AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT IS SIGNED INTO LAW

President Joe Biden on Thursday signed into law the \$1.9 trillion U.S. Coronavirus relief bill known as the American Rescue Plan Act with \$1,400 stimulus checks.

Key provisions in the Act include:

• Stimulus Check:

Economic impact payments of \$1,400 for a single taxpayer (\$2,800 for married couples), in addition to \$1,400 per dependent. The credit phases out between \$75,000 and \$80,000 (\$150,000 and \$160,000 for married couples). A dependent includes both children and non-child dependents.

The Act uses 2019 AGI to determine eligibility unless the taxpayer has already filed a 2020 return.

• Unemployment Benefits:

Unemployment benefits of \$300 a week will extend through September 6, 2021. The first \$10,200 in unemployment payments received in 2020 will be non-taxable for households with incomes under \$150,000.

COBRA Continuation Coverage

The Act includes premium assistance for COBRA continuation coverage through September 31,2020. It calls for a 100% reduction of COBRA premiums for eligible Individuals.

• Child Tax Credit for 2021

The Act increases the amount of the credit to \$3,000 per children ages 6 to 17 (\$3,600 for children under 6). The increased credit amount phases out for taxpayers with incomes over \$150,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly, \$112,500 for heads of household, and \$75,000 for others. Families eligible for the full credit will get payments of up to \$300 per child per month from July through the end of the year.

Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit for 2021

Expanded child and dependent care tax credit of up to \$4,000 for childcare expenses for one child and up to \$8,000 for two or more children for households making up to \$125,000.

- Extension of Employee Retention Tax Credit The Act extends the ERTC to cover wages paid through the end of 2021.
- Extension of Family and Sick Leave Credit The Act of 2020 (CTRA) extends the tax credit to September 30, 2021.

• Student Loans

Student loan forgiveness passed between December 31, 2020 and January 1, 2026 will be tax-free.

• Aid to Businesses

The ARPA includes funding for various industries hard hit by the pandemic, as well as a financial boost for the Paycheck Protection Program. The funds are broken down as follows:

- \$15 billion for airlines and eligible contractors (must refrain from furloughing workers or cutting pay through September 2021)
- \$25 billion for restaurants and bars (includes grants of up to \$10 million per entity to be used for covering payroll, rent, utilities, and other operating expenses)
- \$7.25 billion for the PPP
