to something. I've used this when talking to my parents about politics." I smiled at Andrea's response mentioning her parents: "genre, purge, implicit--! like that word the most. It's like when you understand something just by looking at something. Like when looking at a parent and just by looking at their eyes you know what they mean. Artifact is one. I was telling my mom about this really cool like statue, but I just replaced the word statue and said it was like an artifact. Another word I used was genre when my mom and I were talking about these books I wanted to get, so we checked if there were like different genres but turned out there wasn't any so yeah." Jeremiah said, "I was talking to my mom about an ugly dog we saw on the road, and I said, 'That dog is very unsightly', and it was pretty ugly. Joshua shared: "Valiant and Robust. When we were speaking about character traits, I had remembered about those words and used them." Bryson said, "I started using better words like annihilate rather than destroy in my sentences about some of the wreckage that happens. I also used ingrained when explaining my understanding of subjects. 'This is ingrained in my head now.' I learned arid, belligerent, cynical, disarray, enthrall, frivolous, just to name a few ... Therefore, on behalf of the entire student body who had access to Membean solely because of your generous foundation, I do thank you. I thank you! We thank you!

When the Ukuleles arrived in December, protocols still prevented singing, so I decided to begin Uke instruction by teaching students to pick melodies for which they needed to know how to read treble clef pitches and interpret and perform rhythmic note values, a skill that up to this point, both our 5th & 6th grade classes had been apathetic, reluctant, and resistant to engage in. However, when the Ukuleles arrived, their excitement and interest grew with the prospect of playing these new instruments. We capitalized on this newfound enthusiasm by offering 5th and 6th graders the opportunity to learn Ukulele this year, but also added a prerequisite that they would need to demonstrate <90% proficiency on a short assessment of note names, rhythmic values in 4/4 & treble clef pitch names in order to earn the privilege of playing Ukes.



In doing so, the Target Population for this Grant was expanded to include 5th as well as 6th graders and the number of students involved was increased to 150. In the spring, since Covid protocols had relaxed, I was able to begin Ukulele instruction by teaching strumming and chords to the classes who demonstrated Music Literacy proficiency. I also starting an afterschool Uke Class for the students in other classes who earned <90% to be able to learn Uke while their classmates continued to learn, & 2) making myself available during my planning periods for students to come for one-on-one instruction to help them make the connection. Most of our students do not own or have access to a Ukulele at home but were able to make good progress with just our once/week large group lessons (although many did complain about their fingertips being getting sore.)



Many in the younger grades were also intrigued with the Ukuleles, so I'm hoping to introduce beginning Ukulele as a mini unit to 3rd & 4th graders next year, while continuing with more advanced Ukulele opportunities for our 5th & 6th graders. In future classes I will also build in time for students to play chords by themselves to allow for self as well as teacher assessment and adjustment. Also, spreading out the seating will allow students to better hear themselves individually to better self-assess. And for next year's 6th graders, as they learn more chords, I plan to challenge them to search the internet to find popular songs that they like that I can transcribe for Ukulele chords. THANKS for ALL Granville Ed Foundation does to support the kids in our community!!!

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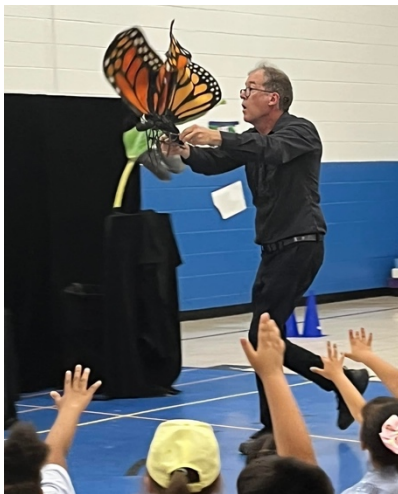


Arts in School



The Granville Education Foundation is a proud recipient of the 2021-2022 NC Arts Council Grassroots Arts Grant. This year the foundation received \$18,663.00 to fund our arts in School Project. The funds were used to provide cultural arts residencies, programs, and experiences for the students in GranvilleCounty Schools. Here are some of the highlights from GEF and Granville County School this year.

