[A Space of Heroism and Holy War: The Andalusian Border (13th-14th Centuries)]

Dr. Rafael Peinado Santaella, Emeritus Professor of Medieval Studies at the University of Granada, is an authority on the early history of Andalusia and the Kingdom of Granada. He has produced more than twenty books as author or collaborator and published more than fifty articles. He has also been an important scholarly presence in the editorial world, in scholarly reviews of new books, and in frequent scholarly articles in Spanish newspapers; he has been the chief investigator on university and national research projects and grants; and he is the translator of important French works and articles on topics connected to the conquest of Al-Andalus, theories of the Feudal system, violence and religion in the Middle Ages, and the image of the Islamic world in European sources. The body of his work is replete with essential references to the history of Andalusia and the Kingdom of Granada, but if a single work might be cited, his three volume History of the Kingdom of Granada covering the period of its origins in 1232 to its collapse in 1833 is the definitive history of the Kingdom, with volume I on the Moorish period and volume II on the Christian conquest and the period of resettlement particularly notable.

Allen DuPont Breck Award for an Early Career Scholar

The Allen DuPont Breck Award (\$300) is given each year for the best paper given by an early career scholar (graduate student to assistant professor or equivalent) at the Annual Conference. This award was established to recognize outstanding work by early career scholars and to honor the memory of Allen DuPont Breck, University of Denver history professor, founder, and for more than twenty years the energetic advocate and leader of the Rocky Mountain Medieval and Renaissance Association. All early career scholars are encouraged to apply.

Delno C. West Award for a Senior Scholar

The Delno C. West Award is given each year for the best paper given by a senior scholar (associate and full professors or the equivalent) at the Annual Conference. This award recognizes the scholarship of senior scholars with a handsome plaque. This award was established to honor Delno C. West after his untimely death in 1998. West was Chair of the Department of History at Northern Arizona University, Director of the Honors Program, a fine scholar and exceptionally dedicated member of the Association as President and organizer of three conferences. All senior scholars are encouraged to apply.
