

### **GFWC VIRGINIA PRESIDENT**



98 of our 119 (82%) GFWC Virginia clubs reported, with a total membership of 3,068, volunteered 328,247 hours toward 4,784 projects. \$538,668 in monetary donations and \$547,873 of in-kind donations were contributed to aid toward strengthening the lives of others in our local communities, nation and world. \$136,463 was spent to advance communications and public relations, leadership, legislation/public policy and membership. Club members were innovative and productive in their fundraising efforts, raising \$559,547 to make available funds to carry out mission goals.

Our State Project Committee went beyond the call of duty promoting the assigned mission of Education of Virginia's Natural Resources" namely our flora and fauna, waters, soil and woods. Remember the fun, members had participating building 25 Blue Bird houses at convention 2023 that were distributed though-out Virginia by our District Presidents. Then there was the very interesting service project at our 2023 State Conference where you participated vigorously folding and filling four hundred Watershed Explorer Learning boxes for the Nansemond River Preservation Alliance that were distributed to third grade students in Suffolk County Schools. It was an honor to have on hand the Alliance's President on hand to explain their mission. The State Project Committee has been holding a "Federation Forest" drawing and selling a beautifully designed Swallowtail butterfly pins as fundraisers. Funds will be divided between the Wildlife Center of Virginia and the Virginia Forestry Education Foundation. We were pleased to have the Virginia Forestry Education Foundations represented to speak at our 2023 convention. Promoting stewardship and supporting our State Project has been quite evident of the many projects carried out whether educating our members and youth or simply enjoying our great outdoors of community parks, rivers, beaches, mountains or your own backyard.

Convention 2023 hosted by the Alice Kyle District, found members hearing from speakers such as an inspiring Recreation Therapist and Mary Beth Williams, GFWC Secretary. Members got comfortably dressed in "Denim & Diamonds" for the Marjorie Branch Banquet so they could quickly enjoy hoping to win at Bingo. For the Alice Kyle Banquet we celebrated our Past Presidents, in a lavish ballroom, with members dressed in "Gatsby" attire, and serenaded by a String Quartet. During the convention's Friday Session members heard the names of passed members during the reverent Memorial Service conducted by our Chaplain. The Arts and Crafts show was a grand success with many winners. GFWC Virginia members are proud to have Caitlen Carrington, win the student short contest, where she also received first place on the GFWC International level. Caitlen's story was submitted by the GFWC Lexington Woman's Club. Members were on board with the "Step In Time" Health and Wellness project as they had a chance to tread the hills of downtown Lynchburg.

Conference 2023 hosted by the Southside District welcomed a wonderful attendance with a full day's agenda after a fun Friday night of fellowship and laughter at the "Virginia's Got Talent" Show. The goal of the conference was to enlighten members

of our GFWC Affiliates and for state chairmen to hold a "Cornerstone Marketplace". Kudos to our state chairmen for their great displays of information and availability to answer questions. To help carry out Q&A for the remainder of this administration a State Affiliate Coordinator was appointed. Four Affiliates were highlighted at conference, Operation Smile, Hope for Justice, St Jude Children's Research Hospital, and Canine Companions. We were fortunate to have the Executive Director of Virginia Food Banks speak to us about our Virginia Food Banks since club members were already primed to do what they could to support the GFWC National Day of Service. Members also volunteered to help VA Tech students with the project "Milk for Good" at the Virginia State Fair. The Southside District had collected can goods for the ForKids nonprofit and they used the some goods to decorate the tables. Seemed it was also an appropriate time to hear from the Alzheimer's Association. Even though GFWC International President was a bit under the weather, she still made the trip from Washington, DC to Suffolk and as always brought her "Dream Big...Sparkle More... Shine Bright enthusiasm. Our GFWC Virginia Leadership Education and Development Seminar (LEADS) was successful in providing upcoming leaders with a variety of information to strengthen leadership skills.

Virtual(Zoom) means have grown to a norm status for countless Committees, Executive Committee, Executive Board and ESO Book Club meetings. The Virginia Clubwoman continues to be distributed as does the Cornerstone Connection.

This officer has enjoyed the privilege of working with Denise Price, GFWC Virginia Director of Junior Clubs representing GFWC Virginia at the GFWC Annual Convention in Louisville KY and Southeastern Region Conference in Huntington, WV. It has be a joy to make official visits to District Meetings and join clubs for anniversary celebrations and other events. The GFWC Virginia Joint Executive Boards were not only involved in business matters at state meetings but a service project were held at each meeting location. I consider myself blessed to have worked with a talented and committed Executive Committee, Executive Board, Junior Executive Board, State Chairmen and Special Appointees. GFWC Virginia members hopefully do realize the impact of your service in your local communities and across Virginia. GFWC Virginia Juniors continue to "Lead the Way" and do amazing work in their communities. The Junior Clubs have completed 741 projects throughout Virginia. They volunteered 18,639 hours and donated 62,582.73 dollars. Using the compass as a symbol for GFWC Virginia Junior community service projects, they certainly dedicate their time and talents to their communities.

The Juniors true "North" is evident in their leadership skills, as they serve their clubs, districts, state, region, and GFWC in various leadership positions. They attended state conventions, conferences, and GFWC International Conventions. The Juniors shared their knowledge during educational programs and new member orientations. Juniors also attended the GFWC Virginia LEADS after conference in August. Junior clubs communicated with their members and communities, using scrapbooks, websites, newsletters, and social media. They ensured members had access to the club agendas, minutes, and membership applications. Juniors also celebrated club anniversaries, members milestones, celebrated holidays, and attended socials at restaurants, breweries, and other events.

As the Juniors moved "East", they supported the Children of Virginia in very creative ways. Clubs donated their time and money to support children's food insecurities by providing food on weekends and holidays. They also supported food banks by providing much needed food. Juniors gave scholarships to high school students and art programs. They filled school closets with school supplies, personal hygiene products, and clothes. GFWC Virginia Juniors were also generous in their appreciation of first responders, nurses, and teachers by donating treats. Reading for school age children was also important for the Junior clubwoman. They promoted school-based book clubs, donated books, and volunteered at local libraries to assist with reading and summer programs. Outreach to the children in their communities, was also important to the Juniors. They financed families during the holidays with gifts. They collected diapers, wipes, and baby items for teenage mothers and domestic violence shelters. The Juniors also supported events in their communities, such as races and tacky-light walks. Several clubs made bags of items for senior citizens and the homeless. Another Junior club hosted a Cotillion for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders. Juniors also wore blue to support the prevention of human trafficking, purple to support the prevention of child abuse, and red for heart health.

The Juniors then headed "South" as they supported their communities and GFWC partnerships, by sending cards to St. Jude and collecting pop-tops for the Ronald McDonald House. One club partnered with their community and can collected 1,200 can goods for a local food bank. Juniors supported low-income families, residential homes, and the homeless by providing food and clothing items. Communities benefited from the Juniors donating their time at local festivals, food banks, and remembrance ceremonies. The Juniors also supported local animal shelters by donating money, food, and toys. The cleanliness of their communities was also important as they picked up trash in local parks and streets. Plastic was also collected for the purchase of Trex benches, to be placed in their communities. They supported veteran initiatives by feeding wounded warriors and supported Wreaths Across America by laying wreaths on veteran's graves. Health and wellness of their communities was also important to the Juniors. They promoted Heart Health Month, Relay for Life, and various cancer awareness weeks. Clubs also made blankets to donate to children's hospitals and the Linus project. Mental Health and Suicide Awareness was also supported by clubs. One club donated cellphones and iPads to Safe Harbor and the James House to support their programs.

As the Juniors finally headed "West", they supported fundraising efforts within their club and in their communities. Clubs held "Egg my Yard" fundraisers and raffled off baskets and one club held a silent auction. They collected loose change at meetings and one club hand- crafted ornaments to sell in their community. Raffles, purse bingos, yard sales, and various other fundraisers were also held. One club hosted a craft show and raise \$8,000 to donate back to their community. Other Junior clubs hosted Breakfast with Santa and had a Haunted History Walk. The Juniors also sold food and homemade sweets at local festivals.

GFWC Virginia Juniors used the compass to always find their way to those in need throughout their communities. They used their experience and passion to donate their time and money to causes close to their heart. Because of the GFWC Virginia Juniors, the world is a better place.