In 2021-2022, we provided the opportunity for over nine hundred Granville County middle and high school students to watch seven pre-recorded performances of Mike Wiley’s productions of “Jackie Robinson: A Game Apart”, “Tired Souls: The Montgomery Bus Boycott”, “Brown vs. Board of Education: Over Sixty Years Later”, “One Noble Journey: A Box Marked Freedom”, “Breach of Peace”, “A Fire of Freedom”, and “Dar He: The Story of Emmett Till”. Mr. Wiley uses theatrical resources to shine a light on key events and figures in African American history. These performances helped our students gain lessons of courage, dedication, perseverance, and leadership while also providing strong history lessons and awareness of challenges still being made today.



Hobey Ford, an internationally renowned puppeteer, provided two shows at each of our eight elementary schools impacting over two thousand student’s grades K-6. In his live performances of “Animalia”, Mr. Ford explores the magical world of animals and introduces education on metamorphosis, various ecological systems, and endangered animals. In his performances of “World Tales”, Hobey brings the Caldecott award winning art of Gail Haley to life with a two-dimensional rod puppet rendition of Gail’s West African Anansi tale “A Story, A Story”. They explored three classic bug stories from around the world and during the show he took the time to explore and explain his unique process of puppet craftsmanship through fun antics which brought joy and smiles to all in attendance.

Finally, Mr. Pierce Freelon provided a virtual performance/assembly, “Sankofa”, about the history of African American music from spirituals to hip hop for all our Granville County middle school and high school students. Over 900 students had the opportunity to learn elements of storytelling, improvisation, and call and response in American music. This musical group engaged and taught our students the history of music in a fun and effective way.



All these programs and performances gave our students exposure to the arts. Most of our schools only have one type of art class, if they have art classes offered at their school. So, GEF places a lot of emphasis on the importance of our Arts at School Programs and strives to provide art programs to supplement the students’ curriculum, while also giving them memorable, cultural arts experiences. These programs engaged the students and got them excited about learning. They were also given an opportunity to learn about different cultures in a way that was fun and interactive. The feedback we receive from the schools and teachers about these programs is always positive, which is why it is imperative for GEF to continue funding programs like these.





New Teacher Kick-Off

The Granville Education Foundation was proud to assist the Granville County Chamber of Commerce with the New Teacher Bags for their Annual New Teacher Kick-Off Event in 2021. Executive Director Jennifer Cufalo also shared words of encouragement and welcomed all our new teachers to Granville County Schools virtually.

Literacy Initiatives



Having always placed emphasis on literacy in Granville County Schools, the Granville Education Foundation finds it imperative to continue supporting this initiative by assessing each year where literacy support can be most beneficial and providing resources aligned with those needs. For the 2021-2022 school year, after receiving positive feedback from the schools, we again directed our support to the elementary school level and gave each elementary school a \$1,000 Literacy Grant to use for their particular literacy needs, as the specifics of those needs varied from school to school. GEF saw fit to continue this initiative and proudly donated \$11,000 to provide each Granville County Elementary School with the \$1,000 Literacy Grant.

Examples of how this literacy funding was used include:

- support for new teacher classroom libraries
- school lending libraries
- phonics and online reading programs
- resources for volunteers to use in one-on-one intervention programs
- and more, the list goes on!

We hope to expand our literacy budget in the coming years and to continue supporting this initiative.

Arts in Bloom Gala & Silent Auction

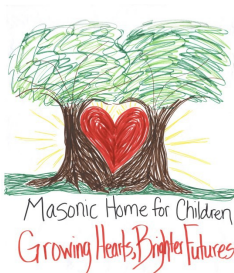
