Keynote Lecture: 10:30-12:00 Officer's Club—Fort Douglas **South Room**

Roger L. Martínez-Dávila, Ph.D., Associate Professor and Chair, Department of History at the University of Colorado-Colorado Springs, will deliver the Keynote lecture titled "L'école des Annales Électronique: A New Theory and Practice for the 21^{st} Century Making Sense of the Past, Present, and Future of Historiography." Founded and practiced by the legendary Marc Bloch, Lucien Febvre, Fernand Braudel, and Emmanuel Le Roy Ladurie, the Annales School is considered among the most consequential historiographical approaches as it sought a *total* history. It is the practice of historical investigation that "crosses all frontiers and uses all techniques...to recreate the totality of a society, past or present, to understand its delicate mechanism and yet to see it, not as a machine, but as a living organism". But now, the investigation of medieval and early modern history is amid an inflection point in terms of theory, methods, and practice due to the revolutionary impact of the late 20th century Computer Age and its voracious descendant, the early 21st century Internet Age. This moment of change can be best characterized and understood by a phenomenon that I encountered as a 24-year-old technology and cultural *futurist* at the Institute for the Future (IFTF) on Sand Hill Road, the famed Silicon Valley artery housing venture capitalists, entrepreneurs, and organizations that were shaping the future of global life. In 1994, I forecast the need to guard one's online identity, tested AI phone assistants who listened in on my conversations, experimented with 3D virtual representations of economic data, and used software that supported social networking and collaborative work. Time has caught up to my forecasts and trial testing – all are commonplace features of our lives in 2021. What can a futurist perspective tell us about the past and about historians' investigation of the past?