It was a pleasure to read the Leadership reports submitted by the clubs in Virginia. It is obvious that leadership is taken very seriously and that clubs understand the significance of training and helping members realize their leadership potential. Of the clubs that reported there were 592 projects reported totaling 54,265 hours. Of course, many of those hours involved club meetings and general officer responsibilities, however there were very many that involved training, educating, and creatively improving leadership skills.

Early on the Leadership Team in Virginia recognized the need to assist members in recognizing leadership potential in their districts. During the Summer Conference in Suffolk, it was obvious that there are members eager to grow as leaders. As evidenced by attendance at LEADS Virginia in Suffolk, members were ready to find ways to sharpen those skills.

An opportunity was provided for all club members in Virginia to participate in a statewide Zoom meeting to discuss the pros and cons of reporting, giving them the chance to offer suggestions to improve the process. The meeting was a success, attended by members throughout the state, and many of the suggestions made were implemented or at least are being explored.

Through our articles in The Clubwoman, these officers continue to stress our theme of *Leadership is an Action, Not a Position*. The goal is to provide club members with information to make them think about leadership, help them to see what is needed to reach their full leadership potential, and to have them understand that everyone is or can be a leader.

Congratulations Virginia Clubwomen, many thanks for helping to make our membership goals a reality during this administration. You have all worked hard to "Enlighten Our Membership" by renewing, recruiting, retaining, and orienting your club members. Once again, every district has added new members and to date we have sent out more than 230 welcome letters. We were happy to award eight Membership Grants this year to clubs across Virginia. These grants were used by the clubs to support their membership recruitment activities in their communities. Three Districts engaged in creating new clubs in 2023 with two being chartered by December and one being chartered in 2024. Many thanks to all the members who worked so diligently to make this happen.

During the 2023 club year, 64 Clubs reported in the Membership Advancement Area, volunteering 15,508 Hours, and contributing \$50,652.56 Spent and In-Kind Donations for 472 projects and programs. In April, we attended GFWC Virginia Convention in Lynchburg and awarded Virginia Clubs large and small, Generals and Juniors for best single projects as well as best overall projects. GFWC Top Recruiters were also awarded – we had top recruiters in every district and GFWC recruitment stars fourteen white, and four red stars were given out.

In August, we presented a PowerPoint presentation on 'everything membership' at the GFWC Virginia Conference. Handouts and other pertinent information were given to all attendees. The LEGO Headquarters Building was on display and all members were encouraged to recruit new members to complete the building. Every block represents a club member, and our hope is to complete the structure by our GFWC Virginia Convention in Harrisonburg in April 2024.

On the Retention and Renewal front, clubs have been stepping up the effort to hold orientations, they have been sharing news from the GFWC Membership team and are listening to their club members to find out what improvements can be made and where their interests are. Clubs are evaluating their Bylaws and requirements for membership and developing new projects while retiring the old and overused ones.

While we have lost some clubs this past year, our membership is steady and increasing ever slightly. Our hopes going forward are to maintain and increase our membership and continue to initiate new club formation. Let's all work together to strengthen our connections and numbers in GFWC Virginia!

The Alice Kyle District is comprised of 5 General Clubs and 3 Junior clubs, with 145 Dues paying members at the end of 2023.

The District held two district meetings during the year and one Executive Board Meeting.

The Alice Kyle District served as Hostess for the 2023 GFWC-Virginia State Convention held at the Virginian Hotel, in Lynchburg, VA in April 2023. All clubs but one were represented and members participated in decorating tables, providing "Grab N Go" Breakfasts for the State Executive Board meeting, and attended 2 banquets and 2 days of meetings.

Of the five General Clubs in the Alice Kyle District, three General Clubs reported, and 2 Junior clubs submitted reports and Stat Sheets.

Two of the Club reports included heavy hours and money donated in the Education and Libraries in their year-end reports. The Junior from So-Boston-Halifax raised funds for their education projects by holding a 5K Marathon and Run. Other clubs sold pecans, held a Farm to Table dinner and held a silent auction. Alice Kyle held a bake sale at both District meetings to raise funds to send a camper to Camp Hat Creek in the summer of 2024. The General Clubs supported the Junior's State Project Advocacy for Children by donating diapers, wipes, and women's hygiene products to the State drives and collections and also donated sizeable amounts to the State "Sweats for Vets" project by collecting sweat suits at each District Meeting. Junior clubs donated items to the Advocacy for Children projects. Fidgets, personal hygiene supplies and feminine products were donated at the state summer conference.

Arts and Culture Projects sponsored Literary Contests held for local students for the Arts N Crafts Show at District and State Level; Valentines were collected and sent to Nursing Homes. Activities were recorded involving creation of hospitality baskets for Officers at State Convention in April 2023 and serving as hostess of the Fall 2023 District Meeting. The Juniors contributed to Auction baskets fundraiser for District fundraisers. Mostly money donated to different organizations compiled the activities for Civic Engagement and Outreach.

One club produces a Club Newsletter.

General Recycling programs and projects by different members were reported in Environment as well as many outdoor area clean-up projects. Two outdoor areas, one Public Park and one School Water Pond lab were selected as cleanup projects by Junior Clubs. Generally, clubs donated to Environmental organizations and recycled in their individual homes.

### Blue Ridge District Carol Guilliams-Mills, President

### 162 Members 23,047 Volunteer Hours 188 Projects \$44,995 Donated & In-Kind



The GFWC Woman's club of Bedford participated in the Welcome Home Parade for the Bedford Boys returning from deployment in the Horn of Africa. Their float was entitled "Women in the Military, the Forgotten Warriors and Women on the Homefront". They also held their annual Craft Show.

The GFWC Bent Mountain Woman's Club's emphasis was literacy. Books were donated to Carilion Hospital's pediatric unit as well as a rural area in SW Virginia. Members filled backpacks for foster care children for summer fun and Christmas.

The GFWC Blacksburg Junior Woman's Club's emphasis was on Family, especially families in need. They ran a diaper drive, assisted the YMCA in their "Cinderella Project" by collecting formal wear for teens so they could attend the prom. They also participate in the "Last Minute Angels". Whereby they take the names of children not selected from the "Angel Tree" and purchased a coat, an outfit and gifts from the child's wish list.

The GFWC Botetourt Town and Country Woman's Club collected personal hygiene items, made bags and donated 100 of them to a shelter for domestic violence victims called "First Night Bags". They also helped paint, repair and clean an old house that will house the Botetourt History Museum.

The GFWC Floyd County Woman's Club established the first library in Floyd County and continue to support it through donations of books, money and helped celebrate its 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. They helped sponsor a Veteran's Day Parade and provided a canteen for Veteran's and their families.

The GFWC Roanoke County Woman's Club "planted" a pinwheel garden in downtown Salem to remind citizens that April is Child Abuse and domestic Violence month. The club helps defray expenses for members attending district, state and GFWC meetings.

The GFWC Woman's Club of Vinton donates books to the district. The books are sold at the meetings and the money is used to help defray district expenses. They give two scholarships to girls yearly, participated in "Soup for Seniors", donated homemade goodies to the fire and rescue squads monthly and members serve on the district, state and GFWC levels.

All clubs participated in the National Day of Service as well as the District President's special Project: Animal Welfare. Clubs donate pet food, toys and cleaning supplies to local animal shelters and at district meetings. The Executive director of the Roanoke Valley SPCA brought her Ambassador Dog to a district meeting.

Several clubs collected plastic so they could get a park bench from TREX.

Three clubs celebrated their anniversaries this year. The GFWC Botetourt Town and Country celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup>. Anniversary. The GFWC Roanoke County Woman's Club and the GFWC Woman's Club of Roanoke celebrated their 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversaries.

Unfortunately, the GFWC Woman's Club of Roanoke folded at the end of January. The club only had four members and three were already members of other clubs. The club members continued to work on projects until the end.

### LEE DISTRICT

<u>Affiliate Reports</u> 5 General and 1 Junior club donated \$1480 to HOBY. Canine Companions, Operation Smile, Heifer, UNICEF Trick or Treat and Shot @Life, and St, Jude's.

<u>GFWC Signature Project-Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention:</u> 8 projects were completed with donations of \$5537 and in-kind donations of \$3044.84.

<u>GFWC Juniors' Special Project – Advocates for Children:</u> 27 projects were completed with donations of \$3146.19 and in-kind donations of \$3429. 2 Junior Clubs and 2 General clubs. Projects included Build A Bears for Police to use, planting Pin Wheel Gardens, and donating car seats.

<u>Arts and Culture:</u> 48 projects were accomplished by 8 General clubs and 1 Junior club. Clubs visited museums, went to plays, donated art supplies to schools and nursing homes and to the Childrens Hospital of Richmond at VCU. J Federated WC of Chester held Cotillion for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students.

<u>Civic Engagement and Outreach:</u> Peanut butter and Jelly sandwiches were made for the Homeless in the Richmond Area, toothbrushes were given out at a Truck or Treat event, Sweats4Vets were collected Coats for Kids were collected and sent to Puritan Cleaners where they were cleaned and handed out to those in need. A total of \$8966 was donated to projects along with \$37.136.21 were in kind donations.

Clubs made Thanksgiving baskets for food banks and Families First. Clubs donated eyeglasses to the Lions Club who recycled them to third world countries.

<u>Education and Libraries:</u> 118 projects were completed by both Generals and Juniors. \$86,2110 was donated to area education programs. In-kind donations were \$9,086.90 for school needs. Monies were donated to the Mary Macon McGuire and Phyllis Roberts Scholarships. Clubs also had scholarships they awarded to area seniors going off to college.

**Environment:** 46 projects were undertaken by both Junior and General clubs. \$135 were donated and \$4872.05 in-kind donations were made 2 clubs used their Christmas Exchange a gift that was recyclable and had been recycled. Clubs collected wine corks that were sent off for a 2-cent donation for each cork for environment projects. Clubs recycled trash from their homes and published ideas and tips on recycling in their newsletters.

<u>Health and Wellness:</u> Clubs used their newsletters to publish healthy meals, health ideas and exercise programs. Clubs participated in the GFWC Virginia program, Step in Time. Support was given for Breast Cancer Awareness, Pink and Pearls, Sylvia's Sisters, Wear Red Day, and Red Cross Blood Drives. A total of \$12,958 was donated and \$78,884.78 in-kind donations were made.

<u>Communications and Public Relations:</u> Clubs used Facebook, Messenger, newsletters, ads in local newspapers and websites to communicate with their communities. Shirts were imprinted with club names and slogans; aprons were worn at different functions. Clubs received News and Notes, Virginia Club Woman Magazine, and Lees Traveler.

**Leadership:** 33 Lee District members serve Lee District and GFWC Virginia. We have members who serve on the Southeastern region. Members attend GFWC Convention, Lee District meetings, GFWC Convention, GFWC Conference Richmond Area Presidents Council and Lee District members serve as Docents at the Governor's Mansion. **Legislation and Public Policy:** Members of Lee District voted in elections, were encouraged to read the GFWC Legislative Action Center newsletter to keep abreast of the legislation being decided upon. The chairman wrote articles for the Lees Traveller and kept members apprised of where to vote.

<u>Membership:</u> To recruit and retain members, socials were held, ads were placed in local newspapers. Clubs publish yearbooks, electronically keep in touch with members and use social media to announce events. Clubs make name tags, wear special aprons and shirts to show off their club. Clubs are there whenever a member needs their support.

<u>Fundraising and Development:</u> Brunswick stew sales, bean soup packages, ornaments, silent auctions peanuts, yard sales, work at Bizarre Bazaar, Bunco, Ashland Harvest Run were all done to raise money for Philanthropic projects. \$54, 244. \*\* was raised through these activities.

<u>Women's History and Resource Center:</u> The Essex County Woman's Club of GFWC celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary at Rose Hill in Tappahannock, VA where the first meeting of this club met. Presentations were made and homemade refreshments were served. Members donated to the 1907 Society, to the Women's History and Resource Center, a member attended the annual Women's History event at Headquarters.

The 884 club projects covered all of the Community Service Programs, Advancement Plan Areas and special programs. A snapshot account of activities follows:

### **Special Programs**

**<u>GFWC:</u>** WC of Fairfax supported Free the Girls by donating bras – Springfield WC supported a battered women's shelter – clubs set up Pinwheel Gardens.

<u>**GFWC Juniors:**</u> The Junior Woman's Club of Loudon held their Formal Dress Giveaway program – Several clubs supported Backpack Buddies.

<u>Arts & Culture:</u> Bel Air WC again had a presentation by a Native American — Arlington WC held dance rehearsals in their club parking lot-Herndon Fortnightly assisted with Friday Night Live, a community event.

<u>Civic Engagement:</u> Several clubs participated in the National Day of Service and Wreaths Across America. They provided rides to the elderly and bags of clothing to the homeless and supported first responders.

<u>Education & Libraries</u>: Several clubs gave scholarships to high school students going on to college-Fredericksburg WC donated books to the Head Start Program – New Dominion WC provided a book to every child in an elementary school – several clubs participated in school book fairs.

<u>Environment:</u> Clubs collected aluminum can tabs for Ronald McDonald House — Woodbridge WC picked up trash on Route 1 for Adopt-a-Spot- clubs held plant swaps, provided squirrel nesting boxes, and promoted the monarch butterflies.

<u>Health & Wellness:</u> Clubs donated feminine hygiene products and held programs on nutrition, disease prevention and physical and emotional health. Loudoun donated staff and equipment to a center for individuals with disabilities and Mary Ball tied pink ribbons to fences to honor women fighting breast cancer.

<u>Communication & Public Relations:</u> Clubs contacted members and non-members through newsletters, social media, web sites, email blasts. Western Fairfax uses a 3- sided tablecloth at community events to advertise their club.

<u>Leadership:</u> District members take leadership roles in their clubs and also serve at every level of GFWC: district, state, region and national.

<u>Legislation:</u> Springfield invited the Fairfax County Supervisor to speak at their meeting. His mother was a member of the club before she passed away.

<u>Membership:</u> Clubs emphasized this area of need with the following activities: meet and greet, ice cream socials, and teas. Manassas designed fans with their logo and QR code which they distribute at community events.

<u>Fundraising:</u> Arlington WC rents out their clubhouse to the community. — Clubs held fashion shows, bunco parties, and sold white house ornaments. Who wouldn't want pink flamingos for their lawn from the McLean WC.

<u>WHRC:</u> Arlington had a history presentation on holocaust survivors and Bel Air held a program featuring the ladies of Rippon Lodge.

<u>Virginia's Natural Resources & Education:</u> Mary Ball supported a pollinator garden on Patawomeck Tribal Land and clubs supported the Flower Program.

<u>GFWC Northern District Special Project - Care for Kids:</u> Clubs continue to support the district project with donations that have reached \$11,013 to date for children entering the foster care system.

### SHENANDOAH DISTRICT

GFWC Signature Project: Domestic Violence Awareness & Prevention: Clubs participated in 19 Projects; 4566 Volunteer Hours; \$1009 Donated, and \$3210 In-Kind. Greene delivered 315 notes of encouragement along with a pair of socks, 10 pounds of toiletries, with notes both in Spanish and English to SHE, the local Shelter for Help and Emergency in Charlottesville. Covington donated drawstring bags with toiletry items from the Summer Conference. Waynesboro donated food for Thanksgiving dinner to the local shelter. Lexington gave \$450 in gift cards in \$10 denominations for use at Goodwill, gas stations and Walmart; provided Easter Baskets for the children at the Shelter along with a pizza dinner and personal hygiene items.

<u>Arts:</u> Clubs participated in 21 Projects; 1619 Volunteer Hours; \$1180 Donated, and \$2611 In-Kind Donations. Club activities involved student/member art shows, art supplies to local schools. **Lexington** participated in a club art show with 41 entries. Three clubs held writing contests for members and students. **Lexington** hosted a writing contest for the students at the local high schools and elementary schools. One of the students won on GFWC level – the first time for Virginia to ever have someone win. She was our guest at the Fall District meeting and read her story for us. Waynes**boro** acted as hostess for the vendors at the annual arts and craft fair providing the snacks, drinks etc. for them for the entire weekend. **Covington** had a student/member art and craft show with hanging the artwork on the school walls for a period of time. **Lexington** hosted the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual International dinner for visiting college/high school students.

Environment: Clubs participated in 17 Projects; 1235 Volunteer Hours; \$1500 donated and \$209 In-Kind Conservation activities included recycling, beautification projects and planting trees and gardens **Covington** saved aluminum cans for the Ronald McDonald house of Roanoke, organized a spring cleanup of downtown Covington involving community members, donated funds for the purchase of a bench for the YMCA. **Waynesboro** sold bulbs as a fundraiser for the wildlife center, members bag the bulbs, members also collected garbage bags for TREX benches and have completed 6 – the last one in 2023 and given to various areas around town, club donated to the Nature Camp as well. **Lexington** had the director of Boxerwood Gardens come and speak to the club on the nature preserve. Upon learning of the need for a digital self-guided tour for the nature center and woodland gardens stepped up and donated to provide the funding for purchase of the signage and other items to create the tour. **Staunton** donated to the Nature Camp and collected grocery bags and egg cartons to donate to the local food pantry.

<u>Education</u>: Clubs participated in 612 Projects 2352 Volunteer Hours; \$20175 Donated, and \$2213 In-Kind.6 clubs reporting provided scholarships to high school seniors, students in Trade Schools and Community College. **Lexington** donated "kindergarten kits for over 200 children. **Waynesboro** donated \$7500 in scholarships.

**HOBY:** 2 Projects; 5 Volunteer Hours; \$300 Donated. Clubs provide scholarships for students to attend the HOBY seminar.

<u>Civic Engagement:</u> Clubs participated in 46 projects, 2450 Volunteer Hours \$28250 Donated \$86767 In-Kind. Food Pantries, Nursing Homes, Domestic Violence houses, Christmas Angel Trees were helped. **Covington** had a Veterans Day Speaker.

<u>Health and Wellness:</u> Clubs participated in 31 Projects; 4873.5 Volunteer Hours; \$ 4503.50 Donated, and \$9,605 In Kind. Projects include operating clothes closets, helping individuals with transportation to medical appointments, volunteering with the Backpack program, collecting food and toys and other needed supplies at Christmas. Donations of toiletries to the homeless and art supplies to children's advocacy organizations.

**Legislation:** Clubs participated in 8 projects; 627 Volunteer Hours; \$2630 spent.

<u>Operation Smile:</u> Members from the <u>Lexington</u>, <u>Covington</u>, <u>Wayland</u>, <u>and Waynesboro</u> collected toiletries, made hospital gowns, no-no armbands, and smile bags that were filled with toys and coloring books.

Communications and Public Relations: Clubs participated in 27 Projects; 1466 Volunteer Hours and \$1040 in- Kind Donation. Clubs advertise through newsletters, websites, 'rack cards', FB accounts, special 'branding' outfits, the annual yearbook, articles in newspapers, the District and State newsletters... 1 club has joined the local Chamber of Commerce, provides rack cards at local events to explain the GFWC and club membership, participates in the local Community Festival, and participated in the Natural Bridge Festival of Trees\*1 club participates in the Community Art Festival each fall and provides refreshments to the artists and craftsmen \*3 clubs have special outfits to wear during community outreach activities (hats, aprons, pins, t-shirts)

**<u>Leadership:</u>** Clubs participated in 46 Projects; 8517 Volunteer Hours, spent \$10.266

Members serve in leadership positions on the club, district, and state level and GFWC International. Members attend district and State convention, Summer Conference, and SER. Clubs also held officer transition meetings and reporting workshops. Board meetings, agendas, regular meetings were all held in Club as well as the District Level.

<u>Membership:</u> Clubs participated in 27 projects;917volunteer Hours, spent \$1607and \$738 in Kind. Recruiting and retaining members are top priorities for all clubs reporting, 22 membership coupons were also sent in.

<u>Women's History and Resource Center:</u> Clubs participated in 10 Projects; 197 Volunteer Hours, and \$718 donated with \$10 in-Kind. Buena Vista celebrated their 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary with state officers, district officers and chairmen in attendance.

Fundraising: Clubs participated in 22 Projects;3310 Volunteer Hours; \$47023 Raised, and \$1274 In-Kind.

Club fundraisers included craft and baked goods sales, ornaments, bridge luncheons, yard sales, and "The Year End Campaign" asking for end-of-year donations with an offer of matching contributions up to \$750. "Just Desserts" from **Lexington** and the annual **Waynesboro** music show. **Staunton** sold Christmas Ornaments. **Covington** had a day of Caring with the local chamber of Commerce and **Greene County** did an annual Fall Bazaar, a spring yard sale and a letter sent to all the community members detailing their club, missions, projects, etc. asking for donations.

#### SOUTHSIDE DISTRICT

Southside District celebrated 100 years of service to the community with a tea at the Spring District Meeting in March 2023. Our GFWC Virginia State President Bonnie Rosemond and State Director of Junior Clubs, Third Vice President Denise Price were in attendance. Ladies wore hats and gloves, and a program included the history of the district, and fun facts about district clubs were shared at the program. A delicious English tea was shared by everyone in attendance. Special district pins were designed, and a favor shared for those in attendance.

Southside District hosted Summer Conference in August and welcomed GFWC International President Deb Stranowski along with the State Executive Board. We hosted Virginia's Got Talent Event on Friday Night. We collected two car loads full of nonperishable can items that were used as table arrangements to remind clubs of the Day of Service.

Several clubs participated in Day of Service-Focus on Food Insecurity on September 30 with many working with local food pantries or food banks.

Several clubs supported the district project-Children's Mental Health and an emphasis on assisting CHKD Mental Health Hospital. We held a raffle for a gift card basket at the Spring District Meeting, and a silent auction at the Fall District Meeting. Half of the proceeds from each went to the district project. We also had a speaker from Western Tidewater Services to discuss the impact of the mental health crisis on families today at our Fall District Meeting.

We also collected shoes-over 100 pairs- for the SSD Third Vice President, Director of Junior Clubs project at the Fall District Meeting project for keeping moving for health.

Many clubs offer scholarships to local high school seniors. The district offers one scholarship in the amount of \$500. Clubs read to students during Read Across America Week. One club helps local young students find the bus for the first day of school. Some clubs hold book reading clubs.

Several clubs supported Sweats for Vets. One club had an annual Veteran's Program and dedicated veterans' bricks in the local park.

Several Southside members are members of the Dogwood Society.

SSD President Amy Riggs attended GFWC Leads at GFWC Convention 2023.

Several members participated in the Movement Challenge with one club having 35 members participating.

Other clubs promoted Woman's Health issues such as breast cancer and heart health.

We supported Domestic Violence Awareness and Advocates for Children with programs and donations for both.

Clubs supported the State Project and focused on the environment with donations to the state project, helping at convention with production of bird feeders and raising awareness of our state's natural resources.

Several members continue to serve GFWC at the district, state, and international level.

We remain a very active district and look forward to what the next 100 years will hold in service to our communities.

### SOUTHWESTERN DISTRICT

**GFWC Special Project: Domestic Violence Awareness:** Clubs hosted representatives from area agencies and shelters to speak to members. Clubs donated gently used clothing, hygiene products,

new pillows and helped renovate a duplex for victims getting back on their feet. One club took part in a Domestic Violence Awareness 5-K run.

Juniors Special Program: Advocates for Children: Project Linus saw many blanket donations for child trauma victims and ill children. Several clubs invited speakers to present programs addressing issues, such as children's mental health and abuse, that impact children. Coats, socks, hygiene products, and food were supplied for area school emergency closets. There were also special food programs for students during holiday breaks from school.

<u>Arts and Culture:</u> Some clubs had crafting classes or demonstrated various art skills at one local museum. Others donated their time to share crafts at parades, medical facilities, festivals, schools, and nursing homes. Donations were made to local choral, drama, and dancing programs. Members supported area artists by attending community theatres, the Barter Theatre, Wohlfahrt House Theatre, and Citizens for the Arts programs.

<u>Civic Engagement and Outreach:</u> This year's clubs participated in GFWC's National Day of Service – a food drive to help with food insecurity. Clubs support Legacy Hospice, several backpack programs, Tri-County Health Clinic, blessing boxes, diaper drives. Veterans got a great deal of support from our clubs. from helping provide desserts for a Gold Star Family BBQ and purchasing wreaths for Wreaths Across America, to sending Christmas cards to vets.

Education and Libraries: Clubs awarded scholarships and helped business supported Back to School supply giveaways. Clubs have given time and financial aid to area 4-H, Head Start, and STEM programs. Many members are Friends of the Library. They encourage the public to get or renew their library cards, read in schools during Read Across America, and go to events at local libraries-one such event hosted Adriana Trigiani. One club hosted a haunted story walk where participants visited stations to finish a story. One club recognizes local volunteers with a luncheon and awards.

**Environment:** Members of several clubs having memberships in area garden clubs and beautify their towns. They collect rainwater, compost, grow organically, and maintain community gardens. Gardens are grown with beneficials in mind. Clubs promote water quality and the National Take Back Day which keeps medication out of streams and landfills. Others maintain their cars, homes, and appliances for longer usage. Some members work with animal welfare to better the lives of stray animals. Others watch and feed birds.

<u>Health and Wellness:</u> Members have programs on managing various health issues, wear various colors to bring awareness to certain illnesses and post on Facebook to bring awareness to those illnesses. Some volunteer at an area assisted living facility. Another club supports their local health department program which aids pregnant and parenting teens. Several clubs participated in GFWC Virginia's "Step in Time" challenge.

<u>Communications and Public Relations:</u> Clubs rely on Facebook and club websites to share meeting information and recruit new members. Some maintain a scrapbook for club history and recruitment purposes. Other clubs send monthly letters in the mail to remind members about the upcoming meetings. Clubs are embracing branding through club gear and adding GFWC to club names. Some clubs have their own banners.

<u>Leadership:</u> Club members also take on leadership roles in the district and state. They not only serve as club leaders but serve as leaders in the community. They attend Spring and Fall District Meetings, the GFWC Virginia State Convention, and the GFWC Virginia Summer Conference. Two members participated in the LEADS Virginia Seminar, and another is taking part in the Junior Leadership Certification program.

<u>Legislation and Public Policy:</u> One club partnered with the Chamber of Commerce for a Meet and Greet the candidates and later worked the polls. Some members attend town hall meetings. Others are learning more about advocacy through GFWC's Legislative Advocacy Center which helps members keep up with important bills before Congress. Some learn through local nonprofit agencies.

<u>Membership:</u> Members receive anniversary year pins. New members go through an installation ceremony, receive their GFWC pins and flowers. Clubs use area events, Facebook, and ask friends, family, coworkers to join their clubs. Club leadership decorates meeting areas to make them inviting to members and potential members.

<u>Fundraising and Development:</u> This has been a great year for Fundraising! Clubs used the usual ideas such as raffles and pageants but incorporated some new ideas such as selling mocktails and having a Donut Dash.

<u>State and District Special Projects:</u> Clubs supported the Natural Resources Education project with monetary donations. District project Woods Waters, and Wildlife also received monetary donations from several clubs. The Linus Project has received many blankets to benefit ill and traumatized children.

#### TIDEWATER DISTRICT

In support of **GFWC Affiliates**, Tidewater District clubs made donations to Canine Companions, Heifer international, Hope for Justice, March of Dimes, St. Jude Children's

Research Hospital, UNF Shot@Life, and UNICEF. For Operation Smile, clubs volunteered 346 hours, donated \$647, and had \$524 of In-Kind donations. GFWC Great Bridge WC packed 875 Smile Bags and prepared 740 No-No Armbands. WC of Newport News conducted training for high school students, teaching them to make fleece blankets and No-No Armbands. In support of the GFWC Signature Program, clubs donated \$999 and \$7022 In-Kind donations to Women's Shelter residents and their children, sponsored training for volunteers for the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence, and donated first aid kits and gift cards to Samaritan House. GFWC WC of Tidewater partnered with the Virginia Beach Art Center's visual art exhibit focusing on Human Trafficking. Club members participated in the Red Sand Project, educating the public on the issue of human Trafficking. Clubs also supported the GFWC Junior Special **Program: Advocates for Children.** They donated over 500 items for the Children's Hospital of the Kings Daughters "Prize Closet" in Norfolk. Club members worked to provide gifts for needy families and toiletry items and snacks for students. **Arts and Culture** projects included participating in the Virginia Beach Art Center's Feather Project, providing background information on the WC of Norfolk mansion for a member's book on the restoration of the historic house, and holding the District's Arts and Crafts Contest at the WC of Hampton Clubhouse. Members attended art exhibits and school drama productions, and sent cards to residents of nursing homes. Civic Engagement and Outreach activities included the WC of Norfolk awarding two \$2500 scholarships to students at the Sentara School of Health Sciences. Many clubs supported veterans in numerous ways. **Education and Libraries** projects included awarding students with a total of \$41,560 in scholarships. Clubs supported back to school supply drives, donated children's books to free clinics and schools, volunteered at local libraries, and supported the Peake Early Childhood Center with supplies and money. The GFWC Great Bridge WC received two \$1000 grants and purchased LEGO Learning Systems that teach STEAM skills at a local primary school. Members of four clubs participated in ESO Zoom meetings. Recycling projects dominated the **Environment CSP.** Clubs repurposed stamps, pill bottles, blankets, towels, and newspapers. GFWC Yorktown WC collected used computer ink cartridges and donated them to the Peninsula Pet Pantry who sells them for refilling. Clubs donated plastic for TREX benches, wine corks, eyeglasses, aluminum pop tabs, plastic bags and cell phones. Poquoson WC collected 40 pounds of denim jeans that will be made into pet bed inserts and industrial mattresses. Health and Wellness projects included donations to Alzheimer's Association, American Cancer Society, THRIVE Peninsula, Salvation Army Virginia Peninsula Foodbank, "No Shame Period," American Red Cross, Meals on Wheels, and the Yorktown Food Closet. WC of Hilton Village made and delivered 150 sandwiches each month to Salvation Army. Under Communications and Public Relations, eleven clubs have Facebook pages, and four clubs have websites. Club newsletters keep members informed about projects and fundraisers. A new edition of the Tidewater District brochure was printed and distributed to all clubs. A total of \$137,424 was raised for Fundraising and **Development.** Clubs held fashion shows, card parties, bazaars, breakfasts with Santa, and the sales of evergreen wreaths. Leadership was strong, with club members logging 11,193 hours. Members served as District Officers and Chairmen, GFWC Virginia 1st Vice President/President elect, and GFWC Virginia chairmen. For Legislation and Public Policy, members were encouraged to vote and were informed of local issues and opportunities to serve on local commissions. **Membership** activities resulted in Tidewater District gaining 60 new members. Four clubs received GFWC Virginia Membership Grants. Four clubs hold Orientation programs for new members. WHRC activities included Federation Day celebrations. WC of the Eastern Shore celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and the GFWC Yorktown WC celebrated its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. For the **GFWC Virginia State Project**, members visited local parks and preserves, purchased butterfly pins, and donated \$578 to help educate and preserve Virginia Natural Resources. The **District Project** helped a church provide non-perishable food to school children to eat during the weekend and over holidays by donating over 2200 food items at the Fall District meeting. Area foodbanks and food pantries received donations from numerous clubs.

### Best Single Project - Small Club - Woman's Club of Norfolk - Tidewater District

This club was proud to come alongside member Bainy Cyrus to provide editorial, research, editing and publicizing efforts of her recently written and released book, Tea and Toil at the Woman's Club. Her book tells the account of several current Woman's Club members (namely Susanne Ott, Paige Rose and others) who joined the club in early 2000 to rescue the "grand old lady" of a mansion/clubhouse in serious deterioration. Bainy tells the story of how this group rescued the mansion from serious deferred maintenance, a deferred tax lien, disassociation with the GFWC and a declined membership. With over 2,350 joint work hours, Bainy's efforts, supported by club efforts, produced this wonderful masterpiece which is an excellent historical reference of important GFWC accomplishments, WCN efforts as well national and global events that shaped the world at the turn of the century, to present times.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - Junior Federated Women's Club of Chester - Lee District

Cotillion has been a Junior project for close to thirty-five years. The instructor is a member of the American Association of Etiquette Professionals. The Chester Cotillion is a self-supporting JFWCC program that teaches dance, manners, and etiquette to 159 seventh and eighth grade students from the Chester area and runs from October through February. There are seven one and a half hour learning sessions for each group, culminating with a formal event for the parents to attend and observe what their children have accomplished.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Ashcake Woman's Club - Lee District

Monthly news articles, Newsletter and Hands-on Craft Projects, Cultural and Seasonal Recipes, supported local theatre, coloring book collections, Stained-Glass presentation, Club trip to the Museum of Contemporary Art and members volunteered at Community Arts & Crafts festival.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Riparian Woman's Club - Southside District

5-year project came to fruition when paintings of deceased artist, Barbara Harding-Sant, which were gifted to the club several years ago were hung at a local Bon Secours Hospital. Money was raised for the cleaning of some of the art and professional hanging of the artwork. A two-year study found that art can help keep us well, aid recovery and support longer life. The arts also help meet challenges in health and social care associated with aging, loneliness, long-term conditions and mental health. With this in mind, Bon Secours Southern Virginia Medical Center agreed to allow the art project to move forward with the paintings to be hung on the walls of the local hospital. The Club entered into an agreement with Bon Secours which was a win-win for the community, patients, visitors, community, the hospital and its employees and our Club. Two club members worked with the hospital several days to decide where the artwork would be hung. Each picture lining the hospital halls has a caption describing what the painting is about.

### CIVIC ENGAGEMENT and OUTREACH PROGRAM 677 Projects 38,827 Hours Celeste Corrigan, Chairman \$130,236 Dollars Donated & \$192,928 In-Kind



### Best Single Project – Small Club – Woman's Club of Norfolk – Tidewater District

The Woman's Club of Norfolk hosted a Tea to bring together newly arrived Ukrainian war refugees with Ukrainians already living in the area and local residents. The purpose was to build camaraderie and provide support. The Tea included a speech by the Mayor of Norfolk followed by a panel of war refugees telling their personal accounts of fleeing Ukraine amidst bombs dropping and the excruciating loss of their homes, barns, and animals. Then there was a moderated presentation discussing how the community could help the newcomers obtain public education, earn green cards, obtain housing, and receive English language assistance. The Tea concluded with a call to action for donations, tangible and in-kind. The event was covered by local TV news stations which further facilitated community awareness.

### Best Single Project – Large Club – GFWC Woman's Club of Greene County – Shenandoah District

All throughout the year the busy "elves" of the Woman's Club of Greene were buying gifts and collecting donations to meet the needs of over 340 children at Christmas. They bought gifts, fleece, and books on sale, made blankets, and solicited and accepted donations of gently used books. They translated their application into Spanish to reach more families via Social Services, local schools, and the local Health Department. As Christmas approached, they organized teams of volunteers to wrap the presents by ages and then hosted a 'Shop Day" for parents to pick out the things they needed. Each family also received a \$25 Walmart gift card.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Woman's Club of Manassas, Inc - Northern District

The club organized a 2-part Day of Service initiative to reduce food insecurities in Manassas by increasing awareness of the extent of the need. The Saturday before the main event club members collected canned goods outside our local grocery store, and they had eight sponsors donate \$250. Part two of the event they partnered with their local library to hold a Canned goods Sculpture Contest, "ExtravaCANza II." There were eight community teams that were given a \$250 gift card to buy the cans they could use to build a sculpture. On the actual day of service, the teams and spectators gathered outside the library and built their sculptures. The result was amazing – 2,109 pounds of canned goods donated to Food Rescue and 5 boxes of canned goods were given to the local food pantry. Nearly 100 people from the community participated.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Cape Henry Woman's Club - Tidewater District

This club continues their support of Heifer International by purchasing a pair of mating alpacas. In 2022, they purchased "Alice and Alex," in 2023 they moved on to the B's by purchasing Bert and Bertha. The Virginia is for Lovers Club uses an Alpaca 'theme' for many of their Club and outreach efforts. Two stuffed alpaca toys became the centerpiece for all their meetings, they make Alpaca scarfs, they support the airport USO office, and Amorous Alpaca baked goods are used to raise money. They carried the alpaca theme to raffling off a handmade Alpaca woolen scarf and had alpaca pins for the members of the club. Their love for the Alpaca knows no bounds as they took a road trip to an Alpaca farm in North Carolina and provided a donation to support the Alpaca farm.

### COMMUNICATIONS and PUBLIC RELATIONS 337 Projects Stephanie Griffin, Chairman 11,696 Hours \$17,169 Spent



Clubs across GFWC Virginia. stepped up to the challenge of communicating with members and promoting their club, GFWC and GFWC Virginia within their community. Clubs communicated with members through newsletters, social media, telephone trees, emails, handbooks, and websites. They branded their Club, District, GFWC Virginia and GFWC by wearing apparel, pins and displayed signs during meetings, events and within their community. The clubs utilized QR codes, partnered with other non-profit organizations, and publicized through their local Chamber of Commerce.

### Best Single Project - Small Club - General - GFWC Ashcake Woman's Club - Lee District

This club held their annual Harvest Run/Walk 10K/5K. Promoted the event utilizing a banner, signs, ads, and flyers with club name. Created a website and Facebook page for their event promoting their club. Shirts were made with the club's name on them. This club has been doing this event for 20 years with much success. They know how to promote their club through this event.

### <u>Best Single Project - Small Club - Junior - Narrows Junior Woman's Club of GFWC - Southwestern District</u>

This club utilized social media, local newspapers, and cable channels to publicize information regarding their yearly TV Auction Fundraiser. They submitted two weekly articles, a paid advertising spot and a full-page advertisement to acknowledge everyone that donated to their auction. Furthermore, they placed signs and a banner with the club's name and auction information in each of their four towns in their county.

We have some celebrities in our presence. How impressive that they promoted their club and live event on a local channel, club website and an auction website.

### Best Single Project – Large Club – General – Woman's Club of Springfield, Inc – Northern District

This club has owned a consignment store and volunteered at the "Pink Elephant," for 60 years. Members promote their club by wearing aprons, signs throughout the shop, bookmarks/postcards and having pictures throughout the shop show club work. All proceeds go toward charities.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - Junior - Junior Woman's Club of Williamsburg - Lee District

This club's President was interviewed by a local radio station during their "Making a Difference Monday" feature in August 2023. The President promoted the club, calibration with other non-profit organizations, and fundraisers. The radio station posted the interview to their website and the interviewer announced several times the club website for listeners to learn more about the club and contact information for the club.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Woman's Club of Tidewater - Tidewater District

This club communicates with club members through emailing and newsletters. They have created a google drive for videos/photos to share with the newsletter editor or social media and uses google forms to vote on issues requiring agreement and to gather information from members. This club has a website and Facebook with informative information about the club. This club utilizes club banner, name badges, club apparel and GFWC, GFWC Virginia and Tidewater emblems.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Woman's Club of Smithfield - Southside District

This club has a communication/marketing committee that sends articles and photographs to their local newspaper to advertise fundraisers and inform the public of their projects and activities. They continuously work on their club website and Facebook page and post activities and pictures of members doing projects. Club members wear their club apparel (shirts and aprons) to special events, proudly display their club banner at events and meetings, hand out their club trifold brochure that gives the purpose and history of the club, describes the Community Service Projects and a list of their dedicated events.

This club at age 87, has entered into social media. They post about club events, share surrounding clubs, and information about club meetings.

This club has a nice website design layout. They have pictures, the club calendar, and the history of the club. The "What We Do" section is nice with a list of Community Service Programs with projects listed.

### 1st Place – Junior Woman's Club of Williamsburg – Lee District

This club's website is inviting. Sections include Community Service, Fundraising and Sponsorship, Donations and Scholarships and Membership. This club checked ALL the website page content and design criteria.

### COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM AWARD Carolyn Fellers, Chairman

Congratulations to GFWC Botetourt Town and Country Woman's Club for their work to help preserve the Botetourt Historical Museum. Thirty-two members participated spending 983 hours of volunteer service and donating \$4951 in-kind supplies to complete this project.

This project was selected as the award winner for the following reasons: Buy in from the community. They worked with multiple agencies, businesses, and community groups to accomplish their goals. They participated in a fundraising event, the Founder's Day Dinner to help pay for programs for local students. Multiple articles were published in the local newspaper about the project. Through their work they were able to truly preserve a historic site and the artifacts kept there for display. This work included moving from an old site to this new site. They helped make improvements to the property to ensure safety of staff and visitors. More importantly, this project benefits the community as a whole and anyone that travels to the area to visit the museum.

### EDUCATION AND LIBRARIES PROGRAM 535 Projects 19,113 Hours Marilyn Banes, Chairman \$254,944 Donated & \$63,065 In-Kind



Clubs assisted teachers with items not provided by schools and showed their appreciation for teachers and librarians with food and gifts. Over \$100,000.00 in scholarships were awarded. A club's goal of partnering with *Dolly Parton's Imagination Library* was achieved. Clubs sought community donations of books, teamed with other organizations, and donated hundreds of books to classrooms, libraries, and multiple community locations.

### Best Single Project - Small Club - Covington Woman's Club of GFWC - Shenandoah District

This club supports the Alleghany Highlands Regional Library. This year they increased their library support with a \$500.00 donation for the purchase of hands-on activities for STEAM learning.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - The Junior Federated Women's Club of Chester - Lee District

This club became a partner with *Dolly Parton's Imagination Library* and began registering children in Chesterfield County zip code 23234. Members registered 253 children who received 1251 books.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Bent Mountain Woman's Club - Blue Ridge District

This club continued a project that stocks a pediatric hospital unit with books. The club delivered 861books. Another project assisted a school in a district with a 92% poverty rate. Their hope was that children could maintain reading levels by getting books at the end of the school year. The club donated 581 books, enough that each child went home with at least 4 books.

### Best Overall – Large Club – GFWC Varina Woman's Club – Lee District

At a school's request, this club purchased 74 books to be enjoyed by a culturally diverse school population. Three \$2000.00 scholarships were awarded. For another elementary school, the club purchased 60 backpacks and filled them with school supplies. Members encouraged first graders with buttons reading "First Graders Love to Read." On a specified day, club members read the book With Lots of Love in 25 classrooms in 2 schools as part of Jump Start's "Read for the Record" program.

### ENVIRONMENT 321 Projects 20,462 Hours Carol Pridgen, Chairman \$22,257 Donated and \$26,134 In Kind



During the 2023 club year, club members continued to be in involved with other organizations who provide educational programs, workshops, camps, cleanup days, and other opportunities for area youth to learn to protect our natural resources. Club members continue to help preserve the environment by reusing items, recycling plastic for benches, and by planting plants and trees that are native to the area to attack pollinators such as bees, butterflies, and beetles.

### Best Single Project - Small Club - GFWC Ashcake Woman's Club - Lee District

Members of this small club were educated on small projects that could be done in their own backyard during the cold months of the year. (1) Look out for bats (2) Put DOWN the PRUNERS (3) Maintain a Space for Birds and (4) Plan and Attend Educational Events. Check with your local extension agent for educational opportunities.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - Woman's Club of Fairfax - Northern District

Club members decided to take on a challenge of an "on-going project" called Adopt-A-Spot Park project. During their quarterly weeding/clean up in October, club members held a rock painting event and created "Roxie the Rock Snake", approximately 40 people attended. Over 75 rocks were painted and placed in the WCF's special adopt-a-spot, and that's when Roxie the Rock Snake started *rocking* School Street Park!

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Bedford Woman's Club - Blue Ridge District

Members of this small club planted trees and shrubs to help preserve and protect the environment, they also planted a vegetable garden. Fruits and vegetables were canned and shared with family and friends. GFWC Bedford WC members really live up to the last paragraph of our Collect, "And may we strive to touch and to know the great common human heart of us all, and O Lord God, let us forget not to be kind."

### Best Overall – Large Club – GFWC Junto Woman's Club – Southside District

This club provides all third graders with an educational box that is very colorful and looks like you could be floating on the river if you were small enough to fit into the box. Once you open the box the fun is just beginning, out pops a colorful bandana with the local water ways printed on it, along with a ruler, a waterfowl and animals found in or around the water ways. One of the club's members designed the booklet inside the box explaining the different stages of an oyster. WOW, what a way to learn!

### 351 Projects 47,183 Hours Dollars Raised \$551,513



<u>Best Single Project – Small Club – General – Spotsylvania County Woman's Club – Northern District</u> This club held three "Work on Whatever (WOW)" events this year. Attendees worked on scrapbooks, knitting, crocheting and other handmade items.

Best Single Project – Small Club – Junior – Essex County Junior Woman's Club – Lee District This club hosts a "Drink Pink" event, which is a community event that is held at a local restaurant and includes a silent auction, live entertainment, 50/50 raffle, koozie sales and donations. Over \$6,100 was raised to donate to the Virginia Breast Cancer Foundation.

<u>Best Single Project – Large Club – General – Clifton Community Woman's Club – Northern District</u>
This club created a Speakers for Scholarship series, which is held on four Saturdays at 4:30 PM February through May. The topics included "Reading Body Language", "Artists of the High Renaissance", "Russia's war on Ukraine, origin and update", and "What's Modern about Modern Drama?" This lecture series is open to the community.

### <u>Best Single Project - Large Club - Junior - GFWC Appalachian Leading Ladies Junior Woman's Club - Southwestern District</u>

This club hosted its annual haunted history walk, drawing over 400 people and raising over \$1400. This included a haunted house and haunted hayride, members donning costumes leading groups of participants on a walk through the downtown, all while sharing spooky legends and historical facts.

### Best Overall - Small Club - tie - GFWC Sedley Woman's Club - Southside District

This club held a princess tea party for young girls in their community. In addition to introducing young girls to a fun, somewhat formal event, this tea party involved various members of the community including teenaged girls as "Princess Helpers" and a construction crew who designed and made the cardboard castle. Aside from that project, this club held a Cookie Walk at Christmas Time, orchestrated letters from Santa. Sold anniversary and birthday calendars and held a Bingo party. All of this with 17 members.

### Best Overall – Small Club – tie – Wytheville Woman's Club – Southwestern District

This club of 19 members "Egged" people's yards, set-up bake sales, sold earrings and necklaces with the GFWC emblem, held an annual craft and vendor event, and worked the concession stand for a Valentine's Day event. Utilizing their Facebook page, this club holds a monthly online auction that begins on Friday and ends on Sunday. One significant fundraising event was the Annual Symbolic Stair Climb where all local EMS and Fire Department are invited to participate.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Woman's Club of Newport News - Tidewater District

This club held 16 fundraising events during 2023. These included silent auctions during their regular club meetings, working with the city on their outdoor events, selling See's Candy, holding an annual scholarship luncheon and fashion show, working with a local restaurant selling meal tickets to support a nursing scholarship, conducting a Bunco event, and selling a donated porcelain doll collection to name a few. Of particular interest is the Annual Bottle Auction, where members and guests donate "Bottle" Prizes/gifts. A professional auctioneer volunteers his time and attendees bid on the unknown contents of the bottles.

### HEALTH AND WELLNESS PROGRAM 504 Projects 67,099 Hours Mary Driver-Downs Chairman \$52,623 Donated & \$123,303 In-Kind



Operation Smile, Shot-at-Life, Heifer, St Judes, March of Dimes, UNICEF and Canine Companions Affiliates were supported with monetary and/or in-kind donations as well as collections of items. The Statewide initiative for "Step in Time Fitness challenge" was promoted by all 8 Districts with clubs including all types of physical movement, which ultimately leads to healthy living.

<u>Best Single Project – Small Club – GFWC Woman's Club of Manassas, Inc. – Northern District</u> <u>Go Red Women, Wear Red Day -</u> While almost all clubs recognize American Heart Month, this club went above and beyond just wearing the color red. This club prepared 200 "healthy heart" goodie bags. Each bag contained a *Red Dress* Lapel Pin (as purchased from the American Heart Association), a Heart Health Bookmark (which included 75 tips on how eating, exercising, and relaxing properly can help build a healthy heart), a heart health emery board, and club contact information. Members distributed the bags on Wear Red Day, Feb 3rd during the city's *First Friday* celebration. Dressed in red, members walked among the crowd in freezing temperatures to hand out the bags to women in attendance.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - Woman's Club of Newport News - Tidewater District

<u>Operation Smile – Student /Volunteer Training</u> At the request of Operation Smile personnel, the club conducted training for students from high schools in the Portsmouth area. Club members showed students, and Operation Smile personnel, how to make the No Sew Fleece Blankets and the No No Arm Bands. Each student had the opportunity to use the sewing machines and work on the blankets. There were 25 blankets made and 30 No No Arm Bands. Supplies were provided by Operation Smile.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Kanawha Woman's Club - Lee District

Club programming was focused around Healthy Lifestyles (following along the GFWC Virginia's Health and Wellness "Self-Care- It's all about me" theme for 2023) with topics such as Flexibility, Fascia movements, Dharma Code, NIA - Non impact aerobics, Healthy aging, Self-defense, Graceful Aging and for October Domestic Violence Month - "Strength" with Tae Kwon Do martial arts hands on program.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Woman's Club of Smithfield - Southside District

This club embraced the Step in Time challenge incorporating it with their ON THE MOVE Program. Almost half their members participated in the Step in Time Program with over 15,880 hours of exercise logged for 2023. Club members were challenged to walk 30 miles in the month of March. Walk with a Doc program was started in September where every 2nd Saturday monthly, friends and club women meet at a local park to learn about a current health topic and then spend the rest of the time enjoying a healthy walk at their own pace and distance. All of these events were free and open to the public. This club also had 7 Affiliate projects they reported under Health and Wellness.

### LEADERSHIP 592 Projects 54,265 Hours Susie Mowry, Chairman \$77,690 Spent and \$23,800 In-Kind Joanne Dixon, Junior Chairman



### Best Single Project - Small Club - General - GFWC Ashcake Woman's Club - Lee District

The Leadership Chair for this club researched, designed, and presented a workshop to members on *How to Have Difficult Conversations* to encourage clear and honest communication. A TED talk was shown, and a book given to participants.

### <u>Best Single Project - Small Club Junior - GFWC Junior Woman's Club of Hopewell- Southside</u> District

This club utilizes all of their leadership experience and skills to mentor a Juniorette club, hopefully instilling their knowledge and passion for volunteering into these young, future clubwomen.

# <u>Best Single Project – Large Club General – The Woman's Club of Windsor, Inc. – Southside District</u> This club has short, informal training sessions for new chairmen, officers and interested members prior to each club meeting.

### <u>Best Single Project - Large Club Junior - GFWC Pearisburg Junior Woman's Club - Southwestern District</u>

This club signed up for the GFWC Leadership Certification Program, completing sections of the program through training and studying the history of GFWC.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Bent Mountain Women's Club - Blue Ridge District

This club developed a yearly meeting graphic that is shared with every member of their club. Representing their club, the co-presidents sit on the Bent Mountain Center Board providing input about how the city resources are utilized. Due to the club's past involvement in the renovation of the library, a representative member of their club sits on the Roanoke County Library Board.

### Best Overall – Large Club – Woman's Club of Newport News – Tidewater District

Recognizing leadership is enhanced through educating their members, this club utilized games to increase awareness. Club members participated in a game of FAMILY FEUD, breaking into teams, using questions based on knowledge of GFWC. In addition, at the May meeting members participated in JEOPARDY, with

categories of GFWC, GFWC Virginia, The Woman's Club of Newport News, and other Federation categories. As a result of playing these games, and realizing there was more to learn about Federation, two members requested to attend GFWC Virginia LEADS. Subsequently one of these members volunteered to be Nominating Committee chair and the other asked to join the club board as a member-at-large. This club has three non-voting, at-large members on the board who are appointed by the president and are selected based on interest and demonstrated leadership potential. (outside judging was used)

### LEGISLATION and PUBLIC POLICY 65 Projects 580 Hours Liz Sabbatini Chairman \$250 Donated \$31 Spent



GFWC Virginia Clubs place great emphasis on participating in local legislation by voting, contacting their representatives and working on local boards. They also made a point of signing up for the Legislative Action Center and supported GFWC resolutions and concerns. Tidewater Districts shone in 2023 - hopefully this is a challenge to other Districts to up their Legislative game!

### <u>Best Single Project - Small Club - General - GFWC Woman's Club of South Norfolk - Tidewater</u> District

This club has supported member Dr. Ella Ward in her efforts on the restoration project for the Cornland School of Chesapeake. Her work came to fruition in November 2023 when the Chesapeake city leaders broke ground on the revitalization project.

### Best Single Project – Small Club – Junior – No Award/Entry

### Best Single Project - Large Club - General - GFWC Yorktown Woman's Club - Tidewater District

They have two members on the Board of Elections and one member on the Board of Supervisors. These ladies regularly keep the club updated on local election and legislative matters.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - Junior - GFWC Louisa Junior Woman's Club - Lee District

This club donated \$250 to the Louisa Hometown Heroes Project, which placed 41 banners through the town to honor every Louisa County soldier who had lost their life in battle.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Woman's Club of Tidewater - Tidewater District

This club reported 11 projects, including signing up for the Legislative Action Center, keeping members updated on Resolutions, GFWC 'Power of You' Webinar, the Legislative Scavenger Hunt and working towards the GFWC Virginia Legislation Day.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Poquoson Woman's Club - Tidewater District

The Poquoson Woman's Club recognizes and commemorates the 19th Amendment and voting. A PowerPoint presentation entitled "It's Your Right" was created and shown to encourage their members. It was followed up with a relevant survey. Two of their members serve on the Electoral Board.

Members started a new project this year and became Pillow Pals with Clinch Valley Community Action-Family Crisis Services' Women Shelter, donating 23 pillows. Staff had told us pillows could not be reused by clients and were always needing to be replaced. Members also donated hygiene products such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste, etc. to the shelter.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Ashcake Woman's Club - Lee District

This Club adopted a Safe Place Family for Christmas. Although the actual family is unknow to us, the club is given a wish list, prepared by a mom and two children. It describes their sizes, favorite colors, needs and wants. The Club concentrates on meeting the needs but often is able to supply many of their wants. We were able to do that this year. Members chose from the listed items and brought them to one person.

### Best Overall - Large Club - Lexington Woman's Club - Shenandoah District

This Club supported Project Horizon a shelter dedicated to eradicating domestic, sexual, and dating violence through education, advocacy, empowerment of survivors, and by being a sanctuary for victims. The Club provided donated \$450 in \$10 denominations gift cards to be used at Goodwill for clothes, Sheetz for gas, and Walmart for essentials. They also had a committee that provided Easter baskets for the children residing there at Easter, and Mother's Day gift baskets for the women residing there in May and one afternoon they dropped a pizza dinner there for the residents.

### STATE PROJECT: Education and Promotion of Virginia's Natural Resources Dale Fisher, Chairman

146 Projects 3,103 Volunteer Hours \$13,043 Donated \$5,042 In-Kind



Clubs educated their members and their communities on the importance, beauty, and threat to Virginia's natural resources through nature walks, club programs, a presence at local fairs, social media posts, publications, and collaborative efforts with other organizations. Parks, gardens, and nature centers were visited, Virginia waterways were monitored, nature camperships were provided, and books were donated to schools.

A Master Gardener presented information on the new Hanover County, VA Horticultural Education Center at a club meeting. The club designated the Center as one of the beneficiaries of their annual fundraiser which resulted in a \$7,500 donation to the Center.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - GFWC Mary Ball Woman's Club - Northern District

This club supported a young lady's efforts in achieving her Silver Award in Scouting - the construction of a pollinator-friendly garden on the Tribal Land of the Patawomeck Indians. The club donated money, plant material, and their time to assist her complete her project.

Descendants of the Paxton family, past GFWC Virginia presidents, many club and district members, and local dignitaries attended the lavish reception. Club history had been updated and sent to GFWC. The local paper devoted over two pages to the club's accomplishments in the community during the past 100 years.

### Best Single Project - Large Club - GFWC Great Bridge Woman's Club - Tidewater District

The club produced a DVD video covering its social activities, community projects, and awards during the year entitled "2023 Club Year in Review." Shown were members, projects, and many items donated to community organizations. Slides were accompanied by music, and projects and members were identified and dated. It was shown at the Spring installation and posted on Facebook, serving as an important recruitment tool showing prospective members the club's work in the community.

### Best Overall - Small Club - GFWC Sedley Woman's Club - Southside District

During "Women's History Month," eight well-known women--past and present-were recognized for their significant contributions to the community. ### Best Single Project - Small Club - General - GFWC Regency Woman's Club - Lee District

Members met at a local Build-a-Bear workshop and made 11 stuffed animals with new outfits. These bears headed to the local police department and to the Davis Child Advocacy Center. They will be used to assist with children that are involved in traumatic situations to reduce the emotional toll.

### <u>Best Single Project - Small Club - Junior - Staunton/Augusta Junior Woman's Club - Shenandoah</u> District

In honor of Advocates for Children Week, the SAJWC supported Valley Advocacy, an organization that provides mental health care and forensic investigations for child survivors of abuse. In addition to financial contributions from the club and members, they also helped market and fundraise for their Turkey Trot.
